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PREFACE

The opinions of the Court of Claims reported herein are published by authority of the provisions of Section 18 of the Court of Claims Act, 705 ILCS 505/1.

The Court of Claims has exclusive jurisdiction to hear and determine the following matters: (a) all claims against the State of Illinois founded upon any law of the State, or upon any regulation thereunder by an executive or administrative officer or agency, other than claims arising under the Workers' Compensation Act or the Workers' Occupational Diseases Act, or claims for certain expenses in civil litigation, (b) all claims against the State founded upon any contract entered into with the State, (c) all claims against the State for time unjustly served in prisons of this State when the person imprisoned received a pardon from the governor stating that such pardon is issued on the ground of innocence of the crime for which he or she was imprisoned or he or she received a certificate of innocence from the Circuit Court as provided in Section 2-702 of the Code of Civil Procedure; (d) all claims against the State in cases sounding in tort, (e) all claims for recoupment made by the State against any Claimant, (f) certain claims to compel replacement of a lost or destroyed State warrant, (g) certain claims based on torts by escaped inmates of State institutions, (h) certain representation and indemnification cases, (i) all claims pursuant to the Line of Duty Compensation Act, (j) all claims pursuant to the Illinois National Guardsman's Compensation Act, and (k) all claims pursuant to the Crime Victims Compensation Act.

A large number of claims contained in this volume have not been reported in full due to quantity and general similarity of content. These claims have been listed according to the type of claim or disposition. The categories they fall within include: claims in which orders of awards or orders of dismissal were entered without opinions, claims based on lapsed appropriations, certain State employees' back salary claims, prisoners and inmates-missing property claims, claims in which orders and opinions of denial were entered without opinions, refund cases, medical vendor claims, Line of Duty Compensation Act claims and certain claims based on the Crime Victims Compensation Act. However, any claim which is of the nature of any of the above categories, but which also may have value as precedent, has been reported in full.

Regulatory agencies, discretionary functions- Office of Banks and Real Estate, under its statutory grant of authority, examined the corporate fiduciary. The decision as to what actions to take following that examination were discretionary. OBRE identified issues with the trust account and took action. The court refuses to hold regulatory agencies liable for allegedly negligently performing discretionary functions.

ORDER

Sprague, C.J.

This matter comes before the Court on the Complaint of STEVEN and MARTHA HARSCH, et al., and against the STATE OF ILLINOIS through the OFFICE OF BANKS AND REAL ESTATE. A trial on this matter was held on August 2-4, 2010, before Commissioner Andrea M. Buford.

FACTS

The Claimants herein and at all times relevant, held investment and or retirement accounts with Intrust. Intrust is an Illinois Corporation certified under the Illinois Corporate Fiduciary Act, 205 ILCS 620/1-1 *et seq.*, ("Act") by the Illinois Office of Banks and Real Estate ("OBRE") to act as trustee for various types of Individual Retirement Accounts. ("IRAs"). Intercounty Title ("Intercounty") was a company that offered title insurance to owners of real estate. Jack Hargrove ("Hargrove") was the Chairman of Intrust's Board of Directors and the

owner of Intrust through Intrust's parent company, Madison Avenue Investments. Laurence Capriotti ("Capriotti") was a Director of Intrust. The principal registered officers and directors of Intrust were also the principal registered officers and directors of Intercounty.

The Illinois Corporate Fiduciary Act was enacted to protect the public interest and general welfare of the people of the State of Illinois. The Act entrusts OBRE with the responsibility to supervise corporate fiduciaries. The Act specifically provides for OBRE's supervision, regular examination and correction of any unsafe or imprudent practices of trust companies.

Specifically, the Act provides for an examination no less frequently than every 18 months. On each examination, inquiry shall be made as to the condition and resources of the corporate fiduciary generally, the mode of conducting and managing its affairs, the action of its directors and trustees, the investments of the funds, the safety and prudence of its management, the security afforded to those by whom its engagements are held, and whether the requirements of its charter and laws have been complied with in the administration of its affairs. 205 ILCS 620/5-2.

Whenever it appears from an examination that a corporate fiduciary has committed any violation of any law, has made or published a false statement of condition or is conducting its business in an unsafe, unsound or unauthorized manner, OBRE shall direct the discontinuance of such practices and that they strictly conform to the requirements of the law. 205 ILCS 620/5-3.

If a corporate fiduciary refuses or neglects to make a required statement of condition or any report required under this Act, or to comply with an order as above stated, or if it appears that it is unsafe or inexpedient for the corporate fiduciary to conduct business, OBRE shall enter an appropriate order which may include the appointment of a receiver, the taking of possession

of the corporate fiduciary, or the removal of a director, officer, employee or agent of the corporate fiduciary. 205 ILCS 620/5-3. The Act does not provide for insurance of account holder's or corporate funds.

On December 4, 1990, Intrust entered into an escrow agreement with Intercounty Title. ("Escrow Agreement"). Pursuant to the Escrow Agreement, Intrust deposited the cash portions of customer accounts with Intercounty. Intercounty was obligated to pay Intrust a minimum rate of interest on the money deposited by Intrust. The Escrow Agreement obligated Intercounty to deposit the trust funds into an escrow account at the LaSalle National Bank of Chicago. ("Escrow Account"). Under the terms of the Escrow Agreement, Intrust retained no direct control over the Escrow Account. Intrust depended on Intercounty, as escrow agent, to follow Intrust's directions with respect to the operation of the Escrow Account. The Escrow Agreement gave Intrust no power to account for, withdraw, or safeguard the funds and they were not a signatory on the Escrow Account.

In December 1990, after entering into the Escrow Agreement, Intrust deposited \$16,582,098.78 with Intercounty. In subsequent years, Intrust continued to deposit funds with Intercounty pursuant to the Escrow Agreement. At times the balance in the escrow account exceeded \$100 million. By January 2000, the balance of funds should have been more than \$68,000,000.

From the inception of the Escrow Account in December of 1990 until January 2000, Intercounty did not provide Intrust with copies of LaSalle Bank statements for the escrow funds. Instead, Intercounty provided Intrust with monthly spreadsheets prepared by Intercounty or others under the control of Hargrove or Capriotti purporting to show the balances of deposits. The monthly spreadsheets falsely reported balances. Capriotti, Hargrove and others

misappropriated Intrust funds sometime after December 1990. To date more than \$68,090,000 in deposits and reported accrued interest have been misappropriated from funds that were deposited by Intrust with Intercounty.

On or about July 14, 2005, Capriotti plead guilty to multiple counts for his role in the misappropriation and received fourteen (14) years in jail. Capriotti admitted that he, Hargrove and others conspired to defraud Intrust, its account holders and others of the money in the escrow account; that they engaged in acts to conceal the scheme from Intrust's president, auditors, OBRE and others; that he obstructed and made false statements and promises to OBRE and Intrust's president in connection with OBRE's efforts to protect the Intrust holder funds; admitted to causing OBRE examiners to receive what purported to be an account statement that stated as of May 31, 1997, the Intrust Escrow account contained \$54,894,943; and in connection with the OBRE 1998 examination provided what purported to be an escrow statement showing a balance of \$54,840,446 as of August 31, 1998. In or around May 2006, Hargrove was sentenced to fourteen (14) years in jail for his conduct involving the misappropriation of the subject funds.

In connection with OBRE's duties they conducted a general examination on Intrust at least once per calendar year. Each examination report from 1991-1998 contains a sworn statement detailing the assets and liabilities of Intrust in which Intrust reported they were not aware of any misappropriation of corporate or fiduciary funds. In 1991, in the comment section of its report, OBRE reported the company's cumulative trust accounts were inexplicably out of balance and short by over \$400,000.00. An OBRE examiner stated the shortage had existed for several years and had not been rectified and that pursuant to the Order of December 28, 1990, amounts not reconciled by December 31, 1991, were required to be charged off by Intrust. The accounts were eventually reconciled. In the September 1991 independent audit the auditor

found the depositor funds in Intercounty could not be examined or verified, which led to a qualified opinion on the company's soundness. The February 25, 1994, OBRE examination report reported Intrust's "commingling of trust assets with that of an affiliate which violates common law trust principals. One of the fundamental duties of a fiduciary is to keep trust accounts separate. Management should separate its accounts." Intrust responded to the report and disagreed with the comments.

Between 1994 and 1995, Intrust deposited nearly 10 million in additional trust funds with Intercounty and the commingled deposits through Intercounty to LaSalle National Bank amounted to approximately \$40 million. In 1995 the OBRE examination report reported the comingling of funds between Intrust and Intercounty. The report commented that Intrust does not receive statements directly from the bank but relies on spreadsheets supplied by Intercounty. The report further stated Intrust made two large capital loans to Intercounty without a valid contractual agreement until after the fact, without first obtaining credit information on the debtor and without effectuating an inspection or appraisal of the collateral.

In the January 1996 OBRE report, the examiner pointed out that Intrust was comingling trust assets with affiliate's assets. Between 1995 and 1996, Intrust deposited nearly \$7,000,000 in additional funds with Intercounty. On August 1, 1996, Intrust's independent auditors issued a qualified audit report. At that time approximately \$57,000,000 was at risk. On June 23, 1997, Intrust's independent auditor issued another qualified audit report. At that time approximately \$94,000,000 was at risk. In April 1997, OBRE's report stated Intrust's business practices constituted a patent weakness in account administration.¹

¹ According to Mr. O'Brien, OBRE Examiner in Charge ("EIC") for the 1997 examination, the comingling issue was cured but there was an issue with control over the new escrow account in that Intercounty had signature authority.

On June 25, 1998, Intrust's independent auditors issued another qualified report and warned of the possibility that \$54,000,000 in trust funds could be lost as a result of Intrust's deposits with an affiliate. On August 31, 1998, the OBRE report stated the findings of the independent auditor was qualified because no independent verification of trust cash was permitted by the company; the escrow arrangement with Intercounty represented a major conflict of interest, in that fiduciary funds are benefitting an affiliate company; and the situation needs to be monitored and steps taken to ensure funds are under Intrust's control.²

In April 1999, pursuant to the directions of Capriotti and Hargrove, Intrust wire transferred \$9,200,000 in additional deposits to the escrow account. OBRE was not informed of this transfer. Intercounty withdrew the \$9,200,000 almost immediately after the transfer, leaving a balance of \$45,949.24.

Some time prior to August 3, 1999, OBRE requested verification from Intrust that Intrust officials had been added to the LaSalle Account, that no withdrawals could be made without Intrust authority, required account documentation directly from LaSalle bank and a copy of the LaSalle and Intercounty repurchase agreement. On August 10, 1999, OBRE informed Intrust it needed to take immediate corrective action regarding the escrow account with Intercounty. On August 24, 1999, Capriotti assured OBRE that the escrow account issues would be addressed at the Intrust board meeting that day. On September 1, 1999, OBRE requested that Intercounty transfer escrow funds to a separate established account at Cole Taylor bank immediately as had been previously requested on August 31, 1999. Intrust had a Certificate of Good Standing stating Intrust was qualified to conduct business as a trust. After September 15, 1999, inquiries on Intrust would be directed to the OBRE website. On September 15, 1999, OBRE issued a

² According to Mr. Mennel, EIC for the 1998 examination, a LaSalle Bank statement showed \$54 million in the escrow account.

Corrective Action Order, posted on the OBRE website, outlining the escrow account issues and requiring Intrust to terminate the escrow account arrangement with Intercounty and take control of the trust assets and properly account for trust assets. On September 30, 1999, OBRE was notified by Intrust's president that the escrow arrangement with Intercounty had still not been rectified. On October 7, 1999, OBRE requested Intrust comply with the Sept. 15 corrective order no later than October 15, 1999. On October 12, 1999, Intrust reported to OBRE that it would take care of the issue in a couple of days. On October 15 and October 19, OBRE contacted Intrust's president to inquire about the escrow account. On October 20, an OBRE examiner was sent to Intrust to investigate the escrow situation. On November 9, 1999, OBRE examiners attended an Intrust Board of Directors meeting and were told the escrow account would be taken care of no later than November 19, 1999. On November 17, OBRE met with Capriotti on another matter at which time Capriotti blamed Intrust's president for the problems related to the corrective order and stated he would address the issues on November 18, 1999.

On January 1, 2000, Intrust provided bank and broker statements to OBRE showing account totals matching the Intrust account totals. By January 19, 2000, OBRE was informed that Intrust had not yet complied with the September 1999 Corrective Action Order. On February 7, 2000, OBRE subpoenaed account verification for Intrust from LaSalle Bank³ and Harris Bank. On February 10, 2000, Intrust provided signature cards for accounts with only Intrust employees. On March 2, 2000, OBRE issued an order stating that Intrust's practices and condition pose a threat to the Corporation's ability to operate in a safe, sound and authorized manner. The order required Intrust to fully comply with the Corrective Action Order within 10 days, increase capital to an amount not less than the escrow assets, recover the funds in escrow

³ This was not part of the regular examination process and had never been done before.

from Intercounty, file a bond claim and remove any Intercounty affiliated person from all Intrust account authority. In April 2000, OBRE took possession of Intrust and placed the company in receivership. At that time, over \$68,090,000 in funds and reported interest had been lost.

On or after April 14, 2000, Claimants received individual notice of the receivership. Sometime thereafter Claimants' accounts at Intrust were frozen. Approximately \$4 million dollars has been recovered on behalf of the Claimants and receiver litigation is still ongoing. The receiver has declined to pursue any action against the State of Illinois and Claimants were given leave by the Chancery Court to separately file this action.

LEGAL ANALYSIS

The issue at the heart of this matter is whether the Office of Banks and Real Estate owed a duty to the Claimants and whether they breached that duty under the Illinois Corporate Fiduciary Act, 205 ILCS 620 et al. Pursuant to the Act, OBRE is charged with examining trust operations to inquire "as to the condition and resources of the corporate fiduciary generally, its mode of conducting and managing its affairs, the action of its directors or trustees, the investments of its funds, the safety and prudence of its management, the security afforded to those by whom its engagements are held, and whether the requirements of its charter and of the laws have been complied with in the administration of its affairs." The statute further authorizes the Commissioner to take action should it be determined that a violation exists.

The testimony and exhibits produced indicate OBRE complied with its statutory mandate to examine the trust operation. The Respondent argues they do not owe a duty to the Claimants; that the decisions of the Commissioner fall within his discretionary duties; that the Corporate Fiduciary Act does not create a private cause of action; that Claimants failed to exhaust remedies against their investment advisors; and that no decision can be made by the Court until the

receivership is closed. The Claimants argue that the Corporate Fiduciary Act mandated a clear and non-discretionary duty on OBRE to stop unsafe or unsound practices; that the Court in ruling on the Respondent's Motion to Dismiss, rejected Respondent's arguments that OBRE could not be liable for the performance or nonperformance of discretionary acts; that the Claimants have no private right of action against OBRE; or that they did not have a claim for negligent representation. The Court in its Order stated, "the allegations of the Claimants, taken as true for the purposes of the Motion to Dismiss, raise an issue of fact as to whether the alleged negligent acts were the result of the use of discretion undertaken in good faith." The Court goes on to state, "if the allegations of the Consolidated Complaint are taken as true, then Claimants have stated a cause of action that would stand against a private person or corporation."

However, the burden of proof when ruling on a motion to dismiss is not the same as when ruling after a trial on the merits. Therefore we find this Court can consider the argument raised that OBRE could not be held liable for the performance or nonperformance of discretionary acts.

Generally speaking, the courts have refused to impose liability on similar agencies for their alleged negligent conduct in performing their statutory duties. *Harmsen v. Smith*, 586 F.2d 156 (9th Cir. 1978). In *Harmsen*, the court held that the directors of a bank could not maintain actions for indemnity against the United States for the alleged negligence of the comptroller in conducting bank examinations. Notwithstanding the holding of the court on the issue of statutory duty, in *Tcherepnin v. Franz*, 393 F.Supp. 1197 (N.D. Ill. 1975), opinion supplemented 424 F.Supp 778, affirmed 570 F.2d 187, cert.denied 99 SCt. 214, 439 U.S.76, the court held, "Illinois decisions have consistently held that public officials vested with discretion and empowered to exercise their judgment are immune from liability to third persons provided that the acts complained of are discretionary in nature, done with the scope of the official's authority

and not resulting from malicious or corrupt motives." Although *Tcherepnin* dealt with the liability of the Director, we find the discussion on ministerial versus discretionary instructive and hold the acts complained of in the instant case are discretionary in nature. The language of the Corporate Fiduciary Act vests the Respondent with certain discretionary acts throughout the statute. Similarly, on the national level, a number of courts have refused to hold a regulatory agency liable for the performance of its discretionary duties in the examination of banking institutions. *FDIC v. Irwin*, 916 F.2d 1051 (5th Cir. 1990), *In Re Franklin National Bank Securities Litigation*, 478 F. Supp. 210 (E.D.N.Y. 1979).

Since the acts complained of are discretionary in nature, in order to answer the question of whether the Respondent violated its statutory duties we must examine whether the Respondent was willful or malicious in acting or failing to act. This requires an examination of the facts and a determination on what the Respondent knew and when. The Respondent was aware of the following:

1. On Dec. 4, 1990, Intrust entered into an escrow agreement with Intercounty Title. The agreement obligated Intercounty to deposit funds into an escrow account at LaSalle National Bank.
2. Intrust retained no direct control over the escrow account. Intrust was not a signatory on the escrow account.
3. The principal registered officers and directors of Intrust were also the principal registered officers and directors of Intercounty.
4. In the 1991 examination report, OBRE commented that the trust accounts were out of balance and short by over \$400,000.00. The accounts were reconciled.
5. In the 1994 examination report, OBRE commented that commingling trust assets

with that of an affiliate violates common trust principals and that management should separate its accounts. Intrust disagreed with the comments.

6. In the 1995 examination report, OBRE commented that Intrust's escrow account is in the name of Intercounty, that Intrust does not receive statements directly from the bank but relies on Intercounty spreadsheets, which results in comingling of funds, and that Intrust made two large capital loans to Intercounty without a valid contract and without obtaining credit information on the debtor and without an inspection or appraisal of any collateral.

7. In the 1996 examination report, OBRE commented that Intrust has been commingling trust assets with affiliate's assets.

8. In the 1997 examination report, OBRE commented Intrust's regular business practices constituted a patent weakness in account administration and violated the company's basic fiduciary duty to safely control the depositors' funds.

9. In the 1998 examination report, OBRE commented that an independent audit of Intrust's financial statements was qualified in that no independent verification of trust cash was permitted by the company; that the escrow agreement with Intercounty represented a major conflict of interest; and that the situation needs to be monitored and steps taken to insure funds are under Intrust's control; and that it was difficult to get information on the arrangement and an actual bank statement was not received, only a photocopy.

10. Some time prior to Aug. 3, 1999, OBRE requested verification from Intrust that it had been added to the trust account, that no withdrawals could be made without Intrust authority, account documentation directly from the bank and the Intercounty repurchase agreement.

11. On Aug. 10, 1999, by letter, OBRE informed Intrust it needed to take immediate corrective action regarding the escrow account.

12. On Aug. 24, 1999, OBRE received verbal assurances the issues would be addressed at the Intrust board meeting on that day.
13. On Sept. 15, 1999, OBRE issued a Corrective Action Order, requiring Intrust to terminate the escrow agreement with Intercounty, to take control of the trust assets and properly account for the trust assets.
14. On Oct. 7, 1999, by letter, OBRE again requested that Intrust comply with the Corrective Order.
15. On Oct. 12, 1999, Intrust informed OBRE the matter would be taken care of in a couple of days.
16. On Oct. 15 and 19, 1999, OBRE contacted Intrust about the escrow account.
17. On Oct. 20, 1999, OBRE sent an examiner to Intrust to investigate the escrow situation.
18. On Nov. 9, 1999, OBRE examiners attended an Intrust Board meeting and were told the matter would be taken care of by Nov. 19, 1999.
19. In Jan. 2000, Intrust provided bank statements showing totals matching Intrust totals for the trust account.
20. On Jan. 19, 2000, OBRE became aware that Intrust had not complied with the Order.
21. On Feb. 7, 2000, OBRE subpoenaed account verification from the bank. This was a practice that had never been done before.
22. On Feb. 10, 2000, Intrust gave OBRE signature cards for accounts with only Intrust employees.
23. On Mar. 1, 2000, OBRE issued an Order stating that Intrust's practices and

condition pose a threat to their ability to safely operate; that Intrust fully comply with the Corrective Order in 10 days, increase capital to cover the escrow assets, recover the money in escrow from Intercounty, file a bond claim, cease placing money in the escrow, and remove any Intercounty affiliated person from all Intrust account authority.

24. In April 2000, OBRE took possession of Intrust and appointed a receiver.

An examination is not an audit. The purpose of the examination is to gather information to rate the institution under the Uniform Inter-Agency Trust Rating system. The examiner relies upon information provided by the institution. And in this case, examiners were misled. Mr. Capriotti admitted he conspired to defraud Intrust and concealed and provided false statements in furtherance of his acts, including false statements showing a valid trust account balance as of May 31, 1997, and May 31, 1998. Although comments were made concerning the trust account, each year Intrust received a passing component rating. OBRE did not have a formal procedure for what to do when a potential issue arises during an audit. It is left to the discretion of the examiner as to when an issue may be unsafe and "taken up" to the next level.

OBRE did not violate its statutory duty up to September 1999 when the Corrective Action Order was entered. We next examine the time period between September 1999 and when a receiver was appointed in April 2000, some 7 months later. After the CAO was entered and up until the time a receiver was appointed, OBRE was going back and forth with Intrust attempting to obtain compliance with the Order. During that period of time and in January of 2000, OBRE was provided with bank statements showing a valid account balance. It was not until February 2000, when OBRE, with an action outside of its regular practices, issued a subpoena upon the bank. OBRE was unsure of the process and not certain that the federal bank would even honor the subpoena. However, the records were obtained and in March 2000, OBRE issued an Order

of the Commissioner requiring Intrust, among other items, to fully comply with the CAO, increase capital, recover funds in escrow from Intercounty, and remove any Intercounty affiliated person from the account. In April 2000, a receiver was appointed. We find OBRE did not violate its statutory duty between September 1999 and April 2000.

Here, OBRE under its statutory grant of authority examined the corporate fiduciary. OBRE identified issues with the trust account and partially because of the criminal and fraudulent misrepresentations made, OBRE, in good faith, took the actions identified. The decision as to what actions to take was discretionary. There is no proof of any willful or malicious conduct on the part of OBRE. We follow the line of cases that have refused to hold regulatory agencies liable for allegedly negligently performing discretionary functions. We find that the Claimants have failed to establish that the Respondent had a duty to the account holders. Therefore, OBRE did not have a duty to the account holders and further, even if a duty could be assumed, the discretion accorded would lead to the conclusion that OBRE did not breach its duty.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that based on the foregoing, the claims of the Claimants are hereby denied.

(No. 07-CC-2904 – Claim awarded)

MJC CONSTRUCTORS INC., Claimant, v. STATE OF ILLINOIS, DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION, Respondent.

Contract, Changed Conditions- Changed conditions in contract law entitle a contractor to additional compensation under the contract for extra work performed. The condition of the two ponds were different than depicted on the contract drawings. A substantial amount of fill was required to meet the planned grades to achieve drainage. The ponds conditions were materially different than those contemplated by the Contract and constituted a changed condition.

Contract, Implied warrant- The "Spearin Doctrine" sets forth that an owner in a construction situation necessarily impliedly warrants that the plans and specifications are possible to perform, are adequate for performance and free from defects.

Contract, Damages- The State, as owner of the property, is required to reimburse a contractor who incurs additional costs due to faulty plans or specifications they provide the contractor to use in performing the contract.

Contract, Sufficient funds- The Court cannot enter an award unless sufficient funds remain unexpended in the appropriation made to fund the project. The Court's policy in breach of contract claims is to limit awards so as not to exceed the amount of funds, appropriated and lapsed, with which payment could have been made.

OPINION

Storino, J.

Claimant, MJC Constructors, Inc., (MJC) brings this action against the State of Illinois, Department of Transportation - Division of Aeronautics (IDOT), Respondent, alleging breach of contract and seeks monetary damages, plus interest and costs of suit. This Court has jurisdiction pursuant to 705 ILCS 505/8.

Procedural History

MJC filed its Complaint on March 28, 2007, attaching a copy of the Construction

Contract and Bond.

Respondent filed its Answer on May 29, 2007, denying generally the allegations in MJC's Complaint and setting forth affirmative defenses: a) MJC failed to timely complete the work as provided by Contract plus extension time; b) MJC completed its work 123 days after the allowable time; and c) Respondent is entitled to damages as provided by Contract for the failure to timely complete the work. Respondent seeks a reduction of any judgment that is rendered by a set-off amount that is attributable to MJC's breach of contract.

Final hearing was conducted October 22 and 23, 2008, before the assigned commissioner.

Facts

Claimant MJC was awarded Construction Contract No. 3501 (SC602) (the Contract) by IDOT on October 4, 2005, for all work to be performed on the Sedimentation Basin Conversion Project (the project) located at MidAmerica Airport in St. Clair County, Illinois. The three sedimentation basins (also referred to as ponds), designated as Basin No. 178 (pond 1), Basin No. 169 (pond 2) and Basin No. 145 (pond 3) were to be drained and reconstructed so as not to retain water. Generally speaking, the goal was to eliminate standing water near the runways so that birds and other wildlife would not be attracted to the area creating a safety hazard for air traffic. Pond 1 drained according to plan and is not at issue here. Ponds 2 and 3 did not drain as anticipated and are the center of this dispute.

The Contract

The required completion date under the terms of the Contract was sixty calendar days from the date of commencement of work. Specifically, the Contract provided that work shall be commenced within ten days after the Notice to Proceed (NTP) was issued. The NTP was issued by IDOT on October 31, 2005. MJC sent a Construction Start Date letter to IDOT advising that

it began work on November 2, 2005. Accordingly, the initial required completion date was calculated to be January 2, 2006, and an agreed damage figure of \$550 per day for each day beyond sixty days is provided by the Contract terms. MJC issued its notice of substantial completion to IDOT on November 3, 2006.

The Contract provided that MJC shall furnish the materials for and perform all the work in connection with the "sedimentation basin conversion" in the referenced project for the Contract price of \$303,000.00, based upon: the unit bid prices submitted on estimated quantities, in strict accordance with listed provisions and employment practices; the Schedule of Prices attached; the June 10, 2005, plan drawings prepared for IDOT by Earth Tech, Inc. (Earth Tech) for the project; and the IDOT Standard Specifications for Construction of Airports dated January 1985, incorporated by reference into the Contract.

The parties agree that the Contract consists of the original Contract, the plan drawings dated June 10, 2005, the Proposal, Change Orders 1 and 2, and the Standard Specifications for Construction of Airports. The parties do not agree that Change Order 3 is part of the Contract at issue because it seeks to assess the disputed liquidated damages at issue here.

The Letters

Although the parties disagree about the proper course of action, they do agree that the project stood idle for several months and ponds 2 and 3 did not drain. In late December 2005, MJC sought clear direction from Earth Tech regarding material unsuitable for grading to the tolerances as provided by plan on ponds 2 and 3, along with a few other concerns about disposal and equipment necessitated by conditions different than planned. Earth Tech told MJC the grading would be adequate if no ponding occurred, even if tolerances are exceeded.

On January 11, 2006, MJC wrote Earth Tech that it needed the Resident Engineer to

locate and reference the centerline of survey and noted that MJC has been delayed by the lack of this layout since December 28, 2005. MJC further acknowledged Earth Tech's position that the work would be deemed acceptable if positive drainage is maintained. Further, MJC sets out the conditions of materials and elevations different than those that could have been determined prior to the bid and agreed to grade ponds 2 and 3, accordingly.

Thereafter, inclement weather rendered the site conditions unsuitable for work according to MJC and, in particular, the haul road to be used for access to the ponds could not be constructed. On February 7, 2006, MJC requested a Contract modification to allow for a solid base haul road to provide site access. MJC requested and attended a meeting to discuss accessibility on February 27, 2006. Thereafter, letters were exchanged disputing everything from the weather to drainage methods, grading and security clearances.

Mother Nature then contributed to the drainage problem with abundant rainfall during early 2006. Site conditions were saturated from December 2005, through March 2006. By March 27, 2006, MJC was still seeking clear direction from Earth Tech on how to proceed and had previously suggested a conference to air differences. On March 28, 2006, Earth Tech sent a non-responsive letter that says, in essence, you already have our answer. Earth Tech acknowledged the saturated condition of the ponds and the haul road on that date. On April 3, 2006, MJC wrote Earth Tech summarizing the work shutdown period on critical items since November 28, 2005, and predicted that period would extend well into the spring and possibly summer.

On May 9, 2006, MJC advised Earth Tech that 1) the pond excavations were complete to the best of their abilities given the site conditions 2) requested confirmation that the ponds were acceptable for seeding and erosion blanket, and 3) the haul route would be completed at the first

opportunity allowed by weather. An e-mail correspondence on May 18, 2006, to Earth Tech from MJC advised that the haul route was still too wet and made the same request for Earth Tech to review the site.

In response, on May 19, 2006, Earth Tech directed MJC to drain ponds 2 and 3 by whatever means MJC decided was necessary with the goal of getting water to flow through. Earth Tech advised MJC that draining and discing those ponds would expedite drying and allow final grading to Contract specifications as discussed at the April 18, 2006, site meeting.

On May 24, 2006, MJC documented in a letter to Earth Tech that the site was still too wet to work on the haul route, and reiterated that ponds 2 and 3 had vastly different material than pond 1 at the bottom. The letter stated that as such, ponds 2 and 3 do not allow for excavation to a sound bottom and prohibit access by the equipment to cut and fill to the lines and grades on the plan drawings.

On May 31, 2006, MJC made a formal notice of claim for additional compensation and requested an extension of time due to conditions other than those provided in the Contract, i.e., the bottoms of the ponds at issue are lower than indicated on the plan drawings and the contours of those ponds are also different than those depicted on the contour sheets in the plan drawings. In short, MJC asserted that pockets of water and unsuitable materials below the design elevations require excavation and drainage not anticipated at the time of the bid.

On June 9, 2006, Earth Tech wrote MJC (received June 13, 2006) regarding the same, now stale, disputes and claimed that it would consider recommending the exclusion of unworkable days from the Contract period during inclement weather and items out of MJC's control, if MJC details its justification for each day. Earth Tech directed MJC to return to work by June 26, 2006, or be considered as failing to respond. On June 27, 2006, MJC wrote Earth

Tech confirming that MJC agreed to return to the site under protest, as well as track and complete the additional work and submit an equitable adjustment of the Contract. Disputes remain at the time of completion on ponds 2 and 3 as well as the necessity of the haul road.

The Ponds

Standing water remained in some areas of pond 3 in April 2006. On April 18, 2006, MJC informed Earth Tech that the basin elevation in pond 3 was lower than represented in the plan drawings preventing completion of work and a site meeting was held. This meeting confirmed MJC's position since December 2005, that the lack of drainage rendered the area unworkable and lower than depicted in the Contract.

On June 26, 2006, MJC wrote Earth Tech confirming that permission had been given by Earth Tech to allow MJC to cut a drainage ditch through the berms, so long as MJC fills in and re-establishes compaction to the berms' current condition. Also confirmed was MJC's reservation of rights for additional costs incurred to complete the work. On June 27, 2006, Earth Tech directed MJC to perform the work, claimed as additional work by MJC, under threat of termination.

MJC breached the berm on pond 3 on June 29, 2006, so that excavation and grading could be completed. The parties had not anticipated this method of drainage in its Contract and do not agree that the actual elevation was substantially different than the plan drawings on pond 3. According to MJC, the previously requested survey information from Earth Tech received on July 12, 2006, illustrates material differences than existing conditions represented in the Contract; in particular, the existing grades in pond 3 were eighteen inches lower than represented in the Contract. As a result, pond 3 did not drain through the discharge structure as planned during bidding.

Ultimately, after the berm was breached in pond 3, it was regraded to adjusted grades by the field representative to eliminate ponding by filling in the area, instead of excavating one foot as originally called for in the Contract. MJC claims that it incurred an additional \$13,803.57, in costs to complete the work on pond 3 by breaching the berm and regrading the basin. On August 23, 2006, MJC submitted its proposal to Earth Tech with supporting documentation for work completed on pond 3.

On August 4, 2006, MJC again notified Earth Tech that the reconstruction work could not be performed according to the plan drawings for pond 2 because the conditions were materially different than represented in the Contract. After breaching the berm two and one-half feet lower than the drainage structure, the contours were as much as two feet lower in places than the Contract indicated. This necessitated importing material to attain the final grades contained in the Contract. Alternatively, a new outfall pipe could be installed at an elevation low enough to insure drainage but the existing materials could not be prepared for seeding and blanket work. MJC's suggestions in this regard had been presented to Earth Tech's field representative but were summarily dismissed.

MJC received a letter dated August 14, 2006, from Earth Tech requesting a proposal to lower the flow by installation of a new drainage pipe without providing necessary details. In response, MJC submitted additional questions on August 17, 2006, regarding the specifications for the new drain pipe, grades and elevations, as well as existing soils and backfill for pond 2.

On August 22, 2006, MJC submitted a proposal, included with its proposal for corrections to pond 3, for a new discharge pipe installation for pond 2. On September 1, 2006, MJC re-submitted a proposal separately for pond 2 in the amount of \$12,526.00, clarifying the scope of work and terms for the new discharge pipe, excluding investigative costs incurred to

identify the problems. On October 11, 2006, MJC submitted yet another proposal on pond 2 in the amount of \$23,989.00. This proposal included a 30 day extension. Work on pond 2 was idle from August 4, 2006, through September 7, 2006, at which time MJC received Earth Tech's approval to perform work now known as Change Order 2. MJC completed the grading work on pond 2 on October 6, 2006, but the weather did not allow for immediate seeding.

Completion

Ultimately, Earth Tech sent a non-compliance letter to MJC dated October 23, 2006, demanding corrective action within ten days by providing a written plan for the completion of the Contract and threatening default. MJC provided its written plan on October 26, 2006, addressing the outstanding work for seeding (3 to 4 days work) and removal of the silt fence after seventy-five percent growth (2 days work). Because Earth Tech would not discuss the contents of its non-compliance letter with MJC, the written plan was prepared based upon MJC's own assessment of the project and invited changes or corrections within two days.

On November 3, 2006, MJC notified Earth Tech of substantial completion and requested a final inspection. Earth Tech notified IDOT on November 13, 2006, of the substantial completion date. On November 20, 2006, Earth Tech requested MJC to provide its requested time extension justifying the accumulation of each calendar day beyond the sixty calendar days approved.

Damages Claimed

MJC alleges that IDOT has failed to pay a remaining principal balance due of \$67,330.07, pursuant to Contract and, further, failed to pay \$13,803.57, as the value for the supervision, labor, material and equipment, including overhead and profit for extra work performed by MJC on pond 3. MJC also alleges that it is due \$23,989.00 for extra work

performed as directed by IDOT. Finally, MJC alleges that it performed extra work on the project haul road at the direction of IDOT valued at \$9,790.43. The total amount MJC claims due and owing for all Contract work, including extra work on pond 2, pond 3 and the project haul road is \$110,275.07. MJC contends that the liquidated damages clause in the Contract is invalid and unenforceable.

Respondent claims that it does not owe the amount claimed and, further, that the appropriate calculation of liquidated damages to be used as a set-off against any monies owed under the Contract is \$550 per day, pursuant to the Proposal at page 2, for 123 days of unexcused delay.

Summary of Relevant Testimony

Cornell Meyer (Meyer), President and CEO of MJC at all relevant times, testified as follows: He has been in the construction industry since 1975 performing contracts of varied sizes. At the time of this Contract, MJC had sufficient capacity and experience to perform what should have been a relatively simple project. Meyer identified the plan drawings and described his course of action to drain the ponds. He was assured by Jim Anderson with the Division of Aeronautics that the Contract time was not an issue recognizing that the seeding, mulching and fertilizing could not be performed in the winter.

In bidding the Contract, Meyer relied on the information from the owner that the Contract documents were accurate and complete. Initial plans provided temporary measures to control sediment runoff and silt erosion in anticipation of drainage flow when the plug was pulled on the ponds. MJC mobilized its equipment on November 2, 2005, and demobilized in April 2006. Pond 1 drained, the bottom was relatively stable and it was put to grade. In one of the ponds, they expected a problem in two smaller areas which would require a pump to drain. No problem

was anticipated in the other pond, according to the plan drawings.

MJC began draining and grading even though Earth Tech did not perform the survey work establishing center line control points for staking of the project until January 2006. Two of the ponds did not drain as anticipated. In response, MJC proposed that the area be overexcavated, then filled instead of cut as required in the Contract at extra cost. Meyer testified that MJC could not get Earth Tech to address the problem and then unfavorable weather conditions set in. As the project sat idle for the next few months, MJC continued to monitor the site, remained mobilized and felt comfortable that time was not an issue. No one from IDOT or Earth Tech was complaining that the project was not completed nor threatening liquidated damages, even though the project was now outside the sixty day period.

Meyer scheduled a meeting with IDOT, Division of Aeronautics, and its representatives in February to address the outstanding issues but that meeting was unsuccessful. Meyer did not ask for a time extension on the Contract at any time, relying upon earlier representations by Jim Anderson, that time was not an issue. Earth Tech's letter to Meyer dated March 9, 2006, was the first mention to Meyer that the project was overdue.

The haul route did not have a complete design. It did not provide drainage for the low areas on the haul route and Earth Tech would not address that issue either. Ultimately, MJC waited for the haul road area to dry up in summer and they installed stone in areas that had flooded.

In late March 2006, MJC was still seeking direction from Earth Tech on how to handle the soft and yielding materials, i.e., whether they should use fill from the edge of the site or go off-site. Because this was a change not contemplated in the Contract, MJC could not make a unilateral decision. Earth Tech suggested a meeting at the work site would not be productive

due to the saturated conditions. Excavation work had been completed and MJC demobilized in April 2006, because it was clear that material did not need to be hauled out due to the grades lower than the Contract plan.

MJC's letter dated May 31, 2006, to Earth Tech put them on notice that MJC was incurring additional costs and that Earth Tech's failure to address the issues presented had prevented MJC from performance under the Contract. Meyer explained that no work had been performed since April 28, 2006, because MJC was still waiting for the ponds to drain or direction on how to handle the conditions where the grades were too low. No one had replied to MJC's suggestion of overexcavating and backfilling or otherwise address the problems presented. MJC then proposed to Earth Tech, on June 20, 2006, a cut through the existing levies on the two problematic ponds. This work was considered extra work because it would have been unnecessary if the grades were as represented on the Contract drawings. This type of change in design, lowering grades and breaching berms, is something that must be authorized.

Meyer testified further that Earth Tech accepted MJC's proposal, the change work was performed and it took another month to drain the ponds to dry out the soil. When the pond drained, the elevations were determined to be one and one-half to two feet lower over about 80% of the pond than what the Contract drawings represented. Excavation was never needed in the areas where the grades were lower than represented. Once clearing and grubbing was complete, it was apparent that fill material would be needed to build up the bottom and reach final grade requirements of the Contract.

Earth Tech claimed the grades were lower due to earlier excavation by MJC. Meyer denied that was possible because excavation could not be performed until the pond was drained and all work done after drainage was just clearing and grubbing. Additional direction was

needed to complete the project and ultimately MJC was instructed to leave the bottom materials in place.

Meyer calculated the pond 2 design changes and submitted a claim for \$23,989.00. Regarding pond 3, MJC was told to file a claim which it did in the amount of \$13,803.57. No one challenged any of the costs or supporting documents submitted by MJC.

Significantly, MJC received a default notice on October 23, 2006, from IDOT (and copied to their bonding company) at a time when the only remaining work was three to four days of light duty seeding work. A default notice on MJC's record was a very serious matter that directly impacted their ability to obtain additional work. When MJC attempted to contact Earth Tech after receiving the default notice, MJC was told by Tom Goode at Earth Tech that the Division of Aeronautics instructed him not to talk to MJC.

The project was substantially complete for its design purpose in September 2006. On November 3, 2006, MJC advised that the project was 100% complete including the seeding work.

Regarding damages, Meyer testified that MJC and IDOT differed on certain pay items such as quantities for excavation work, seeding work, and clearing and grubbing. MJC incurred additional costs to drain and regrade the haul road. Meyer also testified that Nollau, the seeding contractor, is entitled through MJC to recover on the claim he submitted because the haul roads are specified on the Contract drawings as having areas of soil disturbance included for payment under the seeding clause. Meyer believes that IDOT's position is that the seeding near the haul road is incidental to the Contract despite contrary language in the Contract.

MJC submitted a request for a time extension detailing the delays caused by weather, lack of direction and approval for changes, and additional work required because of the change

in conditions. The calendar submitted by Meyer marking the days that MJC was able to work on the critical path indicated a total of 68 days. Meyer testified that he believes that he should receive the time extension through the end of the project and no liquidated damages should be assessed.

Upon cross-examination, Meyer testified that he believes each and every item of the project has been completed, including punch list items given to him by IDOT such as silt fence, construction debris and contractor's lock removal. He testified as to his awareness of a lawsuit in St. Clair County claiming that MJC owes Nollau approximately \$30,000 for work on this project. Meyer admitted that MJC wrote a letter on February 7, 2006, claiming access to the site was the problem, rather than basin conditions. Meyer also admitted that at the beginning of the project, MJC was looking for the machine to put the rock down on the haul road. Meyer denied that incompleteness of the haul road until the summer of 2006 delayed the project and, instead, Meyer claimed that MJC used the haul road anyway for their equipment and that all of the excavation work was done without the haul road completion.

Meyer denied threatening Tom Goode at the meeting in Springfield with IDOT Aeronautics. Meyer admitted that there were several new plans that contemplated earlier completion dates which were not met. Meyer quoted four reasons for delays: 1) weather; 2) extremely wet soil after draining; 3) changes to the work caused by conditions materially different than the Contract documents represented; and 4) the award of the Contract at a time when it was impossible to perform the work inside of sixty calendar days. Meyer was unaware of being given an option to wait until spring to start the Contract. Security clearances and a permit acquisition initially held up issuance of the Notice to Proceed, according to Meyer. The airport was not busy so Meyer did not believe that MJC's presence was a problem, despite the

necessity for ingress and egress clearance.

Meyer clarified that 90% of the sedimentation in pond 2 did not have to be excavated. He believed that an accurate quantity was difficult to determine and Meyer's best guess was based on the volume change. Meyer observed MJC employees shooting grades in the field and also observed the cross-sections supplied. The only excavation was clearing and grubbing of materials that stayed in the basin on top of the sediment for incorporation into the final grade.

The two berms breached for draining ponds 2 and 3 were changes to the Contract, in Meyer's opinion, and qualified for additional remuneration. Meyer agreed that he considered the berm cuts beyond the scope of the original Contract and understood that Earth Tech considered those cuts to be within the scope of the Contract. Meyer believed that the Contract drawings show reasonably what they could anticipate on how the project could perform but, because conditions were different than what was represented on the drawings, the drainage did not perform as anticipated. The only specified method of drainage in the Contract was to remove the portion of the outlet structures so the blockage would be removed. Methods for excavation were not specified in the Contract. To estimate the amount of soil excavated, Meyer testified that MJC verified the volume change calculations from the cross-sections that implied over 15,000 yards and used load counts to reach an estimate. However, Meyer maintains that MJC did not touch 90% of pond 2 for excavation.

Regarding the sixty calendar day completion requirement, Meyer testified that the calculation of time must consider changes and weather, versus critical path work, and points out that the Contract also required that work get started by September 16, 2005. The work actually started November 2, 2005, and work was performed through December 2005. Critical path work could not be resumed until September 2006.

The two maps used for reference during trial were drawn by MJC's engineer, Brian Marks, based on information contained in the Contract drawings and field shots. Meyer admitted that he is not a registered engineer by education and his testimony was based on experience. In his opinion, some shrinkage in the bottom of the ponds would occur from drainage and swelling may occur for a short period of time when it rained.

On re-direct, Meyer testified that after the berm was cut on pond 2, and it was verified that the bottom of that pond was lower than indicated in the Contract documents, Earth Tech then asked for a proposal for cutting the berm, a new pipe installation, lowering the elevation below the outlet structure, and backfilling the berm. Although Earth Tech may not have agreed in June 2006, that cutting the berm in pond 2 was outside the scope of the Contract, Meyer believes that by August, Earth Tech seemed to agree with MJC which ultimately led to a change order.

Regarding the punch list, Meyer testified that there was no reference in the final closeout document from IDOT that there remained any punch list items open. Meyer also clarified his position that the haul road did not need to be rocked to complete the dirt work and, MJC used a grass haul road to access the site. Meyer also explained the requirement for the use of a rock paver which was ultimately waived. In his experience, IDOT specifies the use of a rock paver to minimize the amount of overage on the quantity of stone which is itemized as a unit price at IDOT's expense. This has nothing to do with the performance of the roadway and, instead, is a cost control measure. When stone application is quoted as a lump sum pay item, as it was here, the requirement for a rock paver could be waived because the quality, amount and application width of the stone is not a cost item to IDOT. In this case, IDOT asked for a \$250 credit to waive the rock paver and MJC agreed. By the time this agreement was reached, it was too far

into the winter months for work to continue.

A letter dated April 21, 2006, from MJC to Earth Tech assumed that nothing more could be done with respect to excavating and grading ponds 2 and 3 and requested permission to seed the pond basins, as is. That request was denied, so the schedule could not be met. Another schedule was proposed by MJC to Earth Tech on May 9, 2006, which was dependent upon approval of design changes given the site conditions, and that request was also denied rendering the proposed schedule impossible. Meyer testified this was another example of MJC trying to solve the problems presented by the changed site conditions. Meyer was firm that MJC was not "dragging its feet."

On re-cross examination, Meyer testified that IDOT was not giving them a solution, so he was proposing a schedule to just finish up seeding even though pond 2 still had water in its basin. Meyer was asked whether or not the change order included compensation for the berm cut, and he specifically referenced the acceptance of his proposal which allowed for a change to cut the channel, remove existing structure, install a new pipe and backfill. Meyer testified that change order 3 was an adjustment of pay quantities. He did not believe it to be part of the original agreement.

The Respondent called to testify Daniel Jason Trapp (Trapp), a professional civil engineer who worked for Earth Tech as the engineer of record on this project. At the time of his testimony Trapp was employed by St. Clair County, MidAmerica Airport. He testified that Earth Tech developed the original plans for the project at issue and had an employee on site during 95% of the work. Trapp testified that the one-foot contours on the maps provided as exhibits and part of the Contract drawings are accurate within one foot showing a very irregular contour on the surface of the basins. These were provided by a licensed surveyor prior to the start of the

project using boats and waders while water was present in the pond. Given the contours, Trapp believed the specifications would call for filling the areas with existing soils, not imported material. Step one would be draining the existing water by removing the perforated pipe in each of the basins. Based upon the drawings, Trapp estimated the approximately one-half of pond 2 would not drain based upon the contours represented. After the plug was pulled, he believed that the drainage looked similar to the contours represented, and expected the southern half of the pond to retain water. On pond 3, MJC used the same method of pulling the plug to remove water. The entire purpose of the project was to drain the ponds so that they did not attract wildlife in the area of the airport.

Trapp testified that, in the spirit of getting things done, they agreed to allow pond 2 to be graded at the same elevation with fine grading of any irregularities for drainage. A new drain was installed beneath the lowest elevation which allowed performance admittedly not at the elevations originally intended. Earth Tech calculated a quantity of excavation based upon the existing contours. The actual measured quantities were based upon another set of surveys after the plugs were pulled and most of the water had drained. A different surveyor than the one who did the existing contours took the cross sections. After the grading was complete, the second surveyor took final cross sections to calculate the final earth work quantities. Trapp testified that the general layout of the existing contours was not dramatically different than the proposed elevations.

Trapp did not recommend that the claim for extra work by MJC on pond 2 be paid. He also felt that MJC's claim for work to cut the berm for drainage on pond 3 was not extra work but, instead, was required as a part of the Contract with no changes in the scope of the work. Trapp has seen contractors use sumps to drain water and does not know whether MJC used a

sump for drainage because he was not on site every day.

The unique qualities of this project were within the airport security regulations, so the contractor's personnel did have security clearance and were required to maintain radio control with air traffic control. Trapp would have expected the haul road to be the first thing completed because it provided access to the site but the rock was not put in until the following summer. He believes that MJC used an area adjacent to the haul road for their work, even though that area was not intended for construction traffic. The haul road was excavated but rock was not timely placed so water could not drain. Trapp believes this was in violation of the Standard Specifications for Construction of Airports, incorporated into the Contract, which says the grade shall be maintained so that it will be well drained at all times. Trapp testified that MJC's letter of February 7, 2006, claiming that site access was delaying the project was written during the time frame when the haul route was dug, but no rock placed in it.

In his opinion, Trapp believed that the basin soils were not, as claimed by Meyer, "unsuitable." Earth Tech told MJC in letters, and verbally, that there was no problem with the suitability of the soils, but that the basins were wet and needed drainage, according to Trapp. On several occasions, Earth Tech told MJC that the ponded areas needed to be drained, keeping in mind the goal of water flow through the basins with no ponding.

Eventually, MJC was authorized to proceed with a change order to install the new outlet structure at the lower elevation and was paid \$12,526.00 for that installation. This included the berm cut with filling and replacing. However, Trapp did not consider this payment a concession that the berm cut was an addition or change to the Contract. Instead, the change order was issued in the spirit of cooperation. Trapp admitted that the lower elevation was a foot to a foot-and-a-half lower than the existing elevation which caused the final grades to be revised to a

lower point for the new structure.

Trapp explained his comments on the IDOT contractor's performance evaluation that MJC was confrontational, uncooperative and nonresponsive throughout the duration of the project. He cited instances of confrontational words, blocked communications and refusal to perform the Contract requirements such as rock placement on the haul road and drainage of the basins. Trapp believed that MJC just refused to complete the project and, ultimately, a default letter was issued.

The third and final change order included line item deductions or add-ons such as a one-and-a-half acre deduction from the Contract for clearing and grubbing unclassified excavations. In comparing the items, Trapp noted that there was roughly a twenty percent increase in the estimated cubic yards of unclassified excavation because the final grades did not match the proposed grades in the plans.

Regarding Contract time, Trapp testified that it took 367 calendar days to complete this project and MJC was given 184 calendar days of credit. According to Trapp, this project never went into a winter shutdown period. He referenced several daily reports citing workable conditions but no work by MJC. In addition, Trapp believed seven punch list items remained incomplete.

Earth Tech submitted amendments to its original consulting agreement for \$33,000.00, additional costs incurred due to the Contract overrun. On cross-examination, Trapp testified that the costs submitted in the amendments had nothing to do with design services and he did not know the exact amount that was charged by Earth Tech to IDOT. He also did not know whether IDOT should be required to pay for Earth Tech services of being on site during the same period of time MJC was given a time extension. Trapp claimed they did not specifically keep track of

time extension days separately because that was the intent of the liquidated damages. He was on-site during the beginning of the Contract during spring and summer and would make a site visit two to three times a week. Other Earth Tech personnel were responsible for being there on a daily basis. It would take approximately ten minutes to drive to the project site and about an hour total to gain access, check the site, do the paperwork and return. Trapp made no effort and was not asked to calculate the time Earth Tech charged IDOT for days where MJC did not work, but could have worked.

Trapp could not recall the exact date when Earth Tech actually approved the design change giving MJC notice to proceed but believes it was reasonably on or about September 7, 2006. Prior to that, work in that pond was not proceeding. Earth Tech's sample of daily field reports during August 2006, recorded that the site was workable but MJC was not working and did not reference that MJC was waiting on direction from Earth Tech.

When the berm was breached on pond 2 with Earth Tech's permission, Trapp did not consider it to be an extra to the Contract. He witnessed the rush of water as soon as the berm was breached and agreed that no materials were taken out of the basin after it dried. Instead, materials were moved within the basin for fine grading. Trapp agreed that the existing elevations were lower than the proposed elevations but contended that Earth Tech knew from the existing contours that the basin was lower than the outflow structure and that is why it did not drain. Trapp did not agree that the entire pond was a foot to two feet less than as indicated in the Contract documents. He believed the bottom half varied in existing contours and, eventually, Trapp agreed that to grade the bottom of pond 2, to the planned elevation, it would have required fill in the bottom part. Trapp testified that Earth Tech had as-built elevations which are the final cross sections used for quantity calculations.

In May 2005, Trapp used the Contract plans and the cross sections of the baseline established by survey to estimate cut and fill in the proposed project in the amounts of total cut, 3,828.38 cubic yards, and fill, 1,347.48 cubic yards. Trapp agreed that MJC's calculations for cut and fill were fairly close to these estimates. For pond 2, the final cut measurement was 5,988 cubic yards instead of the anticipated 3,828 cubic yards because the proposed grades were different than the final grades which were much lower.

Trapp did not agree that the design change needed to lower the outflow structure was because when the pond dried up, it was two feet lower than anticipated. Trapp testified that when it was dry, the pond was very similar to what was shown on the plans with tons of irregularities and holes which needed regrading to drain. Trapp did not realize MJC had used a sump pump in recognition of low areas that did not drain and would not admit that one of the assumptions made in allotting time for this Contract was how long it would take for initial drainage.

After cross-examination pertaining to a scratch sheet produced in discovery by Earth Tech estimating two days for dewatering of the project, Trapp claimed it was not his handwriting, and that he did not know if it pertained to this project or whether the estimation contemplated draining only the ponds at issue. He believed that dewatering could have included a sump pump, pulling the plugs or cutting temporary ditches. Trapp maintained that all the pond bottoms existed as were represented in the Contract documents. The MidAmerica St. Louis Airport Sedimentation Basin Maintenance Project workday estimate prepared by Earth Tech as a preliminary work-up included two days for dewatering of all basins and partial demolition of existing outflow structures. The estimate for dewatering did not reference breaching a berm and Trapp agreed that Earth Tech would certainly request permission for doing so.

Regarding Change Order 2, Trapp testified that it would not have been fair to approve a new pipe and not approve payment for cutting the ditch. According to Trapp, MJC refused to place the final grades as shown on the plans so an additional outflow structure was necessary. However, Trapp admitted that in order for MJC to place the grades on pond 2, to the planned elevation, it would have required a couple thousand yards of fill.

Trapp believed the Contract contained terms that allow for MJC to elect a winter shutdown for a reasonable amount of time and Earth Tech recommended they do so. Since MJC returned to work in April 2006, it could have shut down for six months beginning in November 2005, through April 2006, without incurring any additional calendar days on the Contract.

After extensive questioning on excavation from pond 2, Trapp would not concede that the large cut overrun was because the bottom was lower than planned. He believed the amount shown on the final survey results was excavated by MJC from pond 2 despite the fact that MJC demobilized at the end of April 2006, and the records show no excavation had gone on in pond 2 since that time.

The punch list was not sent to MJC after December 2006, because, according to Trapp, the list had been made clear before that time and nobody had responded. Trapp did not recall any clearing or grubbing in pond 2 after the berm was breached. At the time of the default letter threatening termination of MJC, there was not a lot of work to be done, and Trapp believed the Contract was not substantially complete at that time because three days of seeding work was pretty significant.

Trapp agreed that the haul road should have conformed to the contours of the land and the contractor was not allowed to raise or lower areas. He believed that if the rock had been placed down, the road would have held up, even in the low areas underwater. The seeding for

the haul road was included in the lump sum payment, according to Trapp, and there was no Contract clause that would allow seeding as a separate pay item. He believed seeding and mulch would be required for the construction of the haul road because the Contract required any areas disturbed by activities related to the project shall be returned to the original condition. This work was considered incidental to the Contract.

Earth Tech did have as-built drawings for the ponds done and Trapp knew the location of those drawings but they were not produced in connection with the lawsuit. When questioned about the survey initially performed on these ponds, Trapp testified that he did not watch the surveyors and does not know their specific methods but he believed them to be licensed surveyors who accurately represented the existing contours of the ponds.

Respondent next called to testify Michael F. Wilhelm (Wilhelm) who works for IDOT as the section chief of construction and materials at the Illinois Division of Aeronautics. The Division of Aeronautics functions as the agent of the airport using an agency-inparticipation agreement. He is familiar with the Contract at issue and the liquidated damages component at \$550 per day as well as MidAmerica Airport. Wilhelm believed the airport was financially impacted by its safety concerns and project overruns requiring engineering personnel to be out in the field. IDOT also incurred added costs on this project such as monitoring the work not performed yet and closing out the grant. The extra time involved is not calculated because there is no physical way to keep track of other entities.

On cross-examination, Wilhelm testified that ninety-five percent of the liquidated damages would go to the federal government, FAA, and two-and-a-half percent would go back to the state and two-and-a-half percent would go to the local sponsor, the airport. He admitted that IDOT would have precise billings from Earth Tech on the 116 days not excused for delay

and could calculate to the penny how much Earth Tech charged for its services. He admitted that such calculation had not been done.

Wilhelm's information on the project came from Earth Tech representatives and what he witnessed at the site. He believed that MJC refused to place fill in pond 2 as required by the Contract and disapproved the extra requested by MJC to do so. In the spirit of cooperation, they did approve a different type of extra to solve the problem in pond 2, in an effort to get the work complete and the uncooperative contractor out of the site. Wilhelm was involved with the project by information received from their consultant, Earth Tech, and having visited the site one time and at the final inspection. He was present at the Springfield meeting and considered Meyer to be belligerent and threatening.

On rebuttal, Meyer testified that MJC is a foreign corporation and was in good standing in Missouri. After learning that MJC's certificate in Illinois had expired, he renewed the certificate in Illinois on that date. With regard to pond 2, Meyer testified that MJC had been proposing all along to bring in materials to meet the planned elevations. However, the grades had dropped out of the pond when it was drained. The disconnect for Earth Tech and IDOT is that, instead of 2,000 yards of fill, it would require 4,000 yards of fill to balance the grade. MJC requested, as an extra to the Contract, the additional fill to bring the pond up to final grades according to plan. This request was interpreted by Earth Tech and IDOT to be a refusal. Meyer believed that after the pond drained out at the end of July, the bottom dropped out and that explained where the dirt went after the end of April. No excavation work was done in pond 2 after April 2006. This difference was illustrated on the color-coded computer interpretation created by comparing the original estimate by Earth Tech that called for taking out 1,800 to 2,000 yards of cut in the pond (which would have left enough dirt to balance the fill requirement

in the rest of the pond) with the revised interpretation based on actual grades.

To clarify MJC's efforts to drain the ponds, Meyer testified that MJC did use sump pumps on ponds 2 and 3 and cut trenches within the basin. He believed that breaching the berms was not contemplated by the Contract and permission was necessary before doing so. MJC's records show that the excavation equipment was removed from the job site on April 26, 2006, and no excavation work was done after that date, other than to breach two berms and refill. Meyer was unaware of any e-mail blocking as alleged by Earth Tech but is aware of problems with e-mail attachments.

The new outflow pipe was installed on pond 2 at a different elevation, and, without that change, the project could not have been completed in accordance with the Contract.

On cross-examination, Meyer testified that it would have been possible to make the final grades on pond 2 according to plan, if the State had been willing to pay for it. The color-coded computer interpretation was prepared using the Contract drawings and the final grades shot by MJC. Meyer testified that it is possible that the pond shrank or that the materials were never there in the first instance, making it impossible to determine an accurate excavation quantity.

Legal Analysis

Changed Conditions

The instant matter is a classic case of what is commonly referred to in contract law as "changed conditions" which entitles a contractor to additional compensation under the contract for extra work performed. *Kenny Construction Co. of Illinois, v. Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago*, 56 Ill. 2d 516; 309 N.E.2d 221 (1974). In this case, MJC reasonably relied on the Contract documents with the elevations given to assume that the basins would gravity drain once the plugs were pulled. In fact, documents used by Earth Tech to

prepare an estimate of Contract performance time assumed a two-day drainage. Pond 1 did gravity drain, exactly as predicted. Ponds 2 and 3 did not drain as anticipated when the drainage plug was pulled because, the bottom was actually different than depicted on the Contract drawings, in some areas, rendering the anticipated gravity drainage impossible. If the bottom was, indeed, as depicted on the Contract drawings, then those basins would have drained in a matter of a few days. They did not. Instead, ponds 2 and 3 required berms to be cut and an outflow structure to be installed two feet below the design elevation.

Earth Tech's position on pond 2 is that MJC must have excavated too much material. This argument is not supported by the facts. Clearly, MJC had performed approximately one-half of the planned cut in pond 2 and then demobilized its excavation equipment. No excavation was performed in pond 2 after April 2006, according to site reports. After the berm was cut, the pond drained and a final survey was taken, it was discovered that the actual bottom elevation on pond 2 was lower than the Contract drawings, explaining why gravity drainage did not work. Pond 3 also required a berm to be cut to achieve drainage.

The substantial amount of fill required to meet the planned grades is further evidence that the conditions were materially different than contemplated by the Contract.

Damages

This Court recognizes the "Spearin Doctrine" which sets forth that an owner "in a construction situation necessarily impliedly warrants that the plans and specifications are possible to perform, are adequate for performance and free from defects." *United States v. Spearin*, 248 U.S. 132 (1918); *Gust K. Newberg Const. Co. v. State*, 36 Ill. Ct.Cl. 93, 95-96 (1984). The government, as owner, is required to reimburse a contractor who incurs additional costs due to a faulty plan or specifications the government provides the contractor to perform the

contract. *See Oldenburg v. Hagemann*, 159 Ill. App.3d 631, 512 N.E.2d 718 (2d Dist. 1987).

Here, MJC had the right to rely, and did rely, on the accuracy of the Contract drawings to perform the Contract. According to the elevations represented, if the plugs were pulled on the ponds, gravity drainage would occur with the exception of two small areas in pond 2 that may have been lower than the plug. MJC anticipated that the bottoms may have been higher than represented because of sedimentation, but in no event did MJC expect the pond bottoms to be lower than depicted on the Contract drawings because there is no scour. This was a reasonable assumption confirmed by Earth Tech's pre-bid reports estimating two days for "dewatering of all basins ..." and anticipation of a rush of water once the plugs were pulled. Pond 1 drainage was further evidence that gravity drainage would be sufficient if the elevations were accurately represented.

Pond 2 would have required 4,000 cubic yards of fill to bring the grades to planned elevations and raise the bottom of the pond to level of the existing plug. IDOT elected the lesser expensive option and eventually chose to lower the plug and reshape the bottoms lower than the planned elevations. Since no excavation had been performed since April 2006, and MJC had only performed one-half of the anticipated cut, clearly the bottom of pond 2 was substantially lower than represented on the Contract drawings in at least one-half of the pond.

To compute the 123 day delay (\$67,650.00 in claimed liquidated damages), IDOT does not factor in its own delay in approving the design change necessitated by the basin conditions being different than represented in the Contract drawings. In the end, Change Order 2 for critical path work essential to the completion of the Project, i.e., installation of a new outfall pipe and grading below planned elevation in pond 2, was formally approved by Earth Tech in its letter of September 7, 2006. Design changes cannot be made by the contractor, MJC, so delays

up to that date should have been excused. The project was substantially complete by November 3, 2006, so liquidated damages cannot be assessed by IDOT for Contract delay.

Furthermore, the Court is not convinced that the liquidated damages provision at issue (\$550 per day) would have been enforceable as a "reasonable forecast of just compensation" nor is it convinced that actual damages would have been very difficult to determine. The amount withheld by IDOT would have functioned more as an impermissible penalty on these facts, since time was not of the essence and no analysis was undertaken to set an approximation of actual damages. In fact, IDOT could have proven to the penny how much it paid Earth Tech during the claimed delayed period, but failed to do so.

MJC also makes a damage claim for IDOT's failure to pay \$23,989.00, due for extra work on pond 2 and \$13,803.57, due for extra work on pond 3, for costs incurred as the consequences of defects in the Contract drawings. IDOT has not challenged the reasonableness or quantifications for those charges.

IDOT does challenge the extra costs incurred for MJC to raise the general elevation of the haul road. The Contract required MJC to put in a rock road on the existing contours of the land. However, the design did not address drainage problems on the road and, additional rock was required to meet Contract plans.

Respondent requests a set-off for \$33,000.00, in costs incurred for its Resident Engineer during the time period it alleges MJC delayed. Those costs were not proven by Respondent and, in any event, cannot be assessed against MJC when it was not the cause of the delay. Earth Tech acknowledged that during this time period, MJC was entitled to an extension. MJC is correct that it cannot be "charged," in the form of a setoff, for time spent by Earth Tech on a day for which MJC was given an extension. No set-off is warranted on these facts.

The issue of outstanding bills, if any, owed by MJC to Nollau, its subcontractor, is not before this Court.

CONCLUSION

For the forgoing reasons, this Court finds in favor of Claimant MJC Constructors, Inc., and against Respondent in the sum of \$110,275.07, which includes the release of \$67,650.00, withheld in liquidated damages. Claimant is denied interest and costs of suit as such damages are not recoverable. *See Tully v. State*, 47 Ill. Ct. Cl. 400, 404-405 (1994).

However, as is often the case, the question of entering an award remains before the Court. This Court cannot enter an award unless sufficient funds remain unexpended in the appropriation made to fund the project. *See Loewenburg/Fitch Partnership v. State*, 38 Ill. Ct. Cl. 227 (1986); *see also Ude, Inc. v. State*, 35 Ill. Ct. Cl. 384 (1982). There is no evidence in the record before the Court as to the amount of funds remaining from the project.

It is this Court's policy in breach of contract claims to limit awards so as not to exceed the amount of funds, appropriated and lapsed, with which payment could have been made. *James Cape & Sons Co. v. State*, 52 Ill. Ct. Cl. 322, 366 (2000). To do otherwise would be the same as granting a deficiency appropriation. *Id.* The appropriation of State funds is the constitutional prerogative of the Illinois General Assembly. It is the Court's duty to advise the General Assembly. *Thorlief Larsen and Son, Inc. v. State*, 42 Ill. Ct. Cl. 195 (1990); *J. F. Inc. v. State*, 41 Ill. Ct. Cl. 5 (1988); *Fru-Con Corp. v. State*, 50 Ill. Ct. Cl. 50 (1996). Therefore, before entering an award for the Claimant or making a recommendation to the General Assembly, we need additional information.

Accordingly, Respondent is ordered to file the fiscal data on this project, including the balance of the funds which lapsed at the conclusion of this project. Respondent shall file this

information with the Clerk of this Court within 21 days. Upon the Court's receipt of the fiscal information, the Court will enter its final order in this case.

Duty of Reasonable Care, Notice- The State is not the insurer of the safety of persons entering its premises, but it does owe a duty of reasonable care in maintaining its property. Claimant must establish by a preponderance of the evidence that Respondent breached its duty of reasonable care in maintaining its property, and that Respondent's negligence was the proximate cause of Claimant's injury. Claimant must also establish that the State had actual or constructive notice of the dangerous condition. IDOT did not receive any reports of an unfilled hole at, or near the subject location. Claimant did not establish that Respondent had notice of the defect, if any existed, therefore, his claim was denied.

ORDER

Kubasiak, J.

This matter comes before this court on the complaint of ROBERT SZENIAWSKI, Claimant, and against THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, Illinois Department of Transportation, Respondent, seeking damages for personal injuries and seeking damages in the amount of \$100,000.00.

The facts are as follows:

Claimant was simultaneously employed; full-time as a laborer by Keebler's Cookies and part-time for Catholic Charities as a seasonal laborer at the cemetery. Claimant testified that on April 12, 2002 at approximately 12:30 p.m. in the course of his employment, he was assigned to pick up debris along 111th street, approximately 150 feet east of Ridgeland Avenue. He stated that as he walked down the hill on the grassy area, approximately one foot from the 111th street curb, his foot went into a 6 inch hole. He continued to clean up the fence line and then about

2:15 p.m. he told his supervisor that he thought he had damaged his knee.

On April 15, 2002 Claimant visited his doctor, Anton Fakouri, M.D. of Midwest Orthopedic Consultants, S.C, and reported that he had injured his knee while working in a grassy area near the cemetery. The April 15, 2002 notes of Dr. Stephen Sokolski, D.O. of Advocate Christ Medical Center, also indicated Claimant's report of having twisted his knee while working at the cemetery. The medical records of the April 15, 2002 visit show that Claimant reported to his physician that his recovery from a prior injury had been progressing well until the week before when he lifted something heavy at work and his knee "gave out," causing him to fall. At trial, Claimant testified he was unable to recall that conversation.

At the time of the incident Claimant was 42 years old, 6 feet 6 inches tall, and approximately 300 pounds. Claimant's medical history included diabetes, non-healing wounds, staph infections, and problems with his right foot, left leg, and left knee. In June 2000, approximately two years before this incident Claimant underwent an MRI scan of his left knee, and another MRI in January 2001. Approximately 13 months prior to this incident Claimant underwent arthroscopic surgery on his left knee, but declined knee replacement because his doctor suggested that Claimant's then age of 42 years was too young for replacement. Claimant returned to work on March 4, 2002.

At trial, James Stumpner, Illinois Department of Transportation Bureau chief of maintenance testified that as the time of the incident he was Illinois Department of Transportation's South Area Operations Engineer, and that in that capacity he oversaw eight maintenance facilities including the area of the subject incident. Stumpner testified that the area in question was within the Illinois Department of Transportation right of way, and Respondent is responsible to mow the grass in the area. Stumpner testified that there was no sidewalk along

the area in question, and that it is not designated as a walkway for pedestrians.

Stumpner indicated that in 1997 IDOT had entered into a contract for curb replacement at the roadway adjacent to the incident site. Respondent was unable to produce a copy of the actual contract because it was destroyed pursuant to the records retention act. He acknowledged that the contractor's failure to back fill the area with dirt after removal of the wooden curb forms for concrete would create a hazard, but that he was not aware of any such failure, and that the contract resolution would not have been approved if the work had not been satisfactorily completed.

He further testified that between 1997 and 2002, IDOT would have mowed the subject area a minimum of three times per year between May and November, for a total of at least 15 cumulative mows. Maintenance workers are responsible to report any holes in the lawn, curb, or gutter areas, that may be discovered in the course of maintenance. Stumpner's review of the maintenance records indicated no report had been made by any IDOT employee or civilian. Stumpner testified that the first indication of the existence of a hole at the subject site was received by Claimant's Incident Report of Accident filed with IDOT on August 19, 2002. He stated that IDOT has been unable to locate the alleged hole to date, but further acknowledges that he had never personally visited the site.

The issue before this court is whether Respondent was negligent in maintaining its premises at 111th Street and Ridgeland Avenue. The law is well established that the state is not the insurer of the safety of persons entering its premises, however, it does owe a duty of reasonable care in maintaining its new property. Stewart vs. State (1995) 47 Ill. Ct. Cl. 324. In order for a Claimant to sustain his burden of proof, he must establish by a preponderance of the evidence that Respondent breached its duty of reasonable care in maintaining its property, and

that Respondent's negligence was the proximate cause of both Claimant's injuries and resulting damages. Noonan vs. State (1983) 36 Ill. Ct. Cl. 200. Further, Claimant must establish that Respondent had actual or constructive notice of the dangerous condition. Ewing vs. State (2007) 59 Ill. Ct. Cl. 302.

Claimant contends that the destroyed 1997 contract between IDOT and Ganna Construction for curb replacement at the incident site, represents key evidence to the claim. Claimant contends that a party's failure to produce evidence within his control and not equally available to an adverse party, gives rise to a presumption that the evidence would be unfavorable to him. Tepper vs. Campo (1948) 398 Ill. 496, 76 N.E. 2d 490. And further that an adverse presumption also arises from the deliberate destruction of evidence. R.J. Management vs. SRLB Development Corp. (2004) 346 Ill App 3d 957, 282. Ill. Dec. 486, 806 N.E. 2d 1074.

Claimant asks this court to assume that the 1997 contract for curb replacement required the contractor to back fill the area where the wooden fence forms were removed after the concrete was poured, and that the absence of the contract leads to a presumption that Claimant stepped into a hole caused by the removal of the wooden forms, and failure to backfill the hole with dirt.

The record established that the contract was destroyed in 2003 pursuant to the records retention act. Claimant casts suspicion on the missing document because it was destroyed in 2003 after Claimant's Report of Accident which was filed on August 19, 2002. But Claimant's argument urges the court to conclude that the missing contract is conclusive evidence of constructive notice that the subject hole was created by the removal of the wooden curing forms which were not properly filled with dirt. Claimant's argument is not reasonable. Even if the court assumes that the contract expressly provides that the contractor is required to backfill the

contraction site, there is no credible evidence that the requirement was not met. And, there is no reasonable evidence to support Claimant's contention that the contract was intentionally destroyed.

The subject site was maintained by IDOT employees at least 15 times between the time of construction and the date of incident, and yet no worker ever identified or reported any unfilled hole. No other person ever identified or reported an unfilled hole at, or near the subject location. Claimant has not established by a preponderance of the evidence that Respondent had actual or constructive notice of the defect, if any existed, and that failure precludes his claim against the state.

Based on the foregoing, Claimant's claim is hereby denied.

Breach of Employment Contract- Claimant was employed by Respondent as an Assistant Professor in the College of Liberal Arts (CoLA). CoLA Operating Papers called for teaching and scholarly research to be given a greater significance than service when assessing an applicant for tenure. Court found Respondent did not breach its promises contained in the CoLA Operating Papers with regard to the proper weight to be given the components for Claimant's tenure evaluation.

Breach of Employment Contract- Claimant's reliance on an invalid and unenforceable promise of full professors, as opposed to associate-level professors, on her review committee did not constitute a breach by Respondent with regard to her review committee staff qualifications.

Breach of Employment Contract- The Committee chairperson gave much thought to the proper composition of Claimant's review committee, conducted a thorough and objective review of all materials submitted by Claimant in her dossier, with rebuttal, and ultimately found Claimant's application for tenure and promotion should be denied. It is improper for the Court to substitute its judgment for that of Respondent.

Employment, Retaliatory Discharge- To substantiate a claim for retaliatory discharge, a claimant must show, by a preponderance of the evidence, that she was discharged in retaliation for her activities and such discharge violates a clear mandate of public policy in favor of reporting misconduct. Claimant failed to prove that she was discharged in retaliation for reporting alleged misconduct. Claimant's denial of promotion and tenure was based upon her failure to meet qualification standards.

OPINION

Storino, J.

Claimant, Nancy Dawson, brings this action against the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University (SIU), Respondent, alleging breach of employment contract and seeks

compensatory damages as well as declarative and injunctive relief. This Court has jurisdiction pursuant to 705ILCS 505/8.

Procedural History and Agreed Facts

Claimant was employed by Respondent as Assistant Professor in the College of Liberal Arts (CoLA), Black American Studies (BAS) program from August, 1995 until July 31, 2001, in a tenure-track position. A promotion and tenure vote against Claimant's application occurred on November 1, 2000. Claimant appealed the denial of her promotion and tenure to the Judicial Review Board (JRB). The JRB recommended a new committee for review of Claimant's promotion and tenure. Respondent did not follow the JRB recommendation.

On March 5, 2001, Respondent notified Claimant that she was denied promotion and tenure. As a result of the denial, Claimant became eligible for a one-year term contract in the same position. Instead, Claimant took a new job at a different university on July 31, 2001. Claimant was terminated from that subsequent position approximately four years later.

In the meantime, on October 22, 2001, Claimant filed charges against Respondent with the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) and the Illinois Department of Human Rights alleging discrimination and retaliation. Claimant received her right to sue letter from the EEOC on February 19, 2003.

Claimant filed her initial Complaint in this Court on July 2, 2003, and an Amended Complaint on December 4, 2006. On January 17, 2006, this Court denied Respondent's Motion for Summary Judgment. In its order denying summary judgment, this Court struck Claimant's request for injunctive relief that sought the formation of a new promotion and tenure review committee as beyond the power of this Court. *See Garimella v. The Board of Trustees of the*

University of Illinois, 50 Ill. Ct. Cl. 350 (1996). Accordingly, Claimant's cause of action was limited to the breach of contract claim for monetary relief.

Respondent filed its Answer to the First Amended Complaint on February 14, 2007, denying it breached the employment contract with Claimant.

A hearing was conducted April 15-18, 2008, before the assigned commissioner. At the hearing, the parties agreed that no motions or procedural issues were pending, including no exhaustion or timeliness issues.

Claims and Defenses

Claimant alleges breach of contract and asserts that the employment contract consists of the Employee Handbook, the 1995 BAS Operating Papers, and the 1999 CoLA Operating Papers.

Specifically, Claimant alleges the Respondent breached:

- 1) the Employee Handbook's promise of an objective and unbiased tenure and promotion review by including Father Joseph Brown, BAS Director, on her review committee and failing to allow Claimant to provide a corrected dossier for review; and
- 2) the 1995 BAS Operating Papers' promise of a promotion and tenure and review committee composed of five full professors by including Associate Professors Bean and Stockdale on her review committee; and
- 3) the 1999 CoLA Operating Papers' promise to consider with equal weight Claimant's professional service on the same level with teaching and research for promotion and tenure review.

Claimant also makes general allegations of retaliatory discharge for reporting her concerns of wrongful conduct by Father Brown. Claimant seeks an award of lost wages and

fringe benefits totaling \$175,481.48, and additional "back-pay" until such time Respondent constitutes a new review committee.

Respondent claims that only the Employment Handbook represents the employment contract with Claimant and denies that the 1995 BAS Operating Papers posed a contractual obligation. Respondent also maintains the employment contract with Claimant was not breached and denies allegations of discrimination or retaliation. Instead, Respondent asserts that she was denied promotion and tenure because she did not meet the standards of the Employee Handbook, BAS Operating Papers and CoLA Operating Papers (regardless of their non-binding status), by failing to follow clear standards for scholarly research and publication. Further, Respondent argues that Claimant was given a proper and unbiased promotion and tenure review. Respondent also asserts that Claimant failed to timely participate in the dossier preparation and that all materials submitted with the dossier were considered.

Summary of Relevant Testimony

Dr. Nancy Dawson

At the hearing, Claimant testified that she received her Humanistic Studies Doctorate from State University in New York in 1995 and was hired August of that year as Assistant Professor of Black American Studies in a tenure track position at SIU. During her first year of employment, she was given the BAS Operating Papers, the Employee Handbook and CoLA Operating Papers all containing guidelines for promotion and tenure. Claimant testified that she reviewed each of those documents around the time she received them.

In 1997, Claimant developed an African Culture Continuities (ACC) program and worked on that program until her departure in 2001. Father Brown supported the program initially and was familiar with her duties within the program. Claimant believes the ACC

program was popular and encompassed all three areas of her obligations as an Assistant Professor on tenure track, regarding research, teaching and service. She also believes Father Brown recognized the ACC program components of research, teaching and service.

At some point, Claimant's initial good relationship with Father Brown soured and eventually the office environment deteriorated into a "war zone." According to Claimant, Father Brown was angry with Claimant over student relations and jealous of her role in the BAS program. She believes he retaliated with budgetary restrictions and testified that tensions continued to escalate.

Claimant contacted others within SIU to voice her concerns about Father Brown's role on her upcoming promotion and tenure review. She believes Father Brown was biased against her and should not serve on her review committee. Claimant made her concerns about Father Brown known to Dr. Seymour Bryson, Associate Vice Chancellor for diversity, Dr. Shirley Clay Scott, then Dean of the College of Liberal Arts, and Lynn Connley, University ombudsperson. Claimant was told by Ms. Connley and Dr. Clay Scott that Father Brown had made complaints against her, yet, she was never confronted with those allegations made by Father Brown and no fact finding proceeding was conducted.

Dr. Clay Scott, after consultation with the Provost, advised Claimant in writing that Father Brown would serve on Claimant's promotion and tenure review committee but not as the Chair. Claimant testified that she had requested Father Brown serve no role on the review committee, but, was advised that Father Brown must be on the committee even though he would not serve as Chair. Accordingly, Dr. Prudence Rice, former Chair of the Department of Anthropology, was appointed Chair of Claimant's promotion and tenure review committee.

Claimant testified that she timely complied with all of Dr. Rice's requests for compilation of the dossier to be provided to the review committee.

According to Claimant, Dr. Rice did not show Claimant a completed version of her dossier and Claimant's first chance to review her dossier was around November 3, 2000, when she was asked to sign off on it. Claimant refused to do so because she had not participated in arranging or putting together the dossier and believed that parts were missing. Claimant understood the rules allowed her active participation in the preparation of her dossier as opposed to Dr. Rice putting it together. Claimant testified that she was not given the opportunity to provide information with her dossier for the review committee. Claimant did provide a rebuttal statement, addressing what information she believed to be missing or inaccurate. The review committee voted against Claimant's promotion and tenure due to lack of research. The recommendation against Claimant's tenure in the BAS Department was officially upheld by Respondent.

Shortly after the denial of her promotion and tenure, Claimant left the employ of SIU. From August 2001, through January 31, 2005, Claimant was employed as Associate Professor and Director of African-American Studies at Austin Peay State University. Since January 2005, Claimant has served as a consultant and adjunct teacher. Claimant summarized her earnings she believes she would have made during regular school semesters if she had continued to work at SIU as an Assistant Professor. Respondent objected to the summaries as speculative. Claimant received medical/dental benefits while employed at SIU and was required to pay out of pocket for her medical/dental expenses after her employment separated from SIU.

On cross-examination, Claimant testified that she had additional sources of income. Claimant agreed that during annual evaluations from 1996 to 2000, and in various departmental

memorandums, she was directed to follow the promotion and tenure guidelines requiring a substantial body of published scholarly research, in addition to teaching performance. Claimant also attended workshops on guidelines and procedures for promotion and tenure.

With regard to missing information from her dossier, Claimant believes she was not given the opportunity to provide sufficient documentation. Claimant testified that there was confusion with the name of the journal containing her article accepted for publication because it was a special issue. Claimant gave Dr. Rice a stack of materials when they first met and, according to Claimant, Dr. Rice did not want certain items such as newspaper articles and conference brochures that Claimant believes would have given further clarification to her case for promotion and tenure.

Claimant believes she followed the advice given to her by the Dean and Director of BAS during various reviews and she did not know the 1995 BAS Operating Papers had not been approved. Finally, Claimant testified that she had applied for other university positions in her field, but, was unsuccessful. She is currently teaching as an adjunct professor, a position far below her employment at SIU and Austin Peay.

By way of rebuttal, Claimant testified that she was never told encyclopedia articles did not count as scholarly work. In fact, she had been told the opposite by a previous Dean. Claimant believes the review committee misunderstood that her encyclopedia work included an entire chapter of primary research, instead of just several entries. Further, regarding her review committee members, she disagrees that Dr. Bean's research was in any way similar to her research. Claimant testified further that Father Brown referenced her museum exhibit as scholarly work and her documentary as creative activity with merit. Claimant believed the three

book chapters listed in her vita were peer-reviewed publications. Also, Claimant emphasized that she made presentations on both the international and national levels.

Claimant specifically denied encouraging students to speak badly about BAS faculty and denied she made any negative comments about Dr. Smoot. She admits being concerned about Father Brown's interactions with students and confronted him with those concerns. She made those concerns known also to the Dean and the ombudsperson but did not make any written complaints other than with the EEOC.

Marvin Zeman

Marvin Zeman, president of SIU Faculty Association since 2004 and former Chair of the Grievance Committee since 1998, represented Claimant during her grievance hearing on the issue of whether policies and procedures were followed for her promotion and tenure review. Zeman testified that the JRB panel report found that Claimant's research and creative activities "equivalent in scope to the publication of at least one major journal article per year," the benchmark for assistant professors applying for promotion and tenure at SIU.

According to Zeman, the Employee Handbook set forth guidelines for promotion and tenure, and, those guidelines become more specific at the college and departmental levels. It was Zeman's experience at grievance hearings that Claimant's case was the only one that Respondent did not present a case in its defense. Zeman knew of no case where the Respondent took the position that the operating papers for either the department or the College were nonbinding. Zeman testified it was not common procedure to research issues about an applicant's dossier after the review committee had voted on promotion and tenure. Zeman clarified on cross-examination that it is outside the purview of the JRB to rule on a candidate's research activities or otherwise make a qualitative judgment.

Dr. Seymour Bryson

Seymour Bryson, Ph.D. in Educational Psychology, is the former Dean of the College of Human Resources and has been Associate Chancellor for Diversity at SIU since 1988. He served on Claimant's promotion and tenure review committee and voted in favor of Claimant because, in his professional judgment, she met the standards. Dr. Bryson has been very familiar with the BAS program.

Dr. Bryson agreed that, after having met with Claimant, Father Brown. Dr. Clay Scott, Ms. Lamb and Ms. Connley in May, 2000, the conflict between Claimant and Father Brown had reached a point that the two of them could never have a civil relationship. Dr. Bryson testified that he recalled Claimant expressed concerns that Father Brown could not be fair or impartial and requested Father Brown not serve on her review committee during the review committee meeting. Dr. Bryson does not recall any discussion regarding Claimant's work on the ACC program as part of her research assignment or whether the BAS program weighed an applicant's service activities on equal ground with teaching and research.

Dr. Prudence Rice

Prudence Rice, Ph.D. in Anthropology, is employed at SIU as Associate Vice Chancellor for Research and Director of the Office of Research, Development and Administration. She has been employed at SIU since 1991 and holds the title of Distinguished Scholar. Previous to serving as Chair of Claimant's promotion and tenure review committee, Dr. Rice had helped candidates put together dossiers for promotion and tenure and had served on review committees at the CoLA level. At the time of her service on Claimant's review committee, she considered herself to be very familiar with the standards for promotion and tenure.

Dr. Rice met with Claimant and believes it was clear what needed to be included in the dossier. She testified that Claimant did not timely submit her materials. Further, Dr. Rice does not recall Claimant ever complaining that she was not allowed participation in the process of compiling her dossier.

Claimant's review committee found that her research and published scholarly activity (both quality and quantity) did not satisfactorily meet the criteria for promotion and tenure. Dr. Rice voted to promote Claimant based upon her teaching and service strengths.

On cross-examination, Dr. Rice admitted that it was not the general practice to research the contents of a dossier after a committee vote as was done in Claimant's review process. At the time of the committee vote, Dr. Rice concedes that she had an imperfect understanding of the crossover of Claimant's service, research and teaching components for review. Dr. Rice also testified that at the time of the committee vote, she was not aware the ACC program was part of Claimant's research assignment. According to Dr. Rice, the review committee for Claimant followed the traditional approach weighing teaching and research components more heavily than the service component. As Chair, Dr. Rice believed Claimant was disadvantaged by the unapproved status of the BAS Operating Papers because they placed equal weight on all three components. Ultimately, Dr. Rice believed Claimant's review process was as fair as possible given the unusual circumstances, including Claimant's lack of promptness in providing the materials needed for her dossier.

Dr. Margaret "Peggy" Stockdale

Peggy Stockdale, Ph.D. in Industrial Organization Psychology, is employed as a full professor in the SIU psychology department. She currently serves as Faculty Senate President and was asked by Dr. Clay Scott to serve on Claimant's promotion and tenure review committee.

Dr. Stockdale did not believe that Claimant's research and scholarly work met the standards for promotion and tenure. She admitted to giving more weight to the research and teaching components than service when reviewing Claimant's dossier.

Dr. Jonathon Bean

Jonathon Bean, Ph.D., has been employed by SIU in the History Department since 1995. He served on Claimant's promotion and tenure review committee at the request of Dr. Clay Scott. Dr. Bean voted against Claimant's promotion and tenure because of weaknesses in Claimant's research. He recalled that the review committee used the CoLA Operating Papers as criteria for their decision. As such, more weight was afforded to research than teaching and service.

Dr. Don Rice

Don Rice, Ph.D., has been employed by SIU since 1991 and serves as Interim Provost and Vice Chancellor of the University. During the year 2000, Dr. Rice was the Associate Dean in the College of Liberal Arts and conducted workshops for the process of promotion and tenure. Dr. Rice testified that a candidate's dossier should only be reviewed after the candidate has signed off on its contents. Dr. Rice testified that his belief is that a candidate should have access to his or her dossier up until the time of the review committee vote. Regarding Operating Papers, Dr. Rice testified that until revisions are done and approved, the existing Operating Papers for a department should remain in effect. If a promotion and tenure candidate is denied, then that candidate is appointed to a one-year term after which employment is terminated.

Father Joseph Brown, Ph.D.

Father Joseph Brown testified for Respondent. He received his Ph.D. in American Studies in 1984, and received his Master's degree in African-American Studies at Yale

University in 1979. He also received a Master's degree in Writing Seminars from Johns Hopkins in 1969, and became an ordained priest in 1972 after completing theological studies. Currently, he holds the position of Director of the BAS program and is a tenured full professor at SIU.

When Father Brown arrived at SIU in 1997, Claimant was a faculty member in the BAS program and initially their relationship was positive. Sometime prior to 2000, Father Brown and Claimant developed conflicts on both personal and professional levels, which included budgetary issues. Father Brown believes that Claimant launched a campaign against him by making comments about his personal life, his past work record and the danger he may present to students. Father Brown never pursued advice from University counsel about Claimant's campaign because he did not want to involve the students. At one point, Claimant stood over Father Brown and shouted at him which caused him to feel unsafe.

Regarding the BAS Operating Papers, Father Brown believes that Claimant was involved in the Operating Papers revision. Father Brown expressed his opinion to the provost and Dr. Rice that service should be given the same weight as research and teaching in the BAS program with no intention that any one component dominate. Claimant was offered guidance by Father Brown and, in general, he advised her to do less service work if it ever conflicts with scholarly work. Father Brown testified that research supports teaching and vice-versa. Specifically, Father Brown believes that he objectively evaluated Claimant's case for promotion and tenure. He offered Claimant help to prepare her dossier but did not receive a response.

Dr. Clay Scott asked Father Brown, as Director of the BAS department, to submit his own letter of judgment for Claimant's promotion and tenure candidacy and he submitted his honest reflections. Some confusion was created with respect to Claimant's promotion and tenure review committee because the committee needed to have some understanding of the nature of the

BAS program. There being no other tenured faculty in the BAS department, it was necessary for Father Brown to be on Claimant's review committee notwithstanding Claimant's request for Father Brown's exclusion. In his letter of judgment, Father Brown expressed his opinion that Claimant's scholarly output was insufficient, lacking meritorious significance, and, he had concerns about her teaching and coordination of the ACC program.

Father Brown testified that summer employment for faculty was not guaranteed at SIU and, due to budget problems, the BAS department has had to curtail its current summer programs to just one course. Father Brown testified further that it would have been inevitable to have a formal review of Claimant's stewardship of the ACC program because of accounting irregularities and notices of unpaid bills in Ghana. Most likely, Claimant would have been replaced by another faculty member to assume coordination of the ACC program.

On cross-examination, Father Brown testified that he reviewed several documents reflecting his favorable judgment of Claimant's performance as a faculty member. Father Brown admitted that by May 1, 2000, that Claimant was primarily responsible for extensive damage to his reputation. He considered how to proceed to make a formal complaint against Claimant but did not do so. He testified that the situation between himself and Claimant did not improve at any time prior to Claimant's departure in July 2001.

Father Brown testified that, being the only member of Claimant's review committee from her academic discipline, he was aware of various publications in the field of Black Studies as well as the importance of service in the BAS program. He testified he did not discuss those specifics with the review committee and chose, instead, to allow his letter to the Chair to stand on its own. It was Father Brown's understanding that the BAS Operating Papers were a part of

Claimant's dossier. Father Brown agreed that the BAS Operating Papers state that teaching, research, creative activity and service are of equal significance.

Dr. Pamela Smoot

Pamela Smoot, Ph.D. in History, has worked at SIU since 1999 as a faculty member in the BAS program and currently serves as Clinical Assistant Professor and Director of Educational Enhancement for Minority Students. She had a good working relationship with Claimant initially, but that relationship deteriorated around the year 2000.

Dr. Smoot testified that during the fall and spring semesters after she first arrived at SIU, she attended CoLA promotion and tenure work shops with Claimant. During those work shops, Dr. Smoot recalls being told clearly that publications were more important than service and teaching. Further, she testified that the workshops specifically informed candidates that encyclopedia articles do not count as publications and a book or six articles were required to meet the standards of promotion and tenure.

Dr. Shirley Clay Scott

Respondent called to testify Shirley Clay Scott, Ph.D. in History, who became Dean of the College of Liberal Arts at SIU, 1999 through 2006. Dr. Clay Scott testified that she recalls issues in the BAS program over copying costs, bills and interpersonal tensions between Father Brown and Claimant.

Dr. Clay Scott testified that on February 7, 2000, she held a meeting with Father Brown, Claimant, Dr. Bryson, Mary Lamb, and Lynn Connley, to talk through the issues with the hope of improving relationships between Father Brown and Claimant. At that time, Claimant requested that Father Brown not be the Chair of her promotion and tenure committee as would usually occur. Dr. Clay Scott discussed Claimant's request with the Provost and Associate

Provost and decided that, given the history, Father Brown would not be the Chair of Claimant's promotion and tenure review committee. However, the SIU Employee's Handbook and the contract between the administration and SIU faculty require that a tenured faculty member cannot be denied the right to participate in the tenure process and have a vote. As such, Father Brown had to have a role in Claimant's tenure process even though he was not going to Chair Claimant's committee.

After discussion with Claimant, Dr. Clay Scott selected Claimant's review committee and agreed to Claimant's request for Father Brown not to Chair the committee. Since there were no other tenured faculty members other than Father Brown in the BAS Program, and only tenured faculty can vote on tenure, Dr. Clay Scott had to choose tenured faculty from other departments within the CoLA to serve on Claimant's promotion and tenure committee. She chose people with some disciplinary or research expertise. Dr. Clay Scott believed that each appointed committee member would make an independent judgment of Claimant's case for promotion and tenure. Claimant did not object to any committee member ultimately selected.

Dr. Clay Scott testified that during the preparation of Claimant's dossier, Dr. Rice, Chair of Claimant's review committee, expressed a concern that Claimant was not submitting her dossier materials as promptly as needed. Dr. Clay Scott testified that the BAS Operating Paper was not official at the time of Claimant's review so, the CoLA Operating Paper was used as a default, although both Operating Papers were allowed to be included.

Dr. Clay Scott testified that Claimant wanted to add an updated vita and other materials to her dossier after it was submitted. Dr. Clay Scott stated that it was her understanding that only a letter of rebuttal is allowed to be added to a dossier after it is turned in for consideration at which time it is sealed. Dr. Clay Scott testified that Claimant did submit a letter of rebuttal.

Dr. Clay Scott testified that after the review committee vote, Claimant's application for promotion and tenure was submitted to the CoLA committee. Claimant's rebuttal was included in her dossier when the CoLA committee conducted its review. Dr. Clay Scott testified that the updated vita was also submitted in Claimant's dossier, but could not have official status.

Regarding standards, Dr. Clay Scott testified that all faculty members in the CoLA have to meet the college-wide guidelines for promotion and tenure regardless of their particular department. The college-wide committee for promotion and tenure review used the normal standards of satisfactory performance in research or scholarship, teaching and service as stated in the CoLA Operating Papers to evaluate Claimant's dossier.

Dr. Clay Scott testified that the next step in the promotion and tenure review process is for the college-wide committee to advise the Dean after their vote on a dossier. Dr. Clay Scott, as Dean of CoLA, would meet with the committee as necessary. The college-wide committee recommended to Dr. Clay Scott that Claimant not receive promotion and tenure because of deficiencies in the area of research.

Dr. Clay Scott reviewed all of the materials carefully, talked with the review committee, reviewed the recommendations and ultimately decided that she could not recommend Claimant for promotion and tenure. Her concern was chiefly was that Claimant's scholarly record that did not meet the standards applied in the CoLA.

On cross-examination, Dr. Clay Scott recalled giving Claimant a Dean's appreciation award in January, 2000, for the purpose of appreciation and encouragement of her work on the ACC program. Also, Dr. Clay Scott recalled that she requested Claimant familiarize herself with the BAS program tenure and promotion guidelines without referencing which Operating Papers were to be used.

As part of Claimant's promotion and tenure process, Dr. Clay Scott considered the 1995 BAS Operating Papers, the revised draft of the 1998 papers and the CoLA Operating Papers at the time of Claimant's review. Dr. Clay Scott testified that the standing of the BAS Operating Papers was problematic because they had not been fully endorsed.

Dr. Clay Scott agreed that Claimant requested Father Brown's removal from her committee altogether. She tried to acquiesce to Claimant's request but could only ask Father Brown to step aside as Chair, instead of removal, because of the University contract.

Dr. Clay Scott testified that Father Brown's letter recommending against Claimant's promotion and tenure was included in Claimant's dossier and, therefore, available to the college-wide committee, along with the 1995 BAS Operating Papers and Claimant's updated vita. Dr. Clay Scott considered Father Brown's letter to be normal procedure and fair. Ultimately, Dr. Clay Scott weighed Claimant's research and teaching at a somewhat higher level than service in accordance with the CoLA Operating Papers.

ANALYSIS

The law is clear and it is undisputed by that parties that Respondent's Employee Handbook creates and governs its employment contract with Claimant at all relevant times with respect to the issues now before the Court. *See, Duldulao v. Saint Mary of Nazareth Hospital*, 115 Ill. 2d 482 (1987). According to Respondent's Employee Handbook, the written procedures, standards and guidelines for each college and academic unit are incorporated by reference. As such, promises contained in every college and department operating paper constitute a portion of the entire employment contract if they contain a clear offer, disseminated to employees and reasonably relied upon by employees as they continue to work. *See, Duldulao* at 490.

Here, Claimant testified that she received and reviewed the CoLA and BAS Operating Papers at the beginning of her employment in 1995. The validity of the CoLA Operating Papers is not challenged and, in fact, Respondent admits that the CoLA Operating Papers outline procedures for promotion and tenure review within the college. Those procedures clearly become part of the employment contract at issues using the *Duldulao* analysis.

Although the CoLA Operating Papers are fairly considered part of the employment contract, Claimant's argument that Respondent breached its promise to consider with equal weight all three components of service, teaching and scholarship fails. First, the CoLA Operating Papers call for teaching and scholarly research to be given a greater significance than service when assessing an applicant for tenure with allowance for a department to give service greater credit than usual in appropriate disciplines. This standard is somewhat contrary to Claimant's position that her review committee was required to follow BAS guidelines weighing all three components of service, teaching and scholarly research with the same significance. Claimant cannot dispute the fact that she was also subject to the college-wide standards for her review. Second, notwithstanding the level of significance given to her admirable service by all accounts, Claimant's scholarly research was insufficient to warrant tenure according to the majority of her reviewers. In the end, this same conclusion was reached by Dr. Clay Scott, Dean of the College of Liberal Arts, after reviewing Claimant's dossier in its entirety (which included claimant's rebuttal and all Operating Papers) along with the recommendation of the committee. Simply put, Claimant's argument that service should have been elevated to the level of significance given to teaching and scholarship would not cure the "procedural flaw" she claims since Claimant also failed to meet the standard required for scholarship. For that reason, this

Court finds Respondent did not breach its promises contained in the CoLA Operating Papers with regard to the proper weight to be given the components for Claimant's tenure evaluation.

Claimant also asserts that Respondent breached the obligations of the 1995 BAS Operating Papers by allowing associate professors on her review committee. Respondent challenges the validity of the 1995 BAS Operating Papers claiming they were unapproved as well as superseded by the new Collective Bargaining Agreement with the Faculty Association. As it is undisputed that the 1995 BAS Operating Papers had not been approved, such documentation does not constitute a part of the employment contract. In an unapproved state, the 1995 BAS Operating Papers cannot be deemed to contain a clear offer, disseminated to employees and reasonably relied upon by employees. *See, Duldulao v. Saint Mary of Nazareth Hospital*, 115 Ill. 2d 482 (1987). Also significant is the fact that Claimant participated in the draft revisions of the 1995 BAS Operating Papers on the issue of associate professor participation in tenure evaluation. In the face of the new Collective Bargaining Agreement, Claimant could not have reasonably relied upon the 1995 BAS Operating Papers and, in that respect, the promise of full professors on her review committee is not part of her employment contract, regardless the status of the 1995 BAS Operating Papers as a whole. Moreover, Claimant did not object to associate-level professors on her review committee at the time of its formation. Claimant's reliance on an invalid and unenforceable promise of full professors (instead of associate-level professors) on her review committee does not constitute a breach by Respondent with regard to her review committee staff qualifications.

Claimant's foremost allegation of Respondent's breach of employment contract hinges upon the "war" with Father Brown. However, Respondent did not breach its contract with Claimant by allowing Father Brown to participate on her review committee. Specifically, Father

Brown, as Director of the BAS program and a tenured professor, was properly included on Claimant's review committee. It should be noted that, at Claimant's request, Father Brown's participation was limited by Dr. Rice and Father Brown acquiesced. Now, Claimant appears to argue that Father Brown should have had a greater voice in her tenure review because he had specific knowledge about the particular field of study she deems authorized her promotion and tenure.

This Court finds that Dr. Clay Scott obviously gave much thought to the proper composition of Claimant's review committee, conducted a thorough and objective review of all materials submitted by Claimant in her dossier, with rebuttal, and ultimately found Claimant's application for tenure and promotion should be denied. It is improper for this Court to substitute its judgment for that of Respondent. *See Bulloch v. The State of Illinois*, 54 Ill Ct Cl 292 (2002).

Claimant also alleges that her promotion and tenure denial was, in effect, a retaliatory discharge for reporting her perceived wrongdoing by Father Brown. To substantiate a claim for retaliatory discharge, Claimant must show by a preponderance of the evidence that she was discharged in retaliation for her activities and such discharge violates a clear mandate of public policy in favor of reporting misconduct. *See McCoppin v. State*, 53 Ill Ct Cl 153 (2001).

Respondent's multi-level reviews of Claimant's qualifications for promotion and tenure concluded that Claimant lacked the scholarly research necessary for promotion and tenure. On the evidence before this Court, it is apparent that Claimant's denial of promotion and tenure was based upon Claimant's failure to meet the legitimate qualification standards. As such, Claimant fails to carry her burden of proof that she was discharged in retaliation for reporting alleged misconduct, and her retaliatory discharge claim fails.

No breach of employment contract or retaliatory discharge can be found on the facts before this Court, so damages are not considered. Even if Claimant had prevailed on her claim for breach of contract, Claimant immediately found a position with another university at least comparable to her employment with SIU and concedes that she essentially earned the same salary in the new position for almost four years, thus wholly mitigating any damages. *See Umbaugh v. Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University*, 37 Ill Ct Cl. 151 (1984). In addition, there is absolutely no showing by Claimant that her termination four years later from her new employer was due to any fault on the part of Respondent.

CONCLUSION

For the foregoing reasons, this Court finds that Claimant's Complaint is denied.

Exhaustion of Remedies- Claimant did not exhaust all available remedies as mandated under 705 ILCS 505/25. Claimant failed to pursue a claim against the Illinois Motorcycle Dealers Association which was leasing the property under which Claimant was injured.

ORDER

Birnbaum, J.

THIS MATTER is before the Court on Respondent's Motion to Dismiss for Claimant's alleged failure to exhaust legal remedies pursuant to 705 ILCS 505/25 and 74 Ill. Admin. Code § 790.60.

Nature of the Claim

On September 23, 2003, the Illinois Motorcycle Dealers Association ("IDMA") leased portions of the Du Quoin State Fair Grounds for the dates of a motorcycle race event. On September 24, 2004, Claimant was working at the Du Quoin State Fairgrounds laying video cable along the west side fence of the racetrack for a motorcycle race event to be held on September 24th and 25th. While Claimant was stepping around various bushes lining the west side of the fence, he came across an apparent utility access entry with steel doors. After stepping on the doors, the doors opened and Claimant fell into a pit, resulting in injuries to his left inside arm, right ribcage and knee area. Included within the lease between the Illinois Motorcycle Dealers Associations and Illinois Department of Agriculture was the backstage area, the site where Claimant was working during the alleged incident.

Analysis

Respondent's Motion to Dismiss exhaustion arguments require that Claimant has (or had) a plausible claim against the suggested alternative source of recovery, the Illinois Motorcycle Dealers Association. If an alternative source of recovery for the claimed injury is shown to exist, in whole or in part, our Act and our rule command that no judgment can be entered by this Court until that potential recovery is resolved and reduces the State's liability. 705 ILCS 505/25; 74 Ill. Admin. Code § 790.60. Additionally, if it is shown that the Claimant could have, but now cannot, pursue a real alternative source of recovery for the injury, then this Court will dismiss the claim against the State for Claimant's failure to exhaust that remedy.

Pursuant to the "Non-Fair Building and Space Rental Agreement" executed on September 23, 2004 between the Illinois Department of Agriculture and the Illinois Motorcycle Dealers Association, Respondent argues that the IMDA, as lessee, had the sole and exclusive responsibility for the operation and maintenance of the property. Thus, they argue the State, as landlord, cannot be culpable for the alleged negligence on the date of Claimant's injuries. Claimant argues, in his April 25, 2011 Response to Respondent's Motion to Dismiss, that there are no facts demonstrating that IMDA was a "culpable party" and thus, Claimant did not necessarily have to file a claim against IMDA. After reading the specifics of the agreement executed between the parties, this Court agrees with Respondent.

Specifically, the September 23, 2004 rental agreement details that the lessee, the IMDA, assumes all safety responsibility for any alterations, presumably such as the process of laying cable around the perimeter of the racetrack which allegedly lead to Claimant's injuries. Generally, a landlord is not liable for injuries caused by a defective condition on the premises leased to a tenant and under the tenant's control. *Rowe v. State Bank of Lombard*, 125 Ill. 2d 203

(1988). *Almendarez v. Keller*, 207 Ill. App. 3d 756 (1990); *Wright v. Mr. Quick, Inc.*, 109 Ill. 2d 236 (1985). Claimant has failed to demonstrate that a claim against IDMA, the lessee of the site of the alleged accident, would be frivolous. Thus, Claimant had a potential claim against the lessee of the property, IDMA, which he failed to pursue pursuant to the exhaustion requirement of 705 ILCS 505/25 and 74 Ill. Admin. Code §790.60. This exhaustion requirement is a mandatory element of the Court of Claim's subject matter jurisdiction. *Devany v. State*, 48 Ill. Ct. Cl. 461 (1996); *Morge v. State*, 47 Ill. Ct. Cl. 318 (1994).

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that Respondent's Motion to Dismiss for Claimant's failure to exhaust legal remedies against the Illinois Motorcycle Dealers Association pursuant to the provisions of 705 ILCS 505/25 and 74 Ill. Admin. Code § 790.60 is GRANTED.

Prisoners and inmates, Duty towards- The State is not an insurer of the safety of inmates in its custody, but it does have the duty to exercise reasonable care to prevent inmates from suffering harm at the hands of other inmates, and the determination of what is reasonable under the circumstances depends on the facts of each case viewed in light of the prison environment and the discretion which must be accorded prison officials.

Prisoners and inmates, Negligence, Attack by another inmate- When determining if there is negligence by the State, the Court looks to the foreseeability of potential harm to the Claimant by another inmate. Negligence may be imputed if prison officials had actual or constructive notice of trouble with another inmate and Claimant. Claimant informed personnel many times that he wanted to change cells. Respondent failed to take measures to protect the Claimant and failed in its duty to provide Claimant with reasonable care in protecting him from harm when they had both actual and constructive notice of trouble between the cellmates.

OPINION

Sprague, C.J.

This matter comes before the Court on the Complaint of Claimant, Larry Hayes, against Respondent, State of Illinois, Illinois Department of Corrections, seeking damages from an injury received in the amount of \$100,000.00.

THE FACTS

I. Claimant's Testimony

Claimant, Larry Hayes, testified that on December 19, 2003, he informed the control officer that he was having problems with his cellmate and requested a transfer. He testified that he was assured by the control officer that he would be moved out of his cell to a different cell. Approximately two days later, he inquired again about his moving out of his cell. It was at this

time that a correctional officer told him that he was going to check into it and that it would be taken care of in the near future. On December 23, 2003, Claimant testified that he again inquired about a move. It was at that time that Claimant testified that he informed the correctional officer that he felt he was in danger of having a serious problem with his cellmate.

On December 24, 2003, the correctional officer came to Claimant and was asked if Claimant would mind if Claimant moved or his cellmate moved. Claimant stated that he had no problem with either of those choices. It was later learned by Claimant that the transfer was for his cellmate to be moved upstairs. When his cellmate began to pack for his move, Claimant testified that he went outside into the dayroom and sat down. While sitting in the dayroom, a correctional officer called Claimant on the loud speaker and told him that he had to go back to his cell because it was not his dayroom time. Claimant testified that he stated that he did not want to go back to his cell because of the problems he had with his cellmate and he was afraid of a serious confrontation. Claimant was then ordered to go back to his cell.

When he returned to his cell, Claimant testified that his cellmate elbowed him in the stomach and knocked his hand down. Claimant testified that he told his cellmate not to touch him and he turned away. Upon turning away, Claimant testified that his cellmate hit him in the nose and the jaw. It was at this time that Claimant stated that he blacked out. When he was able to regain consciousness, Claimant testified that he remembered being on top of his cellmate and punching him. He then testified that they both stood up and Claimant fell against the wall and fell out of the door. Claimant testified that he did not remember any of this incident until three weeks after the fight as he had lost his memory during the incident.

Claimant then testified that his cellmate went upstairs and that he was then taken across the hall to a cell by other inmates where they cleaned him up. Claimant then stated that he

returned to his cell but did not remember what occurred. Claimant testified that an officer came into his cell and asked him what was wrong. Claimant testified that he told the officer that he did not really remember but stated that he hit the wall and hurt himself. The officer then stated to Claimant that he was going to be taken to the prison hospital to be checked out. Claimant testified that when he was in the prison hospital that they came and put him in the hole (segregation) because they had learned of the confrontation between Claimant and his cellmate.

While he was in segregation, Claimant stated that he complained about his jaw and stated that he thought he had a heart attack. Claimant testified that while he was in the prison hospital, they did give him some medication for his heart and then took him over to the X-ray. After the X-ray, Claimant was told that his jaw was broken. It was during this time that they also took Claimant to internal affairs to question him about the incident.

A couple of days after the incident, Claimant indicated that he was taken into the city for surgery and it was during the surgery that they put a plate into his jaw. Claimant then testified that he believed that there was also a disciplinary hearing in which they found him guilty of fighting. Claimant testified that he was still medicated at the hearing and that he did not recall that he was found guilty of fighting. Claimant testified that they sentenced him to 30 days of segregation and 30 days of C grade.

Claimant testified that he learned there were four informers that saw the incident and explained to the disciplinary committee that Claimant was defending himself after his cellmate attacked him. Upon learning of the informers, Claimant filed a grievance. Claimant testified that the grievance committee found him guilty because they said that Claimant was unable to present a valid defense on his own behalf and his inability to refute the charge of fighting.

Claimant testified that it was not until January 14 or 15, 2004 that he remembered the

incident. Claimant testified that he served his 30 days of segregation after his jaw operation. It was not until February that most of his memory came back and that is when he filed his grievance. Claimant then added that he explained to the correctional officers that he did not want to go back to his cell because he believed that there would be a problem if he returned during his cellmate's move. Claimant then stated that because of his physical injuries which included head lesions, loss of short-term memory, a nose rupture, contusions and a fractured right mandible bone and had to have his teeth extracted that he requested \$150,000.00 in damages.

Upon cross-examination, Claimant testified that he was in his cell for approximately 9 months and with his cellmate for approximately 2-3 months. Claimant testified that he believed that he had requested a transfer on December 19 and on December 23, was told that his cellmate would be transferred. Claimant further testified on cross-examination that while he was in the bubble a CI called over the loud speaker for him to go back to his cell because it was not his dayroom time. Claimant testified that immediately upon returning to his cell he was elbowed in the stomach by this cellmate. Claimant then testified that he was taken to the City and did not remember the hospital he was taken to but remained in the hospital for a day or two. Claimant testified that he did not pay for the surgery or any medical costs.

Claimant then requested that all of his documents be admitted into evidence. The documents were admitted without objection.

II. **Respondent's Case**

The Assistant Attorney General then made a reference into the investigation contained in the Departmental Report. Specifically, the Assistant Attorney General referred to the Departmental Report which stated that there were two confidential inmates who reported on

what incurred during this incident. The State then requested that the Departmental Report then be admitted into evidence. The Departmental Report was admitted into evidence without objection. The State rested their case with no closing argument.

In closing, the Claimant requested that the Judges look at the two witnesses' statements in the record which indicate that Claimant was defending himself which would prove that he was not guilty and should not have been put in segregation.

THE LAW

Illinois case law is clear that the State of Illinois is not an insurer of the safety of inmates in its custody, but it does have a duty to exercise reasonable care to prevent inmates from suffering harm at the hands of other inmates, and that the determination of what is reasonable under the circumstances depends on the facts of each case viewed in light of the prison environment and the discretion which must be accorded prison officials. Factors to be considered by this Court when determining if there is negligence by the State are the foreseeability of potential for harm to the Claimant by another inmate. The Claimant must prove the foreseeability by a preponderance of the evidence. This foreseeability must be judged by the facts of each case and by taking judicial notice of the prison environment. Petrusak v. State of Illinois (1987), 39 Ill. Ct. Cl. 113. Liability of negligence by the State may be found if prison officials had actual or constructive notice of trouble with another inmate and Claimant or the likelihood that Claimant would be targeted as a victim. Smith v. State of Illinois, (1991) 44 Ill. Ct. Cl. 45.

In the case at bar, evidence was presented by Claimant that he informed prison personnel on numerous occasions of his request to move out of his cell as he believed he felt he was in danger. Prisoners at Dixon were constructively apprised of the risk of harm to Claimant on at

least three occasions from the testimony of the Claimant himself. The Department Report which was entered into evidence on Respondent's behalf, do not rebut this claim. Additionally, Claimant left his cell when his cellmate was packing to leave and was ordered to return to his cell even after Claimant testified that he informed the correctional officers of the situation and his fear of returning to his cell where his cellmate was packing.

It is clear from the evidence presented that Respondent failed to take measures to protect the Claimant and consequently failed in its duty to provide Claimant with reasonable care in protecting him from harm. The Respondent did not allow Claimant to stay in the dayroom while his cellmate was packing to move. Respondent did not take any other measures in protecting Claimant while his cellmate was in the moving process. The State failed in its duty to use reasonable care to protect Claimant from harm when they had actual and constructive notice of the trouble that was to occur. The Claimant Larry Hayes suffered damages in being punched in the mouth which resulted in him breaking his jaw.

It is hereby ordered that Claimant is awarded the amount of \$3,000.00 in full and complete satisfaction of his claim.

Negligence, Burden of proof- In a claim for negligence, Claimant must prove that (1) the State owed Claimant a duty of ordinary care to maintain its roadways in a reasonably safe condition, (2) the State breached its duty, and (3) damages resulting proximately from that breach. The duty of ordinary care arises when the State has notice of the defect at issue. But the State is not a guarantor of the safety of all drivers on its roads.

Highways, Duty to warn of the defective condition- When the State has actual or constructive notice of recurring standing water on a roadway, the State has a duty to warn the motorist public. Evidence was presented to show the State had actual knowledge of flooding on the road prior to Claimant's accident, or that with any degree of due diligence would have gained actual knowledge of recurring flooding on that specific road. State offered no evidence to contradict Claimant's facts that the water on the road caused the accident. State breached its duty to warn.

Damages, Medical expenses due- In order to recover medical expenses, Claimant must establish (1) the medical services were reasonable and necessary to treat the injuries suffered and causally connected to the accident, and (2) the medical services were reasonable and necessary for like services. Expert testimony is not required if the need for the medical services is so obvious as to be within the realm of a layperson's knowledge.

OPINION

Sprague, C.J.

Claimant filed a Complaint for personal injuries arising from a motor vehicle accident on May 20, 2000. The Complaint alleges that Claimant was driving on Illinois Route 15, also known as Missouri Avenue, near the 3300 block of East St. Louis, Illinois when he encountered standing water on the roadway. He suffered personal injuries when he lost control of his vehicle and struck a utility pole. A hearing was held before Commissioner Ysursa on August 8, 2011.

Edward Szewczyk represented Claimant, and Assistant Attorney General Jamie Knodel represented Respondent.

I. Preliminary Issues

Respondent filed twelve (12) motions in limine. Oral arguments were held on the motions in limine. Motions in limine 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 9, 10 were denied. Motions in limine numbers 8 and 12 were granted.

Respondent objected to the Supreme Court Rule 237 Notices served by Claimant on August 5, 2011, for four former and/or current Illinois Department of Transportation (herein after IDOT) employees. Respondent objected due to two reasons: (1) the 237 notices were improper due to the untimely service; and (2) two of the persons sought to attend by Claimant, Christin Braunbauer and Mary Lanny, were not included in any Supreme Court Rule 213 disclosures. During argument it was noted that Braunbauer and Lanny no longer work for IDOT and as such are not under Respondent's control, mooting the issue. The other two IDOT employees contained in the Rule 237 notices were Steve Wheeler and Angela Blackburn. After a recess counsel for both parties resolved the remaining 237 notice issues by Respondent stipulating that the State of Illinois owns and controls Route 15 in the area in question and as such has a duty to maintain the roadway in a reasonably safe condition, including the removal and/or warning of standing water on the roadway.

II. Background

East St. Louis Police Officer Rodell Andrews, Jr. was the first witness called by Claimant. Officer Andrews testified that he has been employed by the East St. Louis Police Department for over 15 years starting in January 2006. Officer Andrews responded to the Claimant's accident on the evening of May 20, 2000, around 8:10 p.m. He was presented

Claimant's Exhibit 9, a copy of his police report of the accident, in order to refresh his memory. Officer Andrews testified that the accident occurred on Missouri Avenue near the intersection with 33rd Avenue. Officer Andrews stated that he arrived at the scene and observed Claimant and his vehicle. He testified that the vehicle had hydroplaned and struck a telephone pole on the northbound side of westbound Missouri Avenue. Officer Andrews was presented Claimant's Exhibits 10-21, which were photographs of the area of the accident, and testified that while not taken on the evening of the accident, the pictures accurately depict the condition of Missouri Avenue around the time of the accident. Officer Andrews stated that he did not remember seeing a sign stating "Water on Pavement" at or near the accident scene. Officer Andrews was then shown Claimant's Exhibits 15, 16 and 17 that show the pole that Claimant hit. He testified that the photographs accurately and fairly depict the pole that Claimant's vehicle struck on the night of the accident except there was more water on Missouri Avenue on the evening of the accident than depicted in the photos. Officer Andrews testified that he regularly patrolled the area in question as a normal part of his duties. He stated that it was common knowledge that the westbound lanes of Route 15 frequently flooded in the area of the accident. He said that the area typically flooded up to the center lane of the road and that the water remained on the roadway for days until the water evaporated. Officer Andrews said that he never reported the flooding to IDOT or other authorities. He stated that he did not measure the depth of the water on the pavement on May 20, 2000, but stated it was deep enough for a vehicle to lose control and hydroplane.

Officer Andrews observed Claimant at scene of the accident. He testified that Claimant had injuries to his head and was bleeding from his head. He stated that an ambulance took him from the scene. Officer Andrews observed damage to Claimant's vehicle on the front end and

testified that Claimant's Exhibit 22 fairly and accurately depicted Claimant's vehicle on date of accident. Officer Andrews testified that the water covered the entire right lane of westbound Illinois Route 15.

After Officer Andrew's direct examination, Claimant's Exhibits 10 through 21 were admitted into evidence over Respondent's objection. Claimant's Exhibit 9 was admitted without objection. Claimant's Exhibit 22 was admitted into evidence over Respondent's objection.

On cross examination Officer Andrews did not recall how long the water was on the roadway on the night of the accident. On re-direct Officer Andrews was shown Claimant's Exhibit 26 which was admitted into evidence over Respondent's objection.

The second witness called to testify was Claimant, Chris Bradley. Claimant stated that he was in an accident on May 20, 2000, on Illinois Route 15 (Missouri Avenue) around 8:00 p.m. Claimant stated that he was travelling on westbound Missouri Avenue going over an overpass heading into East St. Louis. He testified that he had headlights on and nothing was obstructing his view. He stated it was not raining that evening and it had not rained that day. He testified that it did rain the day before on May 19th. He said that he lived most of his life in Nebraska but returned to Cahokia in 1998 in order to live with his mother and graduate from high school. He testified that he was not that familiar with the particular area of Missouri Avenue where the accident occurred and that prior to the accident he had never observed standing water on the roadway in the area in question. He stated that at the time of the accident he was travelling the speed limit in the far right westbound lane and he hit a pool of standing water, his vehicle hydroplaned, and the vehicle's front end struck a utility pole on north side of Missouri Avenue. He stated that he did not see any warning signs advising of water on pavement. He testified that Claimant's Exhibits 10 through 21 fairly and accurately depict the roadway and the pole he

struck. Claimant did not testify as to the amount of standing water on the roadway on the evening in question.

After hitting the pole, Claimant stated that his head hit the windshield and he was "woozy" but not unconscious. He stated that his head and forehead were injured plus his left leg and his neck and back. He testified that after the accident he was taken via ambulance to St. Mary's Hospital (currently Kenneth Hall Hospital) and was treated and released. Claimant testified that Claimant's Exhibit 7 is a bill from Kenneth Hall Hospital and was paid. Claimant testified that he then received treatment for his injuries from Frick Chiropractic Clinic in Cahokia. He stated that Claimant's Exhibit 8 is a bill from Frick Chiropractic Clinic in Cahokia and had been paid. Claimant testified that at the time of the accident he was employed at Casey's General Store. He stated that he missed work due to his injuries and suffered lost wages in the amount of \$1,100. Claimant presented no documentary evidence of his wages at the time of the accident to support his testimony. Claimant testified that Claimant's Exhibit 23 is a photo of his left leg showing abrasions and Claimant's Exhibit 24 depicts his forehead after the accident. Claimant testified that he received stitches in his forehead and has about an inch scar from about the midpoint of his forehead near his hairline down towards his left eye.

After direct examination Claimant's Exhibits 23 and 24 were admitted into evidence. Claimant's Exhibits 7 and 8 were admitted into evidence over Respondent's objections.

On cross examination Claimant was asked about his familiarity with Illinois Route 15 and he said he was not that familiar with it. Respondent's counsel showed him his deposition demonstrated that he stated that he had driven on Illinois Route 15 once or twice a month before May 20, 2000. Claimant could not remember traffic conditions on evening in question. He testified as to lost wages of \$1,100 but could not answer how he calculated lost wages in 2000;

specifically, he could not recall how much his wages were back in 2000. On re-direct Claimant clarified that while he had driven on Route 15 prior to the accident, he was not familiar with stretch of Illinois Route 15 where the accident occurred because his experience driving on Route 15 was between Cahokia and Belleville, IL, which took him on a different stretch of road from the accident site. On re-direct he was shown the answers to interrogatories and stated that he missed 3 weeks of work that formed his claim for lost wages. On re-cross Claimant testified that he did not work the week of May 21st – June 3rd and disputes Casey's General Store records that show he worked 12 hours that week. He stated in deposition that his wages were \$7 per hour but he testified at the trial that his deposition testimony was incorrect.

Claimant then called Joseph Dean Monroe, an IDOT employee for the last 17 years, as an adverse witness. Monroe has worked out of the IDOT facility in Collinsville, IL for the vast majority of his 17 years with IDOT. He testified that he currently is the District Operations Engineer for District 8 and has been in that position for the previous 6 years. Monroe has a masters degree in civil engineering. He testified that District 8 includes Missouri Avenue where the accident occurred in this case. He stated that prior to being the District Operations Engineer for District 8 he was a Field Operations Engineer beginning in 2000. In May 2000 he testified he was working as a Traffic Operation Engineer and Field Operations Engineer. As a Traffic Operation Engineer he was responsible for signage and striping of the roads within his District. He stated that as a Field Operations Engineer he was responsible for the safe operations and upkeep of roadways in his zone. He testified that in May 2000 Steve Wheeler was the field technician for Bowman Maintenance facility located at Seventh and Exchange in East St. Louis, IL. Wheeler was responsible for repair and maintenance for stretches of road including Route 15.

Monroe testified that since May 2000 he has become aware of standing water on Missouri Avenue. He stated that as of May 2000 he was unaware of any flooding issues near the 3300 block of Missouri Avenue. Monroe testified that standing water covering a full lane of traffic is a potential driving hazard to the motorist public. He testified that it is reasonable for a person to expect a dry road surface when driving and it is not raining. He further stated that if IDOT is aware of standing water on a roadway then the appropriate action is to place a warning sign in the area. In this area he stated that IDOT could not make drastic changes to the roadway because the drainage of water from the roadway was the responsibility of the City of East St. Louis as it owned the drainage sewers. Monroe testified that Claimant's Exhibits 10, 11, 12, and 13 depict IDOT warning signs placed near the accident site shortly after accident.

Monroe testified that he became aware of the recurrent flooding in the areas after 2000. He testified that IDOT generally drives all roadways in a District on a regular basis. He stated that there is no set routine but workers should regularly drive the district's roads to check out the condition. He stated that as of May 2000 the majority of "maintainers" drove past the 33 hundred block of Missouri Avenue on their way to work. Monroe also testified that in May 2000 there was a 24 hour communication center wherein the public could report dangerous conditions on the roadway and during normal working hours the public would call the safety and claims bureau to report dangerous conditions. Monroe also stated that IDOT relies on local governmental agencies such as police departments to report problems with roadways. After this testimony Claimant rested.

Respondent called Mr. Monroe in its case in chief to testify. Monroe reviewed Supplemental Departmental Report pages 12 through 31 which contained the IDOT call in logs and motor safety logs from May 19 to 24, 2000. He testified that he was familiar with IDOT's

processes on these logs and these logs were maintained in the regular course of business. He reviewed the logs and there was no reference to a complaint of standing water on Missouri Avenue at 3300 block between May 19th and 22nd. Monroe stated that at some point an IDOT employee must have received a report of standing water on Missouri Avenue near the 3300 block due to an IDOT Memorandum from R.D. Reeves to Angela Blackburn. The Memorandum, dated July 6, 2000, stated that Mr. Reeves observed water in several locations of Missouri Avenue on May 22nd. Monroe also testified that there was an agreement with East St. Louis wherein IDOT maintains the roadway, shoulders and right of way and East St. Louis maintains the drainage sewers.

On cross examination Monroe was shown Claimant's Exhibit 6 which contained a memorandum from Gary Smith that denotes Claimant filing a complaint about road conditions on May 22nd. Monroe testified that the May 22nd complaint from Claimant was not contained in the logs he was referred to previously. Monroe further testified that even if an employee going home observes a dangerous condition on a roadway, the employee has a duty to take some action. If there is a recurrent problem then it should be addressed. Monroe also testified that at the request of East St. Louis IDOT did assess the area in question in relation to the flooding problems. He stated that flooding in the area was caused by a large rain event or by discharge of waste water into the combined sewer system from a nearby industrial plant, or a combination of both. Monroe stated that the first time he knew that the IDOT Bowman facility became aware of flooding in the area in questions was on May 22, 2000, and that IDOT acted appropriately by erecting a warning sign.

The Supplemental Departmental Report was admitted into evidence as Respondent's Exhibit #1. The Original Departmental Report was admitted into evidence as Claimant's Exhibit

#6.

III. Analysis

Claimant has made a claim for negligence. In order to prevail, Claimant must establish a duty owed to Claimant by Respondent, a breach of that duty by Respondent, and damages resulting proximately from that breach. *Chandler v. Illinois Central Railroad Co.*, 207 Ill. 2d 331, 340, 798 N.E.2d 724, 729 (2003). There is no question that Respondent owes a duty of ordinary care to maintain its roadways in a reasonably safe condition, *Reidy v. State*, 31 Ill. Ct. Cl. 16 (1975), but Respondent is not a guarantor of the safety of all drivers on its roads. This duty of ordinary care only arises when the Respondent has notice of the defect at issue. *Sutter and Fleming v. State*, 48 Ill. Ct. Cl. 84 (1996). The duty of ordinary care extends to the warning of potential dangerous conditions on the roadways of which the State has notice. *Sutter and Fleming v. State*, 48 Ill. Ct. Cl. 84 (1996).

In this case, Claimant alleges that Missouri Avenue near the 3300 block near East St. Louis contained a defective condition, specifically it was prone to frequent flooding that posed a danger to the motorist public. Claimant asserts that Respondent negligently failed to inspect, repair and maintain Missouri Avenue free of standing water and/or failed to warn the motorist public of the dangerous condition of water on the roadway. There are really two issues to be considered: (1) whether Respondent is liable for the negligent inspection, repair or maintenance of the road thus causing flooding; and (2) whether Respondent is liable for failing to warn of the condition.

Claimant's first theory of liability, the failure to inspect, repair or maintain the roadway fails. IDOT engineer Monroe testified that there is an agreement between IDOT and the City of East St. Louis wherein IDOT maintains the roadway, shoulders, and land within the right of way

and East St. Louis is responsible for sewers and drainage. Claimant presented no evidence to indicate that the flooding was caused by any condition of the roadway itself. The only evidence as to the actual cause of the flooding on the roadway was from Monroe who stated that he personally observed flooding on the location in question from the manhole cover on westbound Route 15. Monroe testified that it was his understanding that there was a flooding problem on Route 15 near the 3300 block due to the fact the sewers maintained by East St. Louis in that area were in a combination sewer system that accepted industrial, residential and storm runoff. As there was no evidence presented that the flooding was caused by a failure to inspect, maintain or repair the roadway by Respondent, Claimant's first theory of liability fails.

The second theory of liability is that Respondent had actual or constructive knowledge of the dangerous condition on the roadway and failed to warn the motorist public. The Court of Claims has held that when Respondent has actual or constructive notice of recurrent standing water on a roadway that the Respondent has a duty to warn the motorist public. *Scott v. State of Illinois*, 43 Ill.Ct.Cl. 85 (1990). The key inquiry is the reasonableness of Respondent's actions in light of the notice it had.

In this case the only testimony as to the recurrence of standing water on Route 15 as of May 20, 2000 is that of East St. Louis Police Officer Andrews. Officer Andrews testified that it was common knowledge that Missouri Avenue flooded whenever it rained. He further testified that the standing water would remain on the roadway until such time that it evaporated. Mr. Monroe testified that the flooding in the area even occurred due to non-rain events. The evidence at trial indicates that the flooding in the area in question was not a case of a flashflood that quickly recedes; but rather was a recurrent flooding problem wherein the water remains for a period of days. Furthermore, the evidence demonstrates that not only did the flooding occur

during wet weather but sometimes when it was not raining due to the sewer discharge.

If in fact Respondent had actual knowledge of flooding on Missouri Avenue prior to the accident then Mr. Monroe testified that IDOT had a duty to place a warning sign up. As such if no warning sign was placed then Respondent breached its duty. A preponderance of the evidence weighs in favor of the fact that Respondent had actual knowledge, or with any degree of due diligence would have gained actual knowledge, of recurrent flooding on Missouri Avenue. While Respondent was not responsible to repair the sewers nothing prevented Respondent from erecting a sign to warn motorists of the possibility of water on the roadway. As such Respondent breached its duty to warn.

The next inquiry is whether the water on the roadway caused the accident. The testimony from Claimant is that around 8:00 p.m. he was travelling on westbound Missouri Avenue. He stated that it was dark and his vehicle was working properly. He stated that he went over an overpass and after reaching the bottom of the other side of the overpass he hit the standing water, hydroplaned and struck a utility pole on the north side of the road. Officer Andrews, while not a witness, opined that Claimant lost control due to the standing water and struck the pole. Respondent offered no evidence to contradict this version of events. As such the accident was proximately caused by the standing water on the roadway.

The final element of his case is damages. Claimant seeks damages for his medical expenses, pain, suffering and disability, disfigurement and for lost wages. Claimant stated that in the accident he hit his head on the windshield and was woozy. He stated that he cut his forehead and hurt his leg, neck and back. Claimant testified that he was taken via ambulance to Kenneth Hall Regional Hospital (formerly St. Mary's Hospital) in East St. Louis via ambulance. He testified that he was treated and released. Claimant's Exhibit #7 is a medical bill from

Kenneth Hall Hospital in the amount of \$1,117.60. Claimant stated that the medical bill from Kenneth Hall Hospital was paid. He then testified that he was treated at Frick Chiropractic Clinic in Cahokia, IL after the accident. Claimant's Exhibit #8 is a medical bill from Frick Chiropractic Clinic in the amount of \$199.00 and Claimant testified that the bill was paid. Claimant also stated that he has a scar on his forehead from the accident. The scar appears to be about an inch in length and goes from Claimant's hairline in the middle of his forehead towards his left eye.

On the issue of medical expenses Respondent argues that Claimant has not proven a causal link between the accident and the medical services provided because there is no expert testimony. In order to recover medical expenses due to an accident Claimant must establish two things: (1) the medical services were reasonable and necessary to treat the injuries suffered by the Claimant and caused by the negligence of the Respondent, i.e. causally connected to the accident; and (2) the medical services were reasonable and necessary for like services in the area. While generally in order to establish that the medical services are causally connected to the injuries suffered expert testimony is required, if the need for the medical services is so obvious to be within the realm of a layperson's knowledge, no expert testimony is required. *Brown v. Baker*, 2184 Ill.App.3d 401, 405, 672 N.E.2d 69, 71 (5th Dist. 1996).⁴ In this case the ambulance and treatment at Kenneth Hall Hospital on the evening of the accident are within the realm of knowledge of the layperson. As such Claimant has met his burden by a preponderance

⁴ "Generally, a plaintiff in a personal injury case must present the testimony of a medical expert to establish causation if the relationship between the claimed injury and the event in question requires special knowledge and training to establish. For example, if a plaintiff suffers a cut in an accident, the jury can readily determine without expert testimony that the accident caused the cut. But, if the nature of plaintiff's injury is complex or if the condition could be the result of some event or condition other than the accident in question, then expert testimony may be needed to establish the particular event that caused the pain and the underlying medical condition. This proof of causation is usually accomplished by presenting testimony from a physician on the causation issue." See *Brown v. Baker*, 2184 Ill.App.3d 401, 405, 672 N.E.2d 69, 71 (5th Dist. 1996).

of the evidence that the medical services from the ambulance and Kenneth Hall Hospital were reasonable and necessary. The next prong is whether Claimant established that the medical bills were reasonable for like services in the area. The law provides that a paid bill is *prima facie* evidence of the reasonableness of the charges. *Arthur v. Catour*, 216 Ill.2d 72, 82; 833 N.E.2d 847, 853 (2005). Since those bills were paid the Claimant has met his burden of proving the services were reasonable to treat the injuries he suffered. As such Claimant has met his burden to recover the \$1,117.60 medical bills from Kenneth Hall Hospital. The Frick Chiropractic Clinic services are a different story. The layperson cannot ascertain whether said chiropractic services were reasonable and necessary to treat the injuries of Claimant. As such Claimant failed to meet his burden of proof that the Frick Chiropractic Clinic services were causally connected to treat the injuries Claimant suffered due to the accident.

Claimant seeks pain and suffering due to his injuries. Claimant did not suffer any broken bones but was involved in a motor vehicle accident nonetheless. As such Claimant is awarded \$2,000 for pain and suffering.

Claimant also seeks \$1,100 in lost wages. Claimant has failed to meet his burden of proof on this issue. Claimant failed to present any documentary evidence of his wages in May of 2000. He further could not remember his hourly wage at the time of the accident. As such Claimant has not proven his claim for lost wages.

The final damage for Claimant is the scar on his head. In light of the location and prominence of the scar Claimant is awarded \$5,000 for the scar.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that Claimants' claim is granted. Claimant is awarded \$8,117.60 in total damages.

ALDRIDGE ELECTRIC, INC., Claimant, v. STATE OF ILLINOIS, DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION, Respondent.

Breach of contract, Misrepresentation- The government impliedly warrants the accuracy of matters set forth in contract documents and is liable for breach of contract when they provide material misrepresentations on which a contractor relies. To prevail, the contractor must establish (1) State's plans and specifications contained a material misrepresentation, (2) contractor relied on that misrepresentation, and (3) contractor's reliance on said misrepresentation caused him financial harm. Claimant proved that IDOT's negligent estimate of 2,183 (instead of the correct 2,017) T1 signals was a material misrepresentation on which Claimant relied and due to its reliance, suffered economic damages in calculating the bid.

Breach of contract, Damages- Sufficient damages are awarded to place the injured party in as good a position as he would have been had the breaching party fully performed. Claimant must show that but for the breach, the damages alleged would not have been suffered. Damages must be foreseeable at the time the parties entered the contract, meaning they must be the natural and proximate result of the breach. The State's error in the estimate caused Claimant to lose profits by providing a lower unit price. Had the State provided the correct lower estimate, Claimant would have submitted a higher unit/bid price to recover its revenue.

Breach of contract, Implied duty of good faith, Implied duty to cooperate, Implied duty not to hinder performance- Claimant must prove (1) the delay was for an unreasonable amount of time, (2) the delay was proximately caused by the State's actions, (3) the delay resulted in some injury to the contractor, and (4) the State was the sole proximate cause of the delay. State's actions in releasing authorization for performance of certain non-routine items, though they amounted to delays for Claimant, were not unreasonable.

Breach of contract, Payment of damages- Court of Claims cannot enter an award for damages unless sufficient funds were available to pay the damages. The court found insufficient funds to pay the full damages claimed by Claimant and limited the payment to the amount of funds available as shown in a Departmental Report.

OPINION

Sprague, C.J.

Claimant, Aldridge Electric filed this Complaint against Respondent, Illinois Department of Transportation on March 5, 2003, alleging two counts of breach of contract related to Electrical Maintenance Contract 60608. In Count I, Claimant seeks \$1,419,210 in damages, alleging that Respondent's negligent estimate in the bidding documents constituted a misrepresentation it relied on when making its bid. In Count II, Claimant seeks \$559,363 in damages and alleges that Respondent breached its implied duty not to hinder performance when it unreasonably hindered and delayed in releasing authorization for performance of certain non-routine work items under the contract. A three day trial was heard before a Commissioner beginning on February 7, 2011.

FACTUAL BACKGROUND

On August 18, 1998 the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) made available the bidding documents for the District 1 Electrical Maintenance Contract 60608 (EMC 60608). Work under EMC 60608 was to begin at 12 a.m. on January 1, 1999 and end on December 31, 1999. IDOT had the option to renew it for another year, which in this case it did. EMC 60608 covered several counties and required that the contractor maintain the following IDOT electrical systems: lighting, pump stations, traffic signals, the surveillance system, weigh stations, special systems (including the reversible lane controls) and miscellaneous systems, such as ice beacons, navigational lighting systems, and camera systems.

EMC 60608 was subsequently awarded to Aldridge with its bid of \$15,392,513.87. This bid was \$120,000 less than that of Meade Electric, the only other bidder on this EMC.

According to Michael Calihan, Aldridge Project Manager for EMC 60608, and current Aldridge Director of Training and Employment, Aldridge had been bidding on IDOT's EMC since 1985, and it was awarded the EMC in '86, '91, '92, '93, and '94. Calihan stated that during the '85-'01

period, with the exception of maybe one year, Meade Electric was the only other company that bid on the District 1 EMC. Michael Knutson, currently Vice President of Infrastructure at Meade Electric testified that in the last 60 years Meade had been awarded the District 1 EMC about 53 times. Knutson, a Meade employee for thirty-two years, was a Contract Manager for Meade in 1999 and had held that position since 1995.

EMC 60608 was broken down into routine and non-routine maintenance of the previously mentioned electrical systems. Non-routine work was the less significant portion of EMC 60608. Before non-routine work could be performed, IDOT would have to authorize it. IDOT would release its authorization letters on the EMC MS database, which the contractors were required to check every day for IDOT authorization postings. Martin Anderson, IDOT Bureau Chief of Electrical Operations since 1990 (now retired), stated that the decisions regarding when to authorize the non-routine work were, among other things, based on budgetary considerations and required field reports submitted by the contractor.

Once the non-routine work was authorized, Aldridge was then required to submit its plans for completing the work to IDOT for approval. This was a back and forth process between the contractor and IDOT and could take several months. Although Aldridge was not allowed to start performing the non-routine work until IDOT approved the plans, it was allowed to purchase the material and equipment necessary for the project.

Calihan indicated that the routine maintenance portion of the EMC was really the meat of the contract and required many fixed costs such as workshop facilities, warehouses, manpower required to administer the contract, communications equipment, a 24 hour dispatch center, and specialized fleet of maintenance vehicles. Calihan stated that routine maintenance of the five different types of traffic signals (T1-T5) constituted the bulk of the EMC contract. It

accounted for 65% of the total bid price for the contract, with the T1 signals constituting about 60% of the total bid price, and signals T2-T5 making up the other 5%.

Calihan described that in a typical T1 traffic signal location, at the intersection of two or more roads, there would be a control cabinet with electronic equipment in it; mast arm mounted signals that go over the road; post mounted signals that sit on the side of the road; various types of detectors in the pavement, or external to the pavement, to count the cars; lighting; and signs, among other things.

Calihan stated that prior to 1999, IDOT paid the contractor for T1 signal maintenance on a unit-price basis, and that in all EMC's prior to 1999 each of these various components of a T1 location was designated as a different unit for which the contractor had to submit a unit bid price. For example, there would be one unit bid price for control cabinets, another unit bid price for mast arm mounted signals, and so on and so forth. For each of these different T1 location components/units, the contractor was paid at the end of the month for the total amount of units it maintained. This was known as a "pieces and parts" contract. With EMC 60608, however, IDOT switched over to a new payment scheme and designated an entire T1 location as a single unit. Thus, under EMC 60608, the contractor was to be paid based on the total number of T1 locations it maintained instead of the various components at each of those locations.

Calihan stated that when Aldridge first got the bidding documents in August 1998, the listing in Volume 3 stated that there were 1,965 T1 locations, and section 15.19 indicated that this was a good estimate. Later, on September 4, 1998, IDOT provided an addendum to the bid documents indicating that there were 2,183 estimated T1 locations. Aldridge used this 2,183 estimate in calculating the bid price for traffic signal locations and made a bid of \$354.29/T1 location. Both, former IDOT Bureau Chief Martin Anderson and Doris Leonard, an IDOT

Contract technician for 18 years, agreed that 2,183 was the number Aldridge should have used in calculating its bid.

Various portions of the contract (to be discussed in detail below) stated that 2,183 was an estimate, subject to variation for reasons such as construction, maintenance transfers, new installations, and maintenance agreement revisions and removals and that Claimant would only receive compensation for the actual number of locations it maintained in a given month.

Calihan testified that Aldridge did not attempt to verify this estimate by physically counting T1 signal locations because they only had a month to prepare the bid, and that was not enough time. Further, Calihan indicated that, based on Aldridge's prior dealings with IDOT, there would have been no need to doubt its estimate and try verifying it. Knutson from Meade Electric testified that Meade – who had the EMC for 53 out of the last 60 years - never sent anyone out to verify the traffic signal estimates specified in the bidding documents.

Knutson concurred that, historically, IDOT's numbers were accurate and that he never had any reason to believe otherwise. When bidding on EMC 60608, Meade Electric never verified the EMC Maintenance System database (EMC MS) to see if the 2,183 estimate compared with numbers in the database, even though Meade had access to the EMC MS since it was still working on the EMC prior to 60608. Knutson stated that although there was going to be variation between the 2,183 estimate and how many signals would actually be on maintenance, he never doubted that an IDOT location was identified correctly. He took the 2,183 estimate to mean that if all the T1 locations were on maintenance, there would be 2,183 locations.

Calihan noted that in Aldridge's previous dealings with IDOT, the actual units were usually 2 to 3 percent more than the estimate supplied in the bidding documents because of

growth toward the end of the contract. Conversely, Knutson stated that the actual quantities Meade got paid for were usually 10% less than the estimated quantities in the bidding documents. However, based on Claimant's Routine Maintenance Payments Analysis Chart, introduced at trial as Claimant's Tr. Exh. 12, it is apparent that in the four years (95-98) prior to EMC 60608, when Meade had the EMC, the actual units Meade was paid for were greater than the estimates in the bidding documents.

When the contract began on January 1, 1999, Aldridge was responsible for completing, by February 1, a form IDOT District One inventory for each traffic signal location it maintained. Aldridge was responsible for inputting that data into the IDOT Electrical Maintenance Contract Management System (EMC MS) database by March 1. Despite this, Calihan stated that Aldridge was not responsible for counting the locations it was to get paid for. He explained, that in the past, IDOT would always provide them with a "base number" (which was very close to the bidding estimate) and then as signals went on and off throughout the contract, adjustments would be made to that base number.

With respect to the T1 locations, Calihan stated that Aldridge was paid based on the bid amount (2,183) up until March. He noted that soon after the contract started in January, David Ziesemer, then head of IDOT Bureau of Traffic, stated that he wanted to investigate whether 2,183 locations was accurate. Calihan offered the services of his Dispatch Supervisor, James Jennings, and three months later, IDOT discovered errors in the database. Jennings, now a Facilities Manager at Aldridge, stated that he spent several days a week during the three month period in Ziesemer's office going over maps of the intersections, IDOT records and files, and the EMC MS database. In April IDOT paid Aldridge based on a new base of 2,066 locations and

retroactively applied that base number to reduce the payments that Aldridge received from January through March.

By May 1999, IDOT realized there were some more errors in the database and changed the base to 2,017 locations. Starting June 1999, IDOT started paying Aldridge \$66,463/month less based on the new figure of 2,017 T1 traffic signal locations. During the course of the contract, IDOT also recouped the \$274,913 it overpaid Aldridge for the months of January through May.

Even though Aldridge was getting paid less because there were less T1 traffic signal locations, Aldridge was still obligated to continue with the fixed cost requirements under the contract. The only provision that afforded Aldridge any relief with respect to fixed costs was the one allowing for reduction of patrolmen. Aldridge submitted a request for three less patrolmen in April, and eventually, in September 1999 IDOT allowed Aldridge to have two less traffic signal patrolmen, thereby reducing Aldridge's fixed cost obligations.

With respect to the non-routine portion of this contract, IDOT did not authorize almost half the non-routine work for 1999 until the last four months of that year. Consequently, about a third of the non-routine work authorized in 1999 carried over to 2000. According to Claimant, this backlog, along with IDOT releasing 26% of the non-routine work for 2000 in the last three months of that year, resulted in a substantial carryover of non-routine work into 2001 that Claimant had to finish after the contract term was over in 2000.

In Count I of this Complaint, Claimant alleges that IDOT is liable for damages stemming from its negligent estimate regarding T1 locations in the routine maintenance portion of this contract because had Claimant known there would be 166 less T1 locations, it would have bid higher than \$354.29/unit. In Count II, Claimant asserts Respondent is liable for damages due to

its unreasonable delays in authorizing non-routine work. Because of these delays, a significant amount of work spilled over into 2001, and Claimant incurred extra labor related costs to perform this work after the two-year contract period.

Respondent asserts that it is not liable for the variance between the actual T1 locations Claimant maintained and the 2,183 estimate provided in the bidding documents. It argues that the specifications in the bidding documents and the certifications that Claimant was required to make in its bid proposal all unambiguously state that estimates provided in the bidding documents were not certain and were subject to change, and that Claimant would only get paid for the actual number of locations serviced. Respondent further asserts that Claimant knew that the actual number of locations was lower than in the estimate because of certain documents made available to Claimant before it was awarded the contract, and after it was awarded the contract but before the Contract term started.

COUNT I

Analysis

In Count I of its Complaint Claimant posits four different theories of recovery, all of which essentially state that IDOT is liable for a breach of contract because the negligent preparation of its 2,183 T1 signal estimate constituted a material misrepresentation that Claimant relied on to its financial detriment when calculating the unit bid price for T1 locations in EMC 60608.

The government impliedly warrants the accuracy of matters set forth in contract documents. *D.F.K. Enterprises, Inc. v. U.S.*, 45 Fed.Cl. 280, 285 (1999). Thus, the government is liable to contractors for breach of contract where the State-prepared specifications contain material misrepresentations on which the contractor relied. *See Talsma Builders, Inc. v. State*

(1976), 31 Ill.Ct.Cl. 143, 145-46. For a contractor to prevail in such an action he must establish: 1. the State's plans and specifications contained a material misrepresentation; 2. the contractor relied on that misrepresentation; and 3. the contractor's reliance on said misrepresentation caused him financial harm. *See Id.*

In a breach of contract context a misrepresentation occurs when the government misleads a contractor by a negligently untrue representation of fact or fails to disclose information it has a duty to disclose. *Meyers Companies, Inc. v. U.S.*, 41 Fed.Cl. 303, 311 (1998). A misrepresentation is "material" if the plaintiff would have acted differently had he been aware of it, or if it concerned the type of information upon which he would be expected to rely when making his decision to act. *Miller v. William Chevrolet/GEO, Inc.*, 326 Ill. App. 3d 642, 650, 762 N.E.2d 1, 8 (1st Dist., 2001).

Thus, our first determination is whether IDOT's 2,183 estimate constituted a misrepresentation.

1. Material Misrepresentation

In the case at bar, Claimant asserts that it was misled by Respondent's negligently prepared, untrue "good estimate" of 2,183 T1 traffic locations. Further, Claimant notes that T1 traffic signals are a significant portion of the routine maintenance component of this contract, noting that in the four years prior when Meade Electric had the District 1 EMC, it was paid an average of \$8.2 million per year for traffic signal maintenance versus less than an average of \$1.8 million per year for the other routine pay items.

Although estimates are not warranties or guarantees, the government is under a duty to fashion material estimates in government prepared specifications with reasonable care. *See Celeron Gathering Corp. v. U.S.*, 34 Fed.Cl. 745, 752 (1996). Reasonable care does not require

the government to be clairvoyant, but the government is obliged to base its estimate on all relevant information that is reasonably available to it. *Hi-Shear Technology Corp. v. U.S.*, 53 Fed.Cl. 420, 430 (2002). Since the government is in the best position to acquire information about its internal operations and needs, its duty to provide a reasonable estimate requires more when additional information is available upon reasonable investigation. *Educators Associates, Inc. v. U.S.*, 41 Fed.Cl. 811, 816-17 (1998).

Martin Anderson stated that Dave Ziesemer, head of the Bureau of Traffic, came up with the original estimate of 1,965 T1 locations but did not know how he came up with that number. Anderson further testified that the estimate was changed in the September 4 addendum because on September 3, Ziesemer sent a speed memo indicating that he wanted to change the 1,965 number to 2,183. Anderson did not know why Ziesemer wanted to change the number, but stated that he recalled talk about changing the number to reflect growth projections. Anderson did not know how growth was calculated into that number. Leonard's testimony further indicated that no one verified whether the old 1,965 estimate was accurate before changing it to 2,183.

According to Calihan, Aldridge did not think that this new estimate was made to account for growth in the system over the life of the contract because 218 additional locations in the span of two years was more growth than Aldridge had ever seen in the years that it had this EMC. Instead, Aldridge assumed that the new estimate was a correction and reflected the most accurate estimate available. Meade's Knutson stated that he had originally thought IDOT had accounted for growth in the new estimate, but after looking at the various charts and documents at trial, he no longer thought so.

When IDOT finally did embark on ascertaining the actual number of T1 locations, it did so after the contract term started, and it took about three months. Jennings and Ziesemer, along with IDOT's employee Obed Ortiz, conducted the audit by comparing the EMC MS database with the documents that were a part of EMC 60608, and IDOT's files, notes, and maps with the various intersections noted on them. IDOT'S audit determined that there were 2,066 T1 locations, and IDOT started paying Aldridge based on this newly determined number of locations and also retroactively reduced its prior payments to Aldridge based on this number. The database errors were mainly due to duplication of locations: specifically, if the intersection contained roads that were referred to by more than one name, the intersection showed up on the EMC MS database as multiple locations because it was entered into the EMC MS database under each of those different road names. A few months after the audit, IDOT discovered even more errors in the EMC MS database and this time concluded there were actually 2,017 T1 locations – 166 less T1 locations than the 2,183 estimate that Claimant was told to use in the bidding documents.

Respondent does not have the burden of establishing the reasonableness of its procedure in obtaining its estimate until Claimant has first met its burden of persuasion. *See Crown Laundry and Dry Cleaners, Inc. v. U.S.*, 29 Fed.Cl. 506, 520 (1993). But here, Claimant was merely asking what the procedure for obtaining the estimate was, and no one testifying for the Respondent even knew how the initial 1,965 T1 estimate was obtained by Ziesemer, or how and why the new, subsequent 2,183 T1 estimate was obtained by him. Given that EMC 60608 was the first time that IDOT was paying contractors based on T1 locations instead of parts, it is hard to understand why the Bureau administering the contract would not be more involved in ensuring the accuracy of the estimate –especially since routine maintenance of T1 signals in the

past accounted for a significant portion of the payments that IDOT made to the contractor. Further, when IDOT/Zieseemer did try verifying the actual number of locations, they used IDOT's maps and files, and records in the EMC MS database – the same information that IDOT would have had access to before the contract was entered into.

Based on all the above, we find IDOT was negligent in providing its estimate regarding T1 locations to Claimant because it failed to reasonably verify and produce its estimates using information that was readily available to it at the time it made the estimate. Thus, we find that IDOT's estimate of 2,183 T1 locations was a misrepresentation because IDOT misled Aldridge by requiring it to use in its bid calculations the incorrect 2,183 estimate it negligently provided.

We now turn to whether this misrepresentation was material. Aldridge explains that routine T1 traffic signal maintenance was the largest portion of EMC 60608. Pursuant to Article 5.3.1., there were lots of fixed costs associated with the routine maintenance portion of the contract that would have remained basically the same whether there were 2,183 T1 locations or 2,017 T1. Thus, had Respondent not misrepresented there were 2,183 T1 locations, and instead provided an accurate estimate of 2,017 locations, Aldridge would have given a higher bid than \$349.29/unit. Had Aldridge known that there were closer to 2,017 T1 locations, it would never have entered into a contract where it received \$354.29/unit. Thus, we find that IDOT's negligent estimate of 2,183 T1 locations was a material misrepresentation.

Regardless, Respondent points to the following provisions to argue that it is not liable for any damages arising from variation between actual quantities and the estimates in the bidding documents:

15:19 of the bidding specifications states:

Volume 3 of this contract contains a July 1998 listing of the State of Illinois maintained signal locations in District 1 including a listing of the type and

number of signal appurtenances (equipment at each). The number of locations is constantly changing due to construction, maintenance transfers, new installations, maintenance agreement revisions and removals. The number and type of equipment is listed to provide the Contract with a good estimate of the inventory, but the listing shall be considered to be only an estimate and the Department should not be held accountable for any errors in this listing.

Article 5.4.3 of EMC 60608 states:

Quantities included for bidding are only estimates and actual quantities may vary. The pace of construction activities within the District as well as a number of other unpredictable factors will cause variances from these indicated quantities, both for routine maintenance pay items as well as non-routine pay items. The Contractor's unit prices are expected to be realistic and no additional compensation will be allowed to due to a variance in quantities;...The Contractor is cautioned against unbalanced bidding and is directed to Article 102.08(c) of the Standard Specifications.

Respondent argues that these provisions clearly establish that when bidders were to make bids based on an estimate of 2,183 locations, they were to take into consideration that this number would vary from the actual amount of locations they would service, and more importantly bidders would not receive further compensation for the variances between the estimated 2,183 locations and the actual locations serviced.

Irrespective of IDOT's disclaimers however, even where a contract disclaims all warranties or guarantees with respect to an estimate, the government is under a duty to fashion material estimates with reasonable care. *Celeron Gathering Corp. v. U.S.* at 752 (1996). Disclaimers of estimate afford a flexibility sufficient to accommodate actual deviations from the estimate, but the latitude that it affords may not properly be used to excuse the estimator from using relevant information that is reasonably available to him. *See Chemical Technology, Inc. v. U. S.*, 227 Ct.Cl. 120, 645 F.2d 934, 948 (1981). IDOT's disclaimers cannot shield it from the liability it incurred by breaching its duty to fashion estimates with reasonable care when it negligently misrepresented 2,183 as a good estimate of T1 locations.

In addition to these provisions in the specifications, Respondent also points to certain certifications that bidders, once they were actually ready to submit a bid, were to file along with their bid proposals. Anderson (the IDOT Bureau Chief of Electrical Operations during EMC 60608) stated at trial that these paragraphs emphasize that the schedule of prices to which the contractor bids are estimates and the contractor is not guaranteed to be paid those numbers; the contractor will only be paid for actual quantities; and the contractor declares that he understands that to be the case and that he waives rights to claim anything that he misunderstood what these requirements were, and that he has visited the location, is familiar with the surroundings, and the conditions for the contract.

However, again, the provisions of a contract directing contractors to visit the site and inform themselves of the actual conditions will not relieve the government from liability due to defects in the plans and specifications. *Arcole Const. Co. v. State* (1941), 11 Ill.Ct.Cl. 423, 434-35. Where the defect is a misrepresentation of a material fact, like in the case at bar, independent investigation of T1 locations is beyond the scope of the language in these certifications because the government provided a positive representation, a self-proclaimed "good estimate", of 2,183 T1 locations that Claimant had a right to rely on without an investigation to prove its falsity. *See id.*

Further, even when IDOT finally attempted to determine the actual number of T1 locations in January-March/April, it did not go out into the field and try physically counting actual locations; it compared its records, files, intersection maps, and EMC MS. Thus, it is

doubtful that an actual site location count would have been helpful - especially since Calihan would not know how the intersections were classified in the EMC MS database.⁵

Having found that IDOT's estimate of 2,183 T1 locations was a material misrepresentation, we now turn to whether Claimant relied on the material misrepresentation.

2. Contractor's reliance on the misrepresentation

Based on the testimonies of Knutson and Calihan, it is apparent that neither Aldridge nor Meade felt the need to verify the 2,138 estimate because they had never needed to verify any of IDOT's estimates in the past. They trusted IDOT because it had always provided good estimates, and had no reason to doubt that the 2,183 estimate would be accurate - especially since IDOT provided the 2,183 estimate as an update on the previous 1,965 "good estimate." Claimant then relied on this 2,183 estimate/material misrepresentation to calculate its unit bid price for T1 (or traffic signal) locations.

Nonetheless, Respondent argues that even if its estimate was negligent, Aldridge should have known that it was wrong after reviewing the September 8, 1998 Addendum, "Sample Routine Maintenance Quantities." The addendum listed the various quantities of parts or components that IDOT paid Meade for maintaining during January 1998 to June 1998. Since Meade's 1998 EMC was a "pieces and parts" contract, T1 traffic signal locations were not listed.

However, Knutson stated that there was a direct correlation between the number of E5 and E15 controllers that Meade was paid for and the number of T1 locations, because there was usually only one controller per intersection. Calihan, however stated that the relationship was not that simple because sometimes if intersections were close enough to each other, one controller would service multiple intersections.

⁵ Calihan testified, for example, that sometimes one controller controlled several intersections that were next to one another - he stated that he did not know whether that would be considered 1 T1 location even though each intersection had its own traffic lights.

At trial, Knutson was asked to add up the E5 and E15 totals in the September 8 Addendum, and he came up with a total of about 1,930. This was 87 locations less than the 2,017 estimate IDOT eventually determined. Knutson seems to suggest that this difference is attributable to the signals that were "off" during that period. But it is uncertain how much of these variances are due to "off" signals or, as Calihan suggested, multiple intersections being controlled by the same controller.

We do not find that the number of E5 and E15 controllers would have apprised Aldridge that the 2,183 estimate was wrong - especially since Aldridge had just received an addendum four days before providing a new 2,138 estimate of T1 signals to bid, and Aldridge justifiably understood that to be a corrected, more accurate revision of the prior estimate of 1,965. Further, Knutson was uncertain whether Meade itself had even counted the E5 and E15 totals when bidding EMC 60608, and there is no evidence that IDOT ever added or considered the total amount of controllers when making its T1 signal estimate.

Respondent also argues that, even aside from the September 8 Addendum, Aldridge still knew, or should have known, that its estimate was wrong because of the patrol routes Aldridge was required to provide at the November 24, 1998 pre-construction meeting. Patrol routes indicated the different traffic signal intersections that were to be maintained among the signal patrolmen. Calihan testified that since Aldridge did not have any patrolmen at that time, and Meade was then performing work under the previous EMC, Aldridge asked for, and was given, Meade's patrol route sheets. Calihan elaborated that there was a good chance the routes would stay the same anyway, because traffic signal work was so specialized that both companies would usually have to hire the same patrolmen for the District 1 EMC. IDOT introduced a chart made

by Leonard, in which Leonard had calculated that Meade's patrol route indicated that there were 2,047 T1 signal locations.

Calihan testified that Aldridge never counted the number of traffic locations on Meade's patrol route sheets because the documents were lengthy - over 100 pages long - and contained more than just lists of T1 traffic signal locations. Further, Calihan stated that the patrol route sheets were not submitted for the purpose of verifying traffic signal locations, but to match up signal patrolmen with routes that were close to where they lived to minimize travel time.

Knutson also testified that the patrol route sheets were not intended to be used for determining or counting traffic signal locations and that Meade never used them for that purpose. Further, both Leonard and Anderson stated that no one from IDOT counted traffic signal locations on Meade's patrol route sheets that Aldridge submitted at the pre-construction meeting. IDOT did not count the locations on the patrol route sheets until after Aldridge tried obtaining relief from IDOT under its available administrative remedies.

Notably, the patrol route sheets were presented on November 24, 1998 - about two months after Aldridge had already made its bid, and about a month after it had been awarded the contract. Regardless of whether Aldridge would have been able to somehow renegotiate its unit bid price after being awarded the contract or that maybe Aldridge had these documents when it made the bid, we find that Aldridge was justified in disregarding any T1 location information in the patrol route sheets. The patrol route sheets were used as a tool to logistically allocate personnel for traffic signal maintenance, and, in addition to Aldridge, neither Meade nor IDOT used them for the purpose of counting or determining T1 locations.

3. Economic Damages due to reliance

Here Aldridge relied on Respondent's negligent estimate when Aldridge calculated its \$354.29/unit bid because it based its estimated revenue on maintenance of 2,183 T1 signals per month, or 26,196 T1 signal location maintenances a year. Had IDOT provided its lower, correct estimate of 2,017 that it established once the contract had already started, Aldridge would have expected revenue based on 24,204 T1 maintenances a year and bid a higher unit price for T1 signals since the fixed costs associated with routine T1 signal maintenance would not have been correspondingly lower. Thus, we find that Aldridge has proved that IDOT's estimate of 2,183 T1 signals constituted a material misrepresentation on which it relied, and due to its reliance Aldridge suffered economic damages. We now turn to determining the damages Aldridge suffered.

Damages

"The general rule in common law breach of contract cases is to award damages sufficient to place the injured party in as good a position as he or she would have been had the breaching party fully performed." *San Carlos Irrigation & Drainage Dist. v. U.S.*, Ill F.3d 1557, 1562-63 (Fed.Cir.1997). Thus, "[a] plaintiff must show that but for the breach, the damages alleged would not have been suffered." *Id.* Moreover, the damages must have been foreseeable at the time the parties entered the contract, which requires that they "be the natural and proximate result of the breach." *Locke v. U.S.*, 151 Ct.Cl. 262, 283 F.2d 521, 526 (1960).

Lost profits are a recognized measure of damages where their loss is the proximate result of the breach and the fact that there would have been a profit is definitely established, and there is some basis on which a reasonable estimate of the amount of the profit can be made. *Id.*

In a number of complex contract cases, however, exact computation of damages may prove to be extremely difficult. Therefore, courts have held that, "[t]he ascertainment of

damages, or of an equitable adjustment, is not an exact science, and where responsibility for damage *is* clear, it is not essential that the amount thereof be ascertainable with absolute exactness or mathematical precision." *Elec. and Missile Facilities, Inc. v. U.S.*, 189 Ct.Cl. 237, 416 F.2d 1345, 1358 (1969). The plaintiff can meet its burden of proving damages if it "furnishes the court with a reasonable basis for computation, even though the result is only approximate." *Hi-Shear Technology Corp. v. US*, 53 Fed.Cl. 420, 436-37 (2002).

Here, because the costs pertaining to the T1 signals were fixed, Aldridge's costs would have been the same whether it maintained 2,017 locations or it maintained 2,183 locations. After accounting for its fixed costs, Aldridge took the profit margin it wanted and divided it by the number of T1 signals that Respondent told it to bid, 2,183. Had Respondent provided the correct estimate of 2,017 T1 locations, Aldridge would have divided that same profit margin by 2,017 instead of 2,183 and come up with a higher unit-price. Put another way, to maintain the profit margin it wanted when it submitted its unit-price bid for an estimated 2,183 T1 signals, Aldridge would have bid a higher-unit price. The error in the estimate caused Aldridge to essentially lose profits by causing Aldridge to provide a lower unit price.

Aldridge had decided on a profit margin that required it generate \$9,280,980 in revenue a year on T1 signals. To determine its unit/bid price it would have to then divide that amount by the amount of units it expected to be paid for servicing during that year. Since IDOT's estimates for T1 signal units in the past had actually been slightly understated, Claimant expected that it would service at least the estimated 2,183 locations and based its unit bid price on the assumption that 2,183 actual units would be serviced a month. Accordingly its estimated yearly revenue for T1 signals was \$9,280,980 for each of the two years it had EMC 60608.

However, because the estimate was off by 166 locations, there was a significant variation in the actual T1 signal locations that Aldridge maintained and was paid for: in 1999 Aldridge received \$8,536,988 for routine T1 signal maintenance, and in 2000 it received \$8,598,264. The total of the differences between what Aldridge expected and what it received for each year (\$743,993 and \$682,717) is \$1,426,710. Aldridge argues that it is entitled to \$1,149,210 in damages (\$1,426,710 minus \$277,500 for reduction of two patrolmen in September 1999). Notably, Respondent offers no argument regarding how damages should be calculated. Nor does it offer any argument as to the reasonableness of how Claimant calculated its bid for T1 signals under the contract.

Given evidence that IDOT's estimates regarding T1 signal quantities in the past were greater than the estimates in the bidding documents, we find it reasonable for Claimant to calculate its unit/bid price based on an expected revenue from servicing the 2,183 T1 locations a month. Further, we are satisfied that had Claimant been provided the correct estimate, it would have applied the same rationale and submitted a higher unit/bid price that would have allowed it to recover \$1,426,710 in revenue. Thus, the amount seems appropriate to put Claimant in the position it would have been had the breach not occurred.

Accordingly, the Court finds for Claimant on Count I of its Complaint and further finds that Claimant has proven damages in the amount of \$1,149,210 for Count I.

COUNT II

Relevant Additional Facts

At a pre-construction meeting in December 1998, Claimant told Respondent that it was ready to start with the non-routine work and that IDOT should issue as many of the authorizations as it could as soon as the contract started. However, IDOT did not authorize

about half of the \$3.3 million worth of non-routine work for 1999 until the last four months of that year. Calihan testified that given the lengthy process for approving the contractor's plans once the non-routine work was authorized, IDOT's failure to issue authorizations sooner resulted in a backlog in 2000. About \$1.275 million of non-routine work from 1999 carried over to 2000.

Calihan stated that in late 1999, Aldridge discussed its issues with IDOT's delay in authorizing non-routine work and that IDOT agreed to release 75% of the remaining non-routine work by March of 2000. However, by the end of March 2000 IDOT only released about 43% of the remaining work, and around October it authorized \$940,000 of non-routine work that constituted 26% of the total non-routine work for that year.

Although Anderson did not recall any specific discussions about percentages of non-routine work to be released in 2000, he stated that Aldridge had expressed its concerns that non-routine work be authorized sooner in 2000. Anderson testified that IDOT appreciated Claimant's position and told it that it would take Claimant's position into consideration to the extent it could in determining when non-routine work was authorized. But no guarantee was made either orally or in writing that in 2000, IDOT would authorize certain percentages of non-routine work by a certain time period. There is no written contract modification regarding this matter.

Calihan stated that because of IDOT's delayed authorizations Aldrich had to perform a significant amount of non-routine work after the two year contract period was over. According to Calihan, this created additional costs for Aldridge since it had to bring in additional management and forces from outside to help finish the work, and once the work carried over past the two-year period into 2001, it became even more difficult to perform the work because the electrical workers working on EMC 60608 switched over to working for Meade when it got the EMC in 2001. He explained that the electrical work on this EMC is so specialized that the same

electrical workers working would usually work on the EMC regardless of which company held the contract.

Knutson testified that non-routine work usually goes over the two year period because the non-routine authorizations toward the end of the year take a while to complete. He stated that, although sometimes the work spilling over into another year could carry Meade through a period when they needed work, the non-routine work would typically not be profitable because the work would carry over a prolonged period of time, over the span of several periodic union wage increases. Knutson characterized the non-routine portion of the contract as the riskiest, because the contractor has no control over whether it will get to perform the work on which it is bidding.

Calihan agreed that EMC 60608 did not require IDOT to authorize non-routine work within a certain period of time. However, he stated that IDOT nonetheless had an implied duty to release the work within a reasonable period of time. He also stated that under the "strict letter of the contract" IDOT could issue as many non-routine work authorizations as late in the year as it wanted. However, again, he stated that under an implied duty IDOT could not do this because it would not be fair. He further agreed that under EMC 60608, IDOT did not even have to release the authorized work at all.

Analysis

The implied duty to cooperate and the implied duty not to hinder performance of contracts (both being subspecies of the implied duty of good faith) are present in all government contracts. *Precision Pine & Timber, Inc. v. U.S.*, 50 Fed.Cl. 35, 58 -59 (2001). The government can be liable for breach of this duty if it delays a contractor in performing work required to receive compensation under the contract. *Consumers Const. Co. v. Cook County*, 1 Ill. App. 3d

1087, 1094, 275 N.E.2d 696, 700 (1st Dist, 1971). However, potential loss from delay is inherent in any construction project, so if all the provisions of the agreement provide no apparent reasonable basis for the complainant to expect that the work could be done by a fixed period, then respondent is not liable for the damages alleged due to its delay. *J. F. Edwards Const. Co. v. Illinois State Toll Highway Authority*, 34 Ill. App. 3d 929, 930-32, 340 N.E.2d 572, 574 (3d Dist, 1975).

To prove that respondent breached its implied duty to cooperate and not to hinder performance of contracts, a claimant must establish the following: 1. the delay was for an unreasonable length of time; 2. the delay was proximately caused by the respondent's actions; 3. the delay resulted in some injury to the contractor; and 4. that the government was the sole proximate cause of the delay. *Fru-Con Corp. v. State* (1996), 50 Ill.Ct.Cl. 50, 67.

Here, it is undisputed that EMC 60608 did not require IDOT to authorize non-routine work within a certain period of time, or for that matter, require that IDOT authorize any non-routine work at all. Nonetheless, Claimant states that IDOT unreasonably delayed its authorizations of non-routine work under the contract. Merriam Webster's Dictionary defines "delay" as: "to put off; postpone." IDOT could not put off or postpone an event for which there was no anticipated date, or even time period.

Claimant is not aided by its assertion that in late 1999, IDOT verbally agreed to release 75% of the remaining non-routine work by March 2000. No specific percentages or time tables were set forth in writing and no contract modifications were made legally binding IDOT to authorize the non-routine work in accordance with Claimant's expressed desires.

Even if IDOT's behavior regarding the non-routine-work authorizations somehow amounted to delays, Claimant still cannot recover because it fails to show how these delays were

unreasonable. Claimant seems to argue that the large amount of non-routine work released in the last three months of the contract was unreasonable because in the past very little work spilled over after the contract term.

Regardless of whether EMC 60608 was the first EMC with such a large spillover after the contract term, the release of the authorizations was not unreasonable if the contract permitted IDOT to issue the authorizations when it did. *See Precision Pine & Timber, Inc. v. U.S.*, 596 F.3d 817, 831 (Fed.Cir.2010) (stating that the implied duty of good faith and fair dealing cannot expand a party's contractual duties beyond those in the express contract or create duties inconsistent with the contract's provisions.) Calihan even conceded at trial that under the "letter of the contract" IDOT could issue as many authorizations whenever it wanted. Regardless of how much work spilled over in the past, IDOT was within its contractual rights to issue the non-routine work authorizations when it did. For all the above-mentioned reasons we find that Claimant has failed to establish that IDOT's issuance of non-routine work authorizations constituted a delay for an unreasonable period of time.

We further find that, even aside from the issue of unreasonable delay, Respondent is not liable to Claimant for damages because EMC 60608 provided no reasonable basis for Claimant to expect that the work could be done by a fixed period of time. As stated earlier, Claimant was fully aware that under EMC 60608, IDOT could issue the authorizations at any time, and notwithstanding Claimant's assertions that IDOT agreed to release 75% of the work by March 2000, IDOT was under no obligation as to how much work it authorized during any given period of the contract. As Claimant itself notes in its post-trial brief, Knutson stated at the trial non-routine maintenance was often not profitable and always the riskiest portion of the contract

because the contractor never knew when and if the work would be authorized. Accordingly, Count II of Claimant's Complaint is hereby denied.

Therefore,

1. The Court finds in favor of Claimant for Count I of its Complaint in the amount of \$1,149,210.
2. Count II of Claimant's Complaint is hereby denied.

However, the question of entering an award remains before the Court. This Court cannot enter an award unless sufficient funds lapsed in the appropriations designated to pay for these services. As explained in *Graham, O'Shea and Hyde v. State*, 44 Ill.Ct.Cl. 175,177 (1992) and the cases cited therein:

In breach of contract claims, whether the claims are before us on their merits or for approval of a settlement, it is this Court's policy to limit awards so as not to exceed the amount of funds, appropriated and lapsed, with which payment could have been made. To do otherwise, i.e., to award money for debt incurred beyond the sum allotted by the General Assembly, would be tantamount to making a deficiency appropriation. The appropriation of State funds for governmental operations is the constitutional prerogative of the General Assembly. It is this Court's duty to uphold that process and advise the General Assembly.

Therefore, before entering an award for Claimant or making a recommendation to the General Assembly, the Court needs additional information. It is hereby ordered that Respondent shall file, within 21 days of the filing of the Opinion, a report authored by the Illinois Department of Transportation which includes fiscal information regarding the amount of funds that lapsed in the appropriations designated to pay for the underlying services related to this case, so the Court can determine the amount that can be awarded.

Compensation for personal injuries- Claimant is barred from collecting damages for injuries sustained when tripping and falling over a floor mat of a building owned by the IEPA because she already received workers' compensation for the injuries from her employer.

OPINION

Birnbaum, J.

This matter coming to be heard on the Respondent's Motion for Summary Judgment. On April 11, 2011 we granted Claimant's Motion an Extension of Time to file a Response to this Motion. Claimant has not filed a Response to the Motion for Summary Judgment.

THE COURT FINDS:

Claimant seeks compensation for personal injuries she sustained when she tripped and fell over a floor mat while walking out of a building located at 9511 W. Harrison, Des Plaines, Illinois 60016 allegedly owned, operated, managed and/or controlled by the State of Illinois and specifically; the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) on April 23, 2003.

The Illinois Code of Civil Procedure provides that summary judgment is appropriate "if the pleadings, depositions, and admissions on file, together with the affidavits, if any, show that there is no genuine issue as to any material fact and that the moving party is entitled to judgment as a matter of law." 735 ILCS 5/2-1005(c). The plaintiff need not prove her case at the summary judgment stage; she must, however, present a factual basis to support the elements of

her claim. *Bickerman v. Wosik*, 245 Ill.App.3d 436, 438, 614 N.E. 2d 551, 552 (3rd Dist. 1993).
Where the plaintiff cannot establish an element of her claim, summary judgment is proper.

Parsons v. Carbondale Township, 217 Ill.App.3d 637, 649, 577 N.E.2d 779, 787 (5th Dist. 1991).

The Workers' Compensation Act is an exclusive remedy to recover damages for personal injury from an employer. *Fuller v. State of Illinois*, 46 Ill.Ct.Cl. 432 (1994); 820 ILCS 305/5(a). Additionally, a borrowing employer is entitled to the protections of the exclusive remedy provision of the Workers' Compensation Act. *Chavez v. Transload Services, L.L.C.*, 379 Ill.App.3d 858, 862, 884 N.E.2d 1258, 1262 (1st Dist. 2008).

At Claimant's discovery deposition, Claimant testified that on the day of her injury she was an employee of Burke Staffing, a temporary employment agency. Claimant further testified that Claimant worked for the IEPA by virtue of her employment with Burke Staffing. Lastly, in compensation for her injuries, Claimant received worker's compensation benefits through Burke Staffing.

Claimant's exclusive remedy for the injuries that she sustained was the worker's compensation benefits that she received from Burke Staffing. Claimant is barred from maintaining the instant claim against her borrowing employer, the IEPA.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED:

The motion of the Respondent, State of Illinois, is GRANTED, and the claim herein is DISMISSED with prejudice.

Negligence, Cause of action- Claimant must prove existence of a duty, breach of that duty and an injury that proximately resulted from the breach. The State owes visitors a duty of reasonable care to maintain premises, but the State is not an insurer of the safety of persons who visit State buildings.

Negligence, Element of duty- Claimant must show by a preponderance of the evidence that the State had actual or constructive notice of the defect. Claimant failed to show that the loose cables existed for any length of time prior to his injury or that the State had actual or constructive notice of the defect.

OPINION

Kubasiak, J.

This claim is before the Court upon a recommendation from Commissioner George Argionis following an evidentiary hearing. Claimant, PERRY FRANKLIN, seeks damages in the amount of \$12,492.07 due to an injury allegedly caused by the negligence of the State. The following witnesses and evidence were presented:

Claimant testified that on Thursday, January 20, 2005, he attended a basketball game at the University of Illinois-Champaign Urbana ("U. of I.") with his friend, Lawrence Moore, where he suffered a closed fracture and sprain of his left ankle as well as bruising to much of the left side of his body. Claimant alleges that his injury occurred when he was walking down a flight of concrete steps and his left foot became caught in some loose cables, which he claims the State negligently allowed to come loose from duct tape that was meant to hold the wires flat at the back of the stairwell.

Claimant stated that Mr. Moore's brother-in-law provided free tickets to the game. Mr. Moore picked Claimant up from his home in Chicago around 3:30 p.m. on the day of the incident. When they arrived at Champaign, the game had not yet started. After purchasing some team merchandise and picking up their tickets at will call, Claimant and Mr. Moore realized their tickets were for floor seats, and they traveled into the Assembly Hall to get seated. Claimant stated this was his first visit to the U. of I. An usher led them along an aisle partway down the seating area, where a large, concrete-edged entrance into the stadium interrupted the lower rows of seating from below. An operating booth replaced regular seating in the area above the entranceway. The aisle led to a wide set of steps, at a right angle to the aisle, and the steps led to the floor. The two men turned right from the aisle into the stairway to descend to the floor, encountering a low concrete wall with a banister on their right side, between them and the operating booth, and seating on the left.

Claimant stated that he followed Mr. Moore as they walked down the steps to their seats on the floor. Claimant stated that he was carrying a bag by the handle in his left hand and was wearing new winter boots, laced up. His right hand was free. He stated that he does not wear corrective lenses. Claimant was not sure how many stairs he descended before his foot was caught by a cord. When his foot was caught, he reached for the banister along the wall but fell three or four stairs before he was able to stop himself. He stated that he twisted as he tried to stop himself, and Claimant believed his twisting caused the wires to wrap completely around his ankle. He stated that he struck his shoulder, hip and ankle on the concrete, and ended up on his back lying on the stairs. Claimant stated that there were several wires around his foot, and that the wires resembled a television cable, being clear and smaller in circumference than a dime. Claimant also testified at a previous time that only one wire caught his foot, and that it was

black. Claimant stated he did not see or feel the wires until the wires caught him around the ankle.

Claimant stated that after he fell and was lying on the stairs, a man nearby wearing an orange jacket came to the scene and called for help using a walkie-talkie. A technician arrived within a few minutes and untangled Claimant's ankle from the wires. Claimant believed both men were employed by the U. of I. Claimant stated that the technician then taped the wires to the concrete from where the wire entered the stairwell on the right, in the first row of seats above the short wall, to where the wire exited the stairwell into the row of seats on the left of the stairs. Claimant stated he was on the stairs after the incident for about 10 minutes before some people dressed in white came to him, helped him stand, and took him down the stairs to a medical facility within the Assembly Hall. Claimant believed one of these people was a medical practitioner. During this time Mr. Moore stayed with Claimant; the game had not yet begun.

At about this time, as testified to by Kevin Ullestad, assistant director of the Assembly Hall, a Property Damage/Public Injury Report was filled out by U. of I. employees and filed with Mr. Ullestad and other authorities. The report indicates that the incident was reported via radio, and that the incident occurred in the aisle of section A37. Under "Description of Accident/Damage," a handwritten note read as follows: "Patient stated: 'I tripped on cables and fell down the stairs.' Patient indicated L ankle pain. Patient denied head, neck or back pain. Patient ambulatory with assistance. Patient denied loss of consciousness..."

Claimant testified that he experienced sharp pain at a level of 8 on a 10 point scale in his left ankle when he was taken to the medical facility. He stated that the technician showed him that his ankle was starting to swell. For about 20 minutes, the technicians put ice on his ankle before paramedics came to the Assembly Hall and took a report from Claimant about what

happened and where the pain was located. The paramedics then placed Claimant in a wheelchair and transported him by ambulance to nearby Provena Hospital ("Provena").

At Provena, Claimant's left ankle was x-rayed and he received an "air boot" that supported his ankle and allowed him to walk if he used crutches. Claimant stated that he wore the boot continuously for about a month and a half, except while sleeping and bathing. Provena also administered pain medication to Claimant, which gave him partial relief.

After this care, about 80 minutes had passed since the incident, but the basketball game was still in progress and Claimant was returned to the Assembly Hall. He stated that Assembly Hall employees provided a wheelchair for him, and he sat in the handicap area for the remainder of the game. Mr. Moore drove Claimant home.

The next day, Claimant did not go in to his job as a hair dresser because he was experiencing pain in his left shoulder, the left side of his neck and his left hip, as well as his ankle. Claimant rested all day and could not move his left arm without pain. For the next week, Claimant stayed off his foot and elevated his left leg. He used crutches with the boot for about 3 months, and the boot alone for an additional 2 months. Claimant also obtained heated massage treatment for the left side of his body from Dr. Kanagaraju about a week after the incident. Claimant stated that the treatment relieved much of his pain and he felt much better by the time of his next massage appointment the following week.

Claimant stated that he still experiences pain in his neck and left shoulder while sleeping, exercising or working, which he attributes to his fall at the Assembly Hall. Claimant stated his shoulder has never been injured before or after the incident, and that his neck is constantly in a low level of pain. Claimant stated that his neck pain keeps him from exercising. Claimant stated that prior to the incident he worked out every day with weights or aerobic exercise, or by playing

sports such as basketball, baseball and tennis at his health club, Lifetime Fitness. Claimant stated that he was not able to exercise at all for about a year after the incident because he could walk for only short periods of time, and even this exertion caused him pain. He attempted to play baseball and basketball after his injury but pain forced him to quit. He stated that he did not try again to play in five years following his injury because he was afraid of injuring himself further.

Claimant also stated that prior to his accident he worked full time at a hair salon, Dazzle's, where the duties of the job required him to be on his feet all day. Claimant stated that after the accident he stayed away from work for about 4 weeks and that when he returned, he could not engage in the physical aspects of the work and merely prepared solutions for the other stylists. As an average income, Claimant stated he earned \$500 to \$1,000 per week prior to his accident, and also was required to pay \$200 per week to keep his place at the salon, regardless of how many days he worked. Claimant therefore believed he had lost about \$4,000 of wages, due to his injury.

Lawrence Moore, Claimant's friend and a witness of the accident, also testified. Mr. Moore stated that he received free tickets to the game from his brother-in-law, who is an assistant coach for the U. of I. team. Mr. Moore, like Claimant, had never entered the Assembly Hall before this time. Mr. Moore stated they arrived early because they were not sure whether he would need to find his brother-in-law or take extra steps to obtain the tickets. Because they arrived early, only a few people were in the Hall at the time of the incident.

Mr. Moore stated that as they were finding their seats, when they were about halfway to the floor, he preceded Claimant down the stairway and did not notice the wires until after Claimant had fallen. Mr. Moore stated he heard Claimant utter an expletive right before he fell,

causing Mr. Moore to turn around in time to watch Claimant tumble 2 or 3 steps, come to rest, and grab his ankle while grimacing in pain. Mr. Moore stated that when he looked at the cable, he could see it "sticking up between the steps." He recalled the cable was across the steps and taped to the steps, and that it was a dark color. He stated that after Claimant fell and some U. of I. staff members arrived, he heard one of them tell another to "retape it or tape it down more, the cord." Mr. Moore recited the same version of events as Claimant had done regarding the minutes following Claimant's fall. He stated that Claimant called him from the hospital after Mr. Moore had sat down, and that Claimant returned part way through the game; Mr. Moore could see him in the handicap seating. Mr. Moore stated he drove Claimant home after the game.

Physician Assistant Allen Thomas testified to Claimant's injuries in the hours following the incident. Mr. Thomas stated that he had worked at Provena Covenant Hospital for about two years prior to the incident, and had finished his training and certification in 1996. Mr. Thomas stated that medical forms from the time of the incident indicated that the mechanism of Claimant's injury was tripping down stairs, that Claimant reported tenderness at his left ankle, and that an x-ray showed a simple, closed fracture of the lateral malleolus, i.e. the bone of the ankle on the outside of the leg broke but did not penetrate the skin. Mr. Thomas stated that Claimant was given Ibuprofen for mild pain, and was taught to use the walking boot with crutches.

Kevin Ullestad, the direct of the Assembly Hall, also testified. He stated that the Hall is a multipurpose arena used for concerts, circuses and ice shows, as well as sports games. He stated that the Hall has been used consistently for the 15 years he has worked there. He described the Hall as having three sections labeled A, B and C, with A closest to the floor and C furthest from it. Mr. Ullestad stated that many cables are used in the Hall, and some of them cross an aisle in

the section of the Hall labeled as A37, where Claimant allegedly fell. This cable is used for the scoreboard at basketball games, and runs from the scoreboard to the scoreboard operator's booth, also located in A37. Mr. Ullestad stated that the basketball season runs from October to early March, so that the cable is taped down at the beginning of each season and not removed until the end of the season. He stated that a single cable is the only one that crosses the stairs, that it is completely taped down, and that it does not cross stairs anywhere else. He stated that the duct tape holding down the cable would suffer weathering from mopping.

Mr. Ullestad testified to the process of preparing for a large event like a basketball game. He stated that at least 15 minutes to an hour before opening the doors to the public, the Assembly Hall staff would perform a walk-through inspection to ensure the aisles are clear and safe. Mr. Ullestad stated that the U. of I. maintains an incident report system that allows staff to report the time, place and manner of accidents that occur on U. of I. property. He stated that he has seen 12 or 13 incidents per year in the Assembly Hall, beginning in 1996 when he joined the U. of I. staff. Mr. Ullestad stated that he had never received notification, prior to Claimant's fall, that a cable caused someone to fall. He also stated that he worked the game at which Claimant fell, and that when he inspected the cable area the day after the incident, he observed the cable properly taped to the back of the stairway and did not see any new, unweathered tape in Section A24.

Another U. of I. employee, Richard Mingee, also testified. Mr. Mingee stated that the Assembly Hall is a circular, self-supported structure. He confirmed that a lower crosswalk separates the A and B seating sections, which are also bisected longitudinally by aisles of stairs. Mr. Mingee stated that in the section at issue, two cables run across the length of the stairway - a coaxial cable and a multi-conductor cable - one of which has a diameter of a quarter inch and the

other of which has a diameter of three-eighths of an inch. He stated that the coaxial cable is flexible, unlike standard cables. He stated further that the cables are tucked up to the riser of the stairway, that they are laid down before the season starts, and that they are not removed until the end of the season. Mr. Mingee did not know positively who had taped the cables in the 2005 season. He stated that the cables would be periodically checked by several people, mainly ushers, as part of a general safety inspection, but no inspection of the cables in particular was carried out. Mr. Mingee stated that although he repaired cable issues two or three times in the 15 years before this accident, he did not repair any problems with the cables involved in this incident.

LEGAL ANALYSIS

To state a cause of action for negligence, Claimant must allege facts establishing the existence of a duty, breach of that duty and an injury that proximately resulted from the breach. *Ondes v. State*, 43 Ill. Ct. Cl. 272, 276 (1991). The existence of this legal duty "is a question of law which is determined by the Court." *Id.* Although State employees owe visitors a duty of reasonable care to maintain the premises, the State is not an insurer of the safety of persons who visit State buildings. *Steger v. State*, 46 Ill. Ct. Cl. 262, 266 (1993).

To prove the duty element of negligence, a claimant must show by a preponderance of the evidence that the State had actual or constructive notice of the defect. *Scroggins v. State*, 43 Ill. Ct. Cl. 225, 227 (1991). The standard for proving constructive notice requires a claimant to prove that a defect was "substantial enough, and exist[ed] for such a length of time that reasonable persons would conclude that immediate repairs should be made or warning signs posted." *Steger v. State*, 27 Ill. Ct. Cl. 399, 403 (1972); *Kling v. State*, 54 Ill. Ct. Cl. 305, 309 (2001). Even if a hazardous condition exists on State property, the State must be given actual or

constructive notice of it and a reasonable opportunity to remove or remedy the hazard before a legal duty will arise. *Ott v. State*, 47 Ill. Ct. Cl. 231 (1994). *Catherine Carlson v. Board of Regents*, 47 Ill. Ct. Cl. 171 (1994) (where a student slipped on a wet bathroom floor, constructive notice was shown by evidence that numerous students had complained about the condition causing the slippery floor); *Netter v. State*, 55 Ill. Ct. Cl. 317 (2003) (actual notice shown).

In closing argument, Claimant asserted that the facts of this case are "akin to" *res ipsa loquitur*. This doctrine allows proof of negligence by circumstantial evidence when something that caused the injury is shown to be under the exclusive control or management of the party charged with negligence and the occurrence is one that, in the ordinary course of things, would not have happened if the person so charged had used proper care. *Durbin v. State*, 52 Ill. Ct. Cl. 236, 243 (1965). However, because Claimant did not set forth evidence proving Respondent had exclusive control over the cables, we find this doctrine inapposite.

Claimant did show that his fall and his injuries were caused by the loose cables. However, Claimant has provided no evidence that the defect of the loose cables existed for any length of time prior to the moment of his injury. This case is similar to one in which a claimant who slipped on an orange juice spill in a State building failed to show that the State had notice of the spill prior to her fall. *Stimage v. Ill Dept. of Pub. Aid*, 52 Ill. Ct. Cl. 173 (1999). In another case with similar facts, *Byrd v. State*, 50 Ill. Ct. Cl. 280, 285 (1997), a claimant failed to show evidence that the managers of a State-owned building had actual or constructive notice of debris on stairs that allegedly caused her to slip and fall down the stairs.

Mr. Ullestad testified that the cables are laid at the beginning of the sports season, around October, and are not taken up again until the end of the season in March, some six months later. He stated that many kinds of events occur in the Assembly Hall, that the Assembly Hall holds

16,000 to 17,000 people, and that Assembly Hall staff carry out a safety inspection prior to every event to ensure walkways are in a safe condition. However, he also stated that no incident reports exist from 1996-2005 documenting a trip or fall over loose cables at the Assembly Hall. Richard Mingee, the electrician in charge of laying the cables each year, testified that he has dealt with cable problems only two or three times during his 15-year tenure at the U. of I., and has never repaired problems with these particular cables. This testimony shows that despite the frequent attendance of tens of thousands of people at the Assembly Hall in the past ten seasons, many of whom have presumably walked up and down the stairs in Section A37, the Assembly Hall had not received notice of an injury caused by the cables, or a need to repair them. Although the lack of reports testified to by Mr. Ullestad and Mr. Mingee does not prove that the defect did not exist, Claimant has not provided any proof that Respondent had actual knowledge of the defect, or that it existed in such a blatant form or for such a length of time that knowledge could be imputed to Respondent.

Claimant's burden of proof required him to show by a preponderance of the evidence that Respondent owed him a duty to protect him from loose cables. To prove that this duty arose, Claimant was required to provide evidence that Respondent had actual or constructive notice that the defect existed. Because Claimant did not provide any evidence that Respondent was on notice of the loose cables, his claim must be denied.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that this claim be denied.

Negligence, Personal injury, Prison inmates- State owes a duty to prison inmates to provide reasonably safe conditions. Claimant must prove that the State had actual or constructive notice of a dangerous or defective condition.

Negligence, Res ipsa loquitur- Doctrine of *res ipsa loquitur* is an exception to the notice rule and may be applied when the instrumentality that injured the claimant was under the exclusive control of the State. The State failed to present evidence sufficient to rebut the evidence of its exclusive care and control of the window that fell on Claimant. Thus, the accident was the cause of Claimant's injuries and arose from the State's lack of due care. The State is liable to Claimant for Claimant's injuries from the accident.

OPINION

Storino, J.

Claimant filed his complaint for a personal injury he suffered while at the Dixon Correctional Center. A hearing was held before the assigned commissioner on March 8, 2011. Claimant appeared *pro se* and Respondent was represented by the Attorney General's office.

I. Background

Claimant filed his Complaint on January 10, 2010, arising out of an incident that occurred on April 1, 2005. Claimant alleges in his Complaint that he was working in the dayroom of Housing Unit #26 and one of the dayroom windows fell and struck his head and shoulders. Claimant asserts that the Respondent owes him a duty to provide a reasonably safe environment and that the window falling on him breached said duty. Claimant alleges that he suffered a serious head injury as well as injury to his hand and shoulder. Claimant asserts that he lost 488

days of work assignment which equals \$240 in lost wages. He claims that he suffers from recurrent headaches that will cause him future lost wages in his occupation as a car detailer in the amount of \$30,000 to \$40,000. Claimant seeks damages in the amount of \$50,000.

The Respondent filed its Rule 55 Departmental Report on April 19, 2007. The Departmental Report indicates that Claimant filed a grievance on July 12, 2005. The Departmental Report also contains medical records from the treatment received by Claimant.

At the hearing held on March 8, 2011, Claimant testified that on April 1, 2005, he was performing janitorial services in Housing Unit #26 in Dixon CC. He was cleaning in the dayroom and a window panel about 3 feet by 5 feet fell out and struck Claimant. Claimant stated that a Corrections Officer in tower observed the window fall and instructed Claimant to stay down. Claimant stated that he received help and was taken to the Health Care Unit where he received medical treatment. The Departmental Report contains the medical records which indicate cuts and abrasions, but no broken bones. Claimant testified that he could not work for 488 days.

On cross examination, Claimant agreed his injuries consisted of some abrasions but no stitches. He testified that the day after his injury complained of head, shoulder and right arm pain for which x-rays were taken. Claimant also subsequently complained of headaches but no neurological problems were found. On cross-examination, Claimant conceded that he could work and that no medical provider stated that he suffered any permanent injury.

II. Analysis

Under Illinois law, the State owes a duty to prison inmates to provide reasonably safe conditions. *Reddock v. State*, 37 Ill. Ct. Cl. 611 (1978). The law is well established that generally for a Claimant to recover for negligence, he must prove that Respondent had actual or

constructive notice of a dangerous or defective condition. *McMullen v. State*, 49 Ill. Ct. Cl. 137, 142 (1995). Although it has not been pleaded, the Claimant's evidence presented at the evidentiary hearing dictates that this claim proceed under the doctrine of *res ipsa loquitur*. The doctrine of *res ipsa loquitur* is an exception to the notice rule and is to be applied when Respondent fails to present evidence sufficient to rebut evidence of its exclusive care and control of an instrumentality or when Respondent fails to produce evidence to support the Respondent's exercise of proper care under the circumstances of record. *Enyart v. State*, 57 Ill. Ct. Cl. 202, 205 (2004).

Under the doctrine of *res ipsa loquitur*, Claimant must show that the instrumentality which injured him was under the exclusive control of Respondent, and not under his control in any way. *Daniels v. State*, 40 Ill.Ct.Cl. 64, 70 (1988). When an injury is caused by an instrumentality under the exclusive control of Respondent, and when the injury is one that would not occur in the ordinary course of things had the Respondent exercised proper care, the accident itself affords reasonable evidence that the accident arose from the Respondent's want of due care. *Thornton v. State*, 45, Ill.Ct.Cl. 272, 275 (1993).

In this case, there is no testimony from Respondent to contradict Claimant's testimony that the window fell and injured Claimant, at no fault of Claimant. Such uncontroverted evidence supports Claimant's contention that Respondent failed to maintain the facility in a reasonably safe condition. It is also not disputed that the window was under the exclusive control of Respondent and not, in any way, under the control of Claimant. Respondent merely disputed the measure of Claimant's damages. Respondent failed to present any evidence sufficient to rebut evidence of its exclusive care and control of the window. Respondent also failed to produce evidence to support the Respondent's exercise of proper care under the facts of

the case. As such, this Court finds that a reasonable inference may be made that the instant accident, which was the cause of Claimant's injuries, arose from the Respondent's want of due care, thereby imposing liability on behalf of Respondent.

Accordingly, Claimant is entitled to recover for his injuries. Since Claimant received medical care at no personal costs due to being a prisoner of the State there are no medical specials to be awarded. Claimant's claim of lost wages is not supported by the evidence. Claimant future pain and suffering is not supported by medical records or testimony. The sole element of damages that is supported by the evidence and compensable in this case is the pain and suffering Claimant suffered due to the window falling on him. The record indicates Claimant suffered minor scrapes and abrasions but did not require stitches. Claimant did complain later of headaches but no evidence connected the later headaches to the incident. As such Claimant shall be awarded \$500.00, for his injuries.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that Claimants' claim is granted and Claimant is awarded \$500.00.

Negligent highway maintenance, Burden of proof- Claimant must show by a preponderance of the evidence that the State had actual or constructive notice of the defect, and that the State breached its duty. The State is not an insurer against all accidents which may occur by reason of the condition of its highways, but it does have a duty to use reasonable diligence in maintaining highways in a reasonably safe condition. Claimant presented evidence the State had actual notice of a history of falling concrete at the bridge in question. The State had constructive notice that the defect was substantial enough and existed for such a length of time that a reasonable person would conclude that immediate repairs should be made or warning signs posted.

Negligence, Damages- Claimant has the burden of proving damages with certainty. Claimant proved that State's negligence was the proximate cause of the initial injury to his left clavicle. However, an intervening injury caused by physical assault in a later incident limited Claimant's recovery in damages.

ORDER

Birnbaum, J.

THIS MATTER is before the Court upon a recommendation from Commissioner Argionis following an evidentiary hearing held on January 7, 2011. Claimant, Fred Robinson, filed his Complaint sounding in negligence on August 6, 2007 arising from an August 11, 2006 incident. Claimant's claim is for personal injuries he received due to falling concrete from an overpass while driving a truck on an Illinois highway. Specifically, Claimant seeks damages in the amount of \$100,000, including reimbursement for two surgeries, physical therapy, pain and suffering and lost wages.

Facts

On August 11, 2006, Claimant was driving his delivery truck as an employee with Interstate Wrapping. Among other duties, Claimant was in charge of making deliveries of paper goods to stores, bakeries and car washes throughout the Chicago-Land area. On the morning of August 11, 2006, Claimant had traveled from 107th and Cicero to Interstate 290 before merging on to Interstate 55 traveling southwest toward St. Louis. After traveling for approximately 10 minutes on Interstate 55, Claimant passed under the bridge overpass of County Line Road (Illinois Department of Transportation, "IDOT" bridge structure 016-0587). Claimant testified he was traveling in the middle lane and that traffic was light on the highway. While driving the truck under the overpass, a piece of concrete measuring about six inches long and six inches thick fell from the underside of the overpass deck shattering Claimant's windshield and striking Claimant on his left shoulder. As a result of the falling concrete brick, the windshield on the driver's side of the truck was shattered. Subsequently, Claimant was taken to Hinsdale Hospital via an ambulance. At this point, he testified he was experiencing pain in his left shoulder at a level of 10 on a 10 point scale. The hospital staff put Claimant's arm in a sling and sent him for x-rays of his left clavicle. The x-rays revealed a transverse fracture of the distal fourth of the left clavicle along with a cephalad displacement of the proximal fracture fragment by approximately 5 mm. (See Group Exhibit A, Hinsdale Hospital Records 3-21). Additionally, the hospital staff suctioned glass from Claimant's head and stitched his lip before releasing him with pain medication. In the first month or two after the injury, Claimant testified he had difficulty falling asleep at night as he was unable to sleep on his left side due to the shoulder injury. Additionally, he required assistance with daily living activities such as bathing, cleaning his house and getting dressed. He could not play with his grandchildren.

Approximately a week after the incident, Claimant met with Dr. Pfantz, a doctor at the University of Illinois Medical Center at Chicago ("UIMC"). Dr. Pfantz referred Claimant to a bone specialist, Dr. Goldberg, who diagnosed a fracture of Claimant's left clavicle. Prior to the August 11, 2006 incident, Claimant testified he had not sustained any injuries to his left clavicle and had full range of motion in his arm. Dr. Goldberg recommended a treatment plan consisting of physical therapy, which Claimant began in September of that year at Maximum Rehabilitation Services, Limited ("Maximum Rehab"). Additionally, Claimant testified Dr. Goldberg recommended a lifting restriction of 30 to 35 pounds and told Claimant not to work for a period of time. Because of these restrictions, Claimant was forced to abstain from his usual 40-hour workweek. On September 5, 2006, Claimant began his physical therapy at Maximum Rehab where it was recommended he have approximately three physical therapy sessions a week, for four weeks. (Maximum Rehab Records, P. 144-145). Respondent stipulated at the January 7, 2011 hearing that Claimant's clavicle injuries at the emergency room following the accident, and Claimant's physical therapy up through the date Claimant was assaulted were specifically caused by, and related to, the accident.

In addition to Claimant, the witnesses who testified at the hearing were Illinois Department of Transportation employees Sarah Wilson and Christine Ridge. Ms. Wilson holds the position of Bridge Maintenance Engineer for the Chicago metropolitan area, "District One". In that capacity she oversees maintenance of its 1,450 bridges. Specifically, she coordinates the operation and maintenance by directing forty to fifty engineers, technicians, maintenance workers and two bridge inspection engineers who report directly to Ms. Wilson. Ms. Wilson also stated that her position includes the formation of an action plan for bridge repair and rehabilitation. For example, Ms. Wilson testified that an action plan may involve the "patchwork

type of repair" such as "scaling", in which case an IDOT crew would safely chip off loose pieces of visible concrete. Alternatively, Ms. Wilson stated that inspectors may make initial repair work recommendations at their discretion, without waiting for Ms. Wilson's review of the report.

Ms. Wilson provided general information regarding the three main components of a bridge: the driving bridge deck, the substructure and the superstructure. The substructure consists of all aspects of the bridge leading up to the steel beams, the superstructure. The superstructure is a set of weight-bearing steel beams which supports the deck. The deck is the portion of the bridge that sits on top of the superstructure and consists of rebar just below the surface of the road and a bottom concrete portion. This bottom portion of the deck is called the "soffit" and sits directly upon the superstructure. Ms. Wilson testified that soffit is the visible material on the bottom of the deck. Specifically for the County Line Road Bridge, Ms. Wilson stated that IDOT is responsible for maintaining and improving the superstructure and the substructure, along with the portion of the deck that is below the wearing and top surface. She testified that delamination is the cracking of the concrete or the separation of the soffit from the reinforcing steel. When the soffit falls off or is removed from the bridge, as in this matter, the process is entitled "spalling".

Concerning inspection, Ms. Wilson testified that each bridge in District One is to be inspected approximately every two years. Inspectors give the bridges condition ratings on a scale from 1 to 9, with a rating of 9 meaning the bridge was brand new and a rating of 1 meaning the bridge was in the worst condition and would necessitate its closing. These ratings are based upon criteria from the State and Federal government. Among other factors, the condition ratings are based on the percentage of bridge deck soffit square footage that exhibit spalls and delamination. For example, a condition rating of (6) is satisfactory based upon the amount of

spalls and further delamination, while a condition rating of (5) denotes that additional spalls and further delamination occurred. Specifically, the County Line Road Bridge was rated as a (4), or as in poor condition, on June 28, 2005, a year before Claimant's accident. This low rating was due in part to the spalling of 29 percent of the soffit. Specifically, IDOT reports from 2003, 2004 and 2007 state similar shorthand inspection notes regarding the County Line Road Bridge condition: "Deck-29% of soffit spalled w/exp. Corroded rebar; 45% chloride contamination; hvy haunch crcking; deck is lifting on both ends +/- %. Random crcking throughout wearing surface w/num pop-outs & sm spalls exposing cathodic grid."

Ms. Wilson agreed that a rating of (4) would "send up some flags in the department", and would qualify the bridge in question for placement in the Illinois Multi-Year Program. The Multi-Year Program is designed to provide funding for all major IDOT projects, including road widening, traffic signals and bridge repairs. Specifically, Ms. Wilson testified that although the County Line Road Bridge in question had been rated as a (4) since 2000, it was not placed into the Multi-Year Program until approximately 2007, the year after Claimant's accident. She reasoned that although the bridge was a candidate for the Multi-Year Program due to its condition rating of (4), budget and other priorities had precluded these repairs.

The second witness from IDOT, Ms. Christine Ridge, is the Claims Manager for District One. She oversees a staff of six claims representatives and clerical staff. Specifically, Ms. Ridge stated that as a matter of policy, she checks records during the three months prior to a reported incident to determine whether similar accounts were reported. For the present matter, Ms. Ridge testified that no reports regarding the County Line Road Bridge were processed in the three months preceding Claimant's accident.

Although Ms. Ridge testified regarding the lack of incidents in the three months preceding Claimant's accident, the witnesses and exhibit evidence provide information of reports of concrete spalling at the same location in previous years. The first incident report was made on April 23, 1996, by the Elgin State Police. The report indicated a brick sized piece of concrete debris fell from the County Line Road Bridge onto the 1-55 expressway. A second report was made from a police officer on May 8, 2001, which reported concrete on the shoulder of 1-55 appearing to have fallen from the bridge. In addition to the 2001 observation from a police officer, a 2001 Bridge Inspection Report prepared by a bridge inspector included several recommendations for significant repair to the County Line Road Bridge deck. Lastly, on September 24, 2003, a claimant in a separate action in this Court alleged a chunk of concrete fell from the bridge and damaged his vehicle while that claimant was traveling on Interstate 55. After the September 24, 2003 incident, Ms. Wilson testified a field inspector was called to inspect the bridge on November 6, 2003, and later reported that although there was no evidence of loose concrete, there were spalled areas visibly indicating where previously concrete had fallen. At that time, IDOT sent a crew to do some scaling work. However, at trial, Ms. Wilson testified that scaling "does not help keep the bridge from continuing to deteriorate".

Analysis

While the State is not an insurer against all accidents which may occur by reason of the condition of its highways, it has a duty to utilize reasonable diligence in maintaining highways in a reasonably safe condition. *Scroggins v. State*, 43 Ill. Ct. Cl. 225 (1991); *Wing v. State*, Ill. Ct. Cl. 473 (1997). To recover under a negligent highway maintenance claim, a Claimant must show by a preponderance of the evidence that the State had actual or constructive notice of the

defect, and that the State had breached its duty. *Piggot v. State*, 26 Ill. Ct. Cl. 262 (1968); *Scroggins v. State*, 43 Ill. Ct. Cl. 225 (1991).

Here, Claimant has presented sufficient uncontroverted evidence to prove that his August 11, 2006 injury was caused by the concrete that fell from the County Line Road Bridge. Thus, in analyzing the present claim, the threshold question is whether the State had actual or constructive notice of the falling concrete and failed to take reasonable steps to correct or warn of the dangerous condition. We have previously held that notice can be proven through testimony of bridge inspectors relating to a continuous or worsening condition of falling concrete. *Robinson v. State*, 35 Ill. Ct. Cl. 185 (1981). In the instant case, we find that Claimant has demonstrated by a preponderance of the evidence that the State had actual and constructive notice that the County Line Road Bridge over Interstate 55 was in a dangerous condition and failed to repair the bridge to a reasonably safe condition, in breach of its duty to motorists on its highways.

Specifically, the testimony from witnesses at the hearing before the Commissioner and evidence of prior IDOT reports, demonstrate a history of incidents involving falling concrete at the bridge in question. As held in previous bridge negligence cases, once concrete begins spalling, the vibrations of traffic will contribute to the bridge's continual deterioration unless repairs are made to the concrete itself. *Id.* The aforementioned reports in the years preceding Claimant's accident indicate the State had actual notice that the bridge was in a dangerous condition and that minor repairs, such as the scaling work after the 2003 incident, would not prevent the bridge from deteriorating further.

Additionally, this Court concludes the State had constructive notice of the dangerous condition at the County Line Road Bridge. The precedent for proving constructive notice

requires a Claimant to prove the defect was substantial enough and existed for such a length of time that a reasonable person would conclude that immediate repairs should be made or warning signs posted. *Stege v. State*, 27 Ill. Ct. Cl. 399 (1972); *Carlson v. Board of Regents*, 47 Ill. Ct. Cl. 171 (1994). Whether the State had constructive notice of a condition depends on the facts of each specific case. *Stills v. State*, 41 Ill. Ct. Cl. 60 (1989). In this case, a 2001 inspection report provides a list of recommendations from the inspector including the recommendation to remove and replace the deck and repair the concrete overlay. Additionally, the report had an assigned priority code of "1", indicating that the action should take place within the year. Ms. Wilson testified that IDOT, apparently ignoring this report, failed to order substantial repairs until 2007, the year after Claimant's accident, when the bridge was finally entered into the Multi-Year Program. IDOT's second witness, Ms. Ridge, testified that IDOT had no notice of problems with the County Line Road Bridge in the three months leading up to Claimant's accident. However, IDOT incident reports from 1996, 2001 and 2003 present evidence showing an ongoing history of falling concrete at this location. Thus, the evidence supports a finding that a defect existed at this location for several years and the State had knowledge of that defect.

While Respondent acknowledges that it knew of the deteriorating conditions, they allege the inspection reports and evidence of accidents did not give notice of the need for immediate attention and repair. Thus, Respondent argues they acted within the reasonable standard of care. Notwithstanding the Respondent's argument, IDOT knew that the condition, if unrepaired, would continue to worsen since delamination and spalls increase over a period of time. In conclusion, the inspection reports preceding Claimant's accident provide significant evidence of Respondent having notice of the dangerous condition and their failure to repair the bridge to a reasonably safe condition.

Having concluded Respondent had notice of the dangerous condition of County Line Road Bridge and is subsequently liable for Claimant's injuries; this Court turns its attention to the issue of damages. Claimant has the burden of proving his damages with certainty. *Gildehaus v. State*, 46 Ill. Ct. Cl. 176 (1993). Claimant testified that he was physically assaulted on October 7, 2006, some two months after the accident at Country Line Road Bridge, by a group of men while buying gas. At the hearing Claimant testified that during the assault, several parts of his body were hit or kicked, but that his left shoulder was not touched and the incident had no effect on the clavicle injury he sustained in the County Line Road Bridge accident. The evidence does not support this assertion. Specifically, records from Claimant's physiotherapists at Maximum Rehab show that throughout September 2006, Claimant rated his pain as decreasing. For example, on September 5, 2006, Claimant rated his pain as 6-7 out of 10 while on September 29, 2006, Claimant decreased his pain rating to 3 out of 10. However, at his first physiotherapy appointment following the October 7, 2006 assault, Claimant reported his pain had increased to 8 out of 10. Additionally, an October 10, 2006 note recorded by Dr. Jason Zook, M.D., indicates Claimant reported that "he was assaulted by multiple men who struck him on the side of his injury of his clavicle," and further, that "his deformity has increased over what it was previously." Dr. Zook's examination of Claimant's post-assault x-ray showed further displacement of the clavicle: "a halo of bony callous demonstrating that this fracture was likely healing prior to his [assault] injury." More importantly, Claimant's doctors at UIMC opined that the injuries to Claimant's clavicle prior to the October 7, 2007 assault would likely heal, "without need for surgical treatment".

Claimant has proven that the Respondent's negligence was the proximate cause of the initial injury to his left clavicle. But the conclusion that Respondent's negligence was also the

proximate cause of Claimant's increased pain in his left clavicle and surgery on February 14, 2007, is doubtful. Courts have held that an intervening injury may limit Claimant's recovery. *Stojentin v. State*, 53 Ill. Ct. Cl. 82 (1999). In this case, Claimant's own statements regarding his increased pain to Maximum Rehab, the medical evaluations with Dr. Zook, and the opinions of the UIMC Doctors lead this Court to the reasonable conclusion that Claimant did not meet his burden of proving that Respondent's negligence was the proximate cause of the surgery following the October 7, 2006 assault. However, the medical records also indicate on October 5, 2006, two days before the assault, Claimant had been prescribed to continue another four week period with his physical therapy at Maximum Rehab, until November 5, 2006. (Maximum Rehab Records, P. 156-166). As evidenced by the medical records and Claimant's statements regarding decreasing pain levels, this Court will award damages for Claimant's treatment between August 11, 2006 and November 5, 2006, including lost wages, loss of normal life and pain and suffering.

Claimant's medical costs between the aforementioned applicable dates total \$14,774.22. Specifically, this cost includes \$2,937.36 for Claimant's emergency room visit on August 11, 2006; \$754.86 for x-rays from UIMC on August 23, 2006; and \$11,082.00 for physical therapy at Maximum Rehab from September 9, 2006 to November 5, 2006. Additionally, this Court awards Claimant \$8,472.00 for 12 weeks of lost wages at the rate of \$17.65 per hour, 40 hours per week. Claimant testified that between August 11, 2006 and November 5, 2006, he experienced a moderate loss of daily activities, such as playing with grandchildren and independent bathing and dressing. He also testified that he endured acute pain for a few days after the accident, which within a month became decreased and manageable. Relying on past pain and suffering awards, this Court finds that Claimant's non-severe injury and recovery

entitles him to the award of \$4,000 for pain and suffering. *Durbin v. State*, 52 Ill. Ct. Cl. 236 (2000).

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that for the above reasons, damages be awarded to Claimant FRED ROBINSON in the amount of \$27,246.22.

Negligence, Personal injury, Invitee, Open and obvious exception - State is not an insurer of the safety of invitees, but must only exercise reasonable care for their safety. Invitees assume all normal, obvious, and ordinary risks attendant to the use of a premises. Landowner is not required to give precautions or warnings where such dangers or risks are known or obvious to invitees, unless the landowner should have anticipated the harm despite such knowledge or obviousness. Claimant cannot argue that the State could reasonably expect that she would be distracted when she fell because she was not carrying a large bundle, but rather a tray of refuse and that she had disposed of the refuse before she fell. The curved archway was an open and obvious condition and State did not breach its duty.

OPINION

Burns, J.

This case coming to be heard before the Court, due notice having been given the parties, and the Court being fully advised in the premises:

Claimant filed a one-count Complaint on November 25, 2008, against Respondent.

Respondent filed its Answer and Amended Affirmative Defenses on August 10, 2010, and filed its Motion for Summary Judgment on October 5, 2010, pursuant to 74 Ill. Adm. Code § 790.90 and 735 ILCS 5/2-1005. The Motion for Summary Judgment was fully briefed by the parties:

Claimant filed its Response on October 25, 2010, and Respondent filed its Reply on December 1, 2010.

I. Summary Judgment Standard

Summary judgment is proper if the pleadings, depositions, admissions, affidavits and other relevant matters on file show that there is no genuine issue of material fact and that the movant is entitled to judgment as a matter of law. *735 ILCS 5/2-1005(c); Freeman v. State*, 55 Ill. Ct. Cl. 329, 334 (2003). While a plaintiff need not prove her case at this stage, she must present sufficient evidentiary facts to support the elements of her claim or present some factual basis which would arguably entitle her to judgment. *Id.*; *Kuwik v. Starmark Star Marketing & Admin. Inc.*, 232 Ill. App. 3d 8, 12 (2nd Dist. 1992); *Barber-Coleman Co. v. A&K Midwest Insulation Co.*, 236 Ill. App. 3d 1065, 1071 (5th Dist. 1992).

II. Facts

Claimant brings this personal injury claim against Respondent alleging negligence in the maintenance of physical property it owns and operates on the campus of Illinois State University in Normal, Illinois. On April 16, 2008, Claimant alleges she met her husband for dinner in the Bone Student Center. Claimant purchased food at one restaurant and sat down with her tray to eat at tables and chairs provided by a coffee shop then known as the "Cage 2." To access the "Cage 2" sitting area, Claimant passed through a curved archway. After she finished eating, Claimant picked up her tray and walked through the curved archway again to access the trash containers. Claimant disposed of her trash, then turned, started to walk back to the seating area, and tripped and fell, allegedly sustaining injury to her shoulder.

Claimant asserts that her injury was a result of negligence and carelessness on the part of Respondent. Claimant states that Respondent placed the trash containers next to the concrete base of the curved archway that protruded into the walkway, effectively creating a tripping hazard. Claimant states Respondent failed to provide warning by sign or paint color to direct customers' attention when placing garbage into the trash containers in order to alert them to the

possibility of tripping on the base of the curved archway. Claimant alleges that Respondent had notice that the base of the archway curved into the walkway, yet failed to relocate the trash containers. Claimant states that, as a result of the fall, she suffered an injured shoulder, endured pain and suffering, and was forced to incur medical expenses. Claimant now seeks damages up to \$100,000.

III. Legal Analysis

The law is well established that in order to maintain an action for negligence, a Claimant must establish by a preponderance of evidence that (1) Respondent owed Claimant a duty, (2) the duty to Claimant was breached by a negligent act or omission to act and (3) the negligence proximately caused the compensable injury. *Johnson v. State*, 48 Ill. Ct. Cl. 345, 350 (1996), *citing O'Neill v. State*, 46 Ill. Ct. Cl. 146, 148 (1993). The State is not an insurer of the safety of invitees, but must only exercise reasonable care for their safety. *Hickman v. State*, 55 Ill. Ct. Cl. 388, 390 (2002), *citing Fausch v. Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois*, 42 Ill. Ct. Cl. (1989). This Court has adopted the doctrine that an invitee assumes all normal, obvious, and ordinary risks attendant to the use of the applicable premises. *Hickman*, 55 Ill. Ct. Cl. at 390, *citing Sanders v. Board of Governors of State Colleges and Universities*, 48 Ill. Ct. Cl. 177, 179 (1995).

Here, Respondent asserts that it did not breach its duty to Claimant because the curved archway was an open and obvious condition. *Section 343A of the Restatement* illustrates that "[a] possessor of land is not liable to his invitees for physical harm caused to them by any activity or condition on the land whose danger is known or obvious to them, unless the possessor should anticipate the harm despite such knowledge or obviousness." *Restatement (Second) of Torts section 343A* at 218 (1965). Something is "obvious" if "both the condition and the risk are

apparent to and would be recognized by a reasonable [person], in the position of the visitor, exercising ordinary perception, intelligence, and judgment." *Restatement (Second) of Torts section 343A, Comment b*, at 219 (1965). In other words, under the open and obvious exception, a landowner is not required to give precautions or warnings where such dangers or risks are evident in order to excuse the duty of reasonable care toward invitees unless the facts indicate the landowner should have anticipated the harm despite such knowledge or obviousness. *Hickman*, 55 Ill. Ct. Cl. at 391, *citing Ward v. K Mart Corp.*, 136 Ill. 2d 132, 149-51 (1990). In this case, Claimant acknowledges that she walked through the curved archway twice without incident prior to her fall. Further, Claimant acknowledged that she witnessed other individuals use the trash containers without falling.

Claimant argues that the openness and obviousness of the curved archway should not exempt Respondent because Respondent could reasonably expect that Claimant would be distracted. Claimant relies on the principle establishing that a possessor of land should anticipate harm to an invitee when the possessor "has reason to expect that the invitee's attention may be distracted, so that he will not discover what is obvious, or will forget what he has discovered, or fail to protect himself against it." *Restatement (Second) of Torts section 343A, Comment f*, at 220 (1965). Here, Claimant contends that Respondent should have reasonably anticipated that Claimant would be distracted when carrying her tray to the trash containers. Claimant relies on the *Ward* case, in which the Illinois Supreme Court held that the defendant's duty of reasonable care encompassed the risk that one of its customers, while carrying a large, bulky item, would collide with a post upon exiting the store. 136 Ill. 2d at 157.

Ward, however, is distinguishable from this case. In *Ward*, the plaintiff was carrying a large bathroom mirror, which was five feet long and approximately one-and-a-half feet wide. *Id.*

at 138. In that case, the Supreme Court held that "[t]he inquiry is whether the defendant should reasonably anticipate injury to those entrants on his premises who are generally exercising reasonable care for their own safety, but who may reasonably be expected to be distracted, as when carrying large bundles, or forgetful of the condition after having momentarily encountered it." *Id.* at 152. In this case, Claimant was not carrying a large bundle, but rather a tray full of refuse. Moreover, Claimant had disposed of the refuse when she allegedly fell. Claimant states that, after passing through the curved archway a second time, she threw out her trash, and then fell. Thus, Claimant cannot reasonably argue she was distracted when she fell and cannot claim the distraction exception to the open and obvious exception.

Because the curved archway was an open and obvious condition, we find that the Respondent did not breach any duty owed to Claimant and thus Claimant has failed as a matter of law to establish an element of her claim.

For the reasons set forth herein, it is hereby ordered that Respondent's Motion for Summary Judgment is granted.

**ACUITY INSURANCE COMPANY, AS SUBROGEE OF LEONARD INDOVINA,
Claimant, v. STATE OF ILLINOIS, DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION,

Negligence, Burden of proof- In a claim for negligence, Claimant has the burden to prove by a preponderance of the evidence that the State was negligent and such negligence was the proximate cause of the claimant's damages. Claimant's testimony was credible and proved the State's negligence by a preponderance of the evidence.

Damages, Partial Comparative Negligence- Illinois follows a partial comparative negligence scheme for apportioning damages. Claimant is barred from recovery if his contributory fault is more than 50 percent of the proximate cause of his damages, but if his contributory fault is 50 percent or less, his recovery is diminished in proportion to his contributory fault. Claimant was found to be at 50 percent contributory fault and was awarded 50 percent of his claimed damages.

OPINION

Kubasiak, J.

Claimant, Acuity Insurance Company, owns this claim by virtue of its right to subrogate under an automobile insurance policy issued to Leonard Indovina. Claimant brought this negligence claim against Respondent on Oct. 27, 2009 after its claim with the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) was denied. Specifically, Acuity argues that IDOT is liable for negligence because its employee was negligent in how he drove his snowplow and proximately caused an automobile accident in which Indovina's vehicle was totaled.

The following facts are undisputed. On January 10, 2008, Claimant's insured, Mr. Indovina, was driving a black 1996 Lexus sedan southbound on a snow-covered Barrington Road, which has two southbound lanes and two northbound lanes. At the same time, two of

Respondent's IDOT employees, Sargon Alkas and Frank Ruscitti, were each driving a snowplow on the same road, going the same direction. About two blocks south of Barrington's intersection with Route 72, in the left lane, Indovina's Lexus collided with Ruscitti's snowplow. Indovina's automobile was totaled and Claimant Acuity suffered \$11,374 in damages. Ruscitti's snowplow suffered damage to the left side of the rear bumper in a left-to-right direction. At the location in question, there is a left turning lane coming out of the left lane. Respondent can be held vicariously liable for its employee Ruscitti's actions in this case.

What is in dispute, and the issue before this Court, is how the accident occurred, and who is responsible for it. Both Ruscitti and Alkas testified that they were plowing snow and salting the road when the accident occurred. They testified that the blue strobe lights on top of their vehicles were turned on and were working. According to both men, Ruscitti was driving in the left lane of Barrington Road and Alkas was in the right lane, about one car length behind him. They claimed that this was a standard tandem formation for snowplowing. Although Alkas stated that they were both always clearly in their respective lanes while on this road, Ruscitti conceded that he was "approximately" in the left lane because there was no way of knowing for sure since there was snow on the ground and he could not see the dividing lines.

Both men testified that, approximately two to four blocks south of Barrington's intersection with Route 72, Ruscitti had his left turn signal on and was going to make a left turn. Ruscitti and Alkas were going to make the left turn into a parking lot and then come out and get on Barrington going northbound. Ruscitti could not describe the events leading up to the accident because he could not see immediately behind him. Alkas, however, stated he saw what transpired. Alkas explained that Indovina, who was in the left lane, sped up alongside Alkas and tried to squeeze in front of him in the right lane. However, according to Alkas, there was not

enough room between Alkas's truck in the right lane and Ruscitti's truck in the left lane for Indovina to make the lane change and Indovina lost control and hit Ruscitti's snowplow.

Alkas testified that at the time the accident occurred, Ruscitti was signaling his left turn but had not yet begun to make the turn and was still going forward. Notably, Ruscitti had agreed on cross-examination that if his bumper were hit while he was driving forward, it would have been dented directly inward, not from a left-to-right direction, and that if he had been hit from the right side, the bumper would have been dented in a right-to-left direction. Alkas had no explanation for how the truck was damaged on left side if the accident occurred while Indovina was attempting to move into the right lane.

Indovina testified that he was traveling in the left lane of Barrington Road. At Barrington's intersection with Higgins Rd./Route 72 there was a red light. This intersection was several blocks north of where the accident actually occurred. At the Higgins intersection, Indovina could see Ruscitti's snowplow to his right, in the right lane, and the other snowplow was behind Indovina in the left lane. He did not recall either vehicle having any strobe lights turned on and stated that the vehicles did not appear to be plowing any snow.

When the light turned green, Indovina accelerated slowly on account of the fact that his car fishtailed in the snow. Ruscitti's snowplow, however, had better traction and proceeded between 35 to 50 feet ahead of Indovina in the right hand lane, while the plow behind Indovina moved into the right hand lane. All of a sudden, Ruscitti, who was between 35 to 50 feet ahead in the right lane moved into Indovina's lane in an attempt to get into the left turn lane. Indovina immediately slammed on his brakes, but the car slid approximately 50 feet into the snowplow, the hood of the Lexus coming into contact with the left side of the rear bumper.

The claimant in a negligence case has the burden to prove by a preponderance of the evidence that the State was negligent and that such negligence was the proximate cause of the claimant's damages. *Allied Van Lines and Ray Houleite vs. Illinois* (1992), 45 Ill. Ct. Cl. 94. After reviewing the testimony and examining the evidence, we find the Claimant's testimony credible and find that he has proved his case by the preponderance of the evidence. The impact on the left side of Ruscitti's rear bumper is consistent with Indovina's version of events. Further, testimony offered by Respondent does not refute Indovina's version of events because the version of events offered by Respondent's employees is highly improbable. Namely, if Indovina collided with Ruscitti's truck while Indovina was trying to move into the right lane, there is no explanation for why the left side of Ruscitti's rear bumper was damaged – in a left-to-right direction.

However, this does not end our analysis. Respondent's liability is limited by the extent to which Indovina's failure to exercise reasonable care in providing for his own safety contributed to his damages. Illinois follows a partial comparative negligence scheme: a plaintiff is barred from recovery if his contributory fault accounts for more than 50 percent of the proximate cause of his damages, but if his contributory fault accounts for 50 percent or less, the plaintiff's recovery is diminished proportionate to the plaintiff's contributory fault. *See Karas v. Strevell*, 369 Ill.App.3d at 901 (discussing the comparative negligence scheme under 735 ILCS 5/2-1116).

Here, given the snowy nature of the road and that Indovina knew his Lexus did not get good traction on slippery roads, we would expect Indovina to stay a safe distance behind not only any vehicle in front of him in his lane, but any vehicle, especially a IDOT snowplow, in the adjacent lane as well. But Indovina stated that he had to "slam his brakes" when the snow plow

cut in front of him. This statement coupled with the nature of the accident can only lead us to believe that, under the extremely bad road conditions that existed, he was traveling faster than he should have been and also failed to keep a safe distance between himself and the snowplow.

Thus, we find that even though Ruscitti was negligent in cutting in front of Indovina, Indovina could have prevented the accident or at least lessened its magnitude, had he been more careful and aware of his surroundings. Accordingly, we find that Claimant's apportionment of fault via its insured, Mr. Indovina, is 50 percent and Respondent is liable for 50 percent of his damages.

Accordingly, Claimant's claim is GRANTED in part, and it is entitled to 50 percent of the requested \$11,374. Respondent is hereby ordered to pay Claimant \$5,687.

Negligence, Burden of proof- Claimant must prove by a preponderance of the evidence that the State owed him a duty, the duty was breached by a negligent act or omission, and that such negligence was the proximate cause of his injuries. Claimant must show that a dangerous and defective condition existed and that the State knew or should have known of said defective and dangerous condition. The uneven pavement was a minor defect and the State cannot be expected to remove all risks of accidents. Moreover, bicycle users assume the risk inherent with the sport. Additionally, no other visitors had complained of the defect. State found not negligent.

ORDER

Birnbaum, J.

THIS MATTER is before the Court upon a recommendation from Commissioner Buford following an evidentiary hearing held on September 13, 2011. Claimant, Brian J. Peterson, filed his Complaint sounding in negligence on February 22, 2010 arising from an August 4, 2009 incident while he was riding his bike at Moraine Hills State Park. He seeks reimbursement for medical expenses related to this injury.

Facts

On August 4, 2009, Claimant was riding his bicycle on a paved path in Moraine Hills State Park in McHenry, Illinois. More than ten miles of trails make Moraine Hills State Park popular for hikers, skiers and cyclists. Annually, Moraine Hills State Park hosts 70,000-90,000 visitors, half of which are bicyclists. Three trails, surfaced with crushed limestone, wind their way through the park, offering scenic and wildlife viewing opportunities. Within Moraine Hills State Park, Claimant was on the 3.7 mile "red trail", known as The Lake Defiance Loop. While

on this trail, Claimant alleges he was thrown from his bicycle while riding down a double winding hill where he encountered uneven pavement. The uneven pavement consisted of three cracks, apparently caused by tree roots pushing through the asphalt. This raise in pavement was estimated to be between one and two inches in height. Consequently, Claimant suffered from an AC phase three separation of his left shoulder which tore the ligaments in several areas of the left shoulder.

On June 17, 2010, Respondent filed a Motion to Dismiss pursuant to the Recreational Use of Land and Waters Areas Act, 745 ILCS 65/1, *et seq.* and the the "State Parks Act", 20 ILCS 835, *et seq.* On April 14, 2011 this Court denied Respondent's Motion to Dismiss. The Court denied Respondent's Motion because the Recreational Use of Land and Waters Areas Act did not apply to Claimant's 2009 injury, as the Act was amended in 2005 to include only hunting incidents. Before the 2005 amendment, the definition of "recreational or conservation purposes" was "any activity undertaken for conservation, resource management, exercise, education, relaxation, or pleasure on land owned by another." 745 ILCS 65/2. Effective August 18, 2005, an amendment by public act 94-625 changed the definition of "recreational or conservation purposes" to include the current language: "entry onto the land of another to conduct hunting or recreational shooting or a combination thereof or any activity solely related to the aforesaid hunting or recreational shooting." *Id.* Clearly, as Claimant's activity on August 4, 2009 failed to involve a hunting or recreational shooting incident, this Court denied Respondent's Motion to Dismiss pursuant to the Recreational Use of Land and Waters Areas Act.

Additionally, in the June 17, 2010 Motion to Dismiss Respondent argued that the "State Parks Act" required the Department of Natural Resources to "conserve the original character as distinguished from the artificial landscaping of such parks." 20 ILCS 835/3. Based on this

language, Respondent asserted that the tree roots are a natural feature of the land and thus, must be maintained as the natural character of the park. However, this Court held that the Department of Natural Resources has the power and responsibility to maintain the State parks, specifically the paths and trails, alongside preserving their natural character pursuant to Section 4 of the State Parks Act. 20 ILCS 835/4. Thus, this Court denied Respondent's Motion to Dismiss because the State Parks Act failed to apply to Claimant's 2009 injury. The case was remanded to the Commissioner for further proceedings.

On September 13, 2011, a hearing was held before Commissioner Buford. In addition to Claimant, the witnesses who testified at the September 13, 2011 hearing were the Superintendent from Moraine Hills State Park and a Conservation Police Officer overseeing the Park's district. The Moraine Hills State Park superintendent, Greg Kelly, has held the position of superintendent for eight years and his duties range from administrative responsibilities to personally supervising the maintenance and upkeep of the Park. Mr. Kelly testified he regularly checks the trails as part of his duties and also utilizes the trails for his personal recreational enjoyment. Specifically, he testified the cracks allegedly causing Claimant's injury were not hazardous and that he, and other Park visitors, frequently bicycle the trails without incident. Additionally, Mr. Kelly testified that no one has previously complained regarding the trail's cracks and park maintenance is ongoing. At the time of trial, Conservation Police Officer Mike Lyne had worked for the Illinois Conservation Police for 23 years and had specific law enforcement duties relating to Moraine Hills State Park since 1990. Officer Lyne testified that the cracks allegedly causing Claimant's injury were not distinguishable in regards to the rest of the trails in Moraine Hills. Additionally, Officer Lyne testified that he did not consider the condition dangerous or one that should be normally reported to the Department of Natural Resources.

Analysis

In order for Claimant to recover against the State, he must prove by a preponderance of the evidence that the State owed him a duty, the duty was breached by a negligent act or omission, and that such negligence was the proximate cause of his injuries. *Ondes v. State*, 43 Ill. Ct. Cl. 272 (1991). The State of Illinois owes a duty to the public to exercise reasonable care in establishing, maintaining and supervising its parks. *Kami v. State*, 21 Ill. Ct. Cl. 467 (1953); *Wightman v. State*, 32 Ill. Ct. Cl. 546 (1978). Additionally, in *Pearlman v. State*, 33 Ill. Ct. Cl. 28, 31 (1979), the Court reiterated that, "The State of Illinois is not an insurer and before the Respondent can be liable for Claimant's injury it must be shown by the preponderance or the greater weight of the evidence that a dangerous and defective condition existed and that the Respondent knew or should have known of said defective and dangerous condition."

In *Lyons v. State*, 39 Ill. Ct. Cl. 192 (1987), a park visitor was injured when her foot became caught in a hole on a platform near a wooden stairway at Blackhawk State Park in Rock Island. Recovery was disallowed, as the Court concluded the defect was minor, park employees made routine inspections prior to the incident and that there are some risks inherent in hiking. *Id.* at 194. This Court finds an analogous fact pattern in the present case. In this case, the evidence shows that the defect in the trail allegedly causing Claimant's injuries was 1-2 inches in height. From this evidence and the testimony of witnesses, it appears that the alleged defect at best, would be construed to be a minor defect on the trail. *Di minimis* or slight defects are not actionable in that no one would anticipate danger from such minor defects. *Putman v. Village of Bensenville*, 337 Ill. App. 3d 197, 786 N. E. 2d 203 (2003). Because the State is not an insurer it cannot be expected to remove all risks of accidents which may occur in the absence of negligence. *Kamin v. Illinois*, 21 Ill. Ct. Cl. 467 (1953). Both Officer Lyne and Site

Superintendent Kelly testified that small obstacles may appear on the trail and that it is important for a bicycle rider to proceed at a reasonable speed to keep the bicycle under control. This Court is of the opinion that bicycle users and hikers utilizing trails within the Moraine Hills State Park must be said to assume some risk inherent with the sport. Additional testimony indicates no visitors complained about the area prior to Claimant's accident and that maintenance of the area and surrounding trails is ongoing by park officials. The burden is upon the Claimant to prove by a preponderance of the evidence that the State breached its duty of reasonable care. The evidence and testimony at trial clearly shows that Respondent's agents had no notice of the alleged dangerous condition and did not breach their duty to exercise reasonable care in the maintenance of the Moraine Hills State Park. It is the opinion of the Court that Claimant has not shown by a preponderance of the evidence that the State was negligent.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that for the above reasons, this claim is DENIED.

Obligations of the State, Money owed to vendors- The State acknowledges that it owes Claimant \$88.47 in interest, but argues that 30 ILCS 105/30 prohibits obligating the State to any indebtedness in excess of the money appropriated for a department. However, the Prompt Payment Act allows the Comptroller to promulgate rules regarding payment of interest claims and the Comptroller specifically promulgated a rule that permits vendors to seek recourse in the Court of Claims for interest payments due vendors where an appropriation is exhausted or lapsed.

ORDER

Birnbaum, J.

This matter coming to be heard on the motion of Respondent to dismiss. The Court being fully advised in the premises finds that:

Claimant filed this claim as a lapsed appropriation claim in the amount of \$84.22. The amount in controversy arises from interest penalties that the State acknowledges it owes under the Illinois Prompt Payment Act. Respondent has filed a departmental report in investigation of this claim that has been prepared by the State's Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor. Pursuant to 74 Ill. Adm. Code 790.140 a Departmental Report is prima facie evidence of the facts set forth therein. The Departmental Report acknowledges that this is a valid claim. However, Respondent argues there are no funds available to pay this claim.

Respondent argues that Section 30 of An Act in Relation to State Finance, 30 ILCS 105/30, prohibits obligating the State to any indebtedness in excess of the money appropriated for a department. For the reasons set forth below we find that claims for interest under the

Prompt Payment Act are not governed by Section 30 ILCS 105/30.

The State Prompt Payment Act is set forth in 30 ILCS 540 (30 ILCS 540/1) (from Ch. 127, par. 132.401).

Relevant sections of The Act are as follows:

Sec. 1. This Act applies to any State official or agency authorized to provide for payment from State funds, by virtue of any appropriation of the General Assembly, for goods or services furnished to the State.

Sec. 3-1. The Illinois Court of Claims shall, in its investigation of payments due claimants, provide for interest penalties as prescribed in this Act. (Emphasis Added)

Sec. 3-2. Beginning July 1, 1993, in any instance where a State official or agency is late in payment of a vendor's bill or invoice for goods or services furnished to the State, as defined in Section 1, properly approved in accordance with rules promulgated under Section 3-3, the State official or agency shall pay interest to the vendor in accordance with the following:

(1) Any bill approved for payment under this Section must be paid or the payment issued to the payee within 60 days of receipt of a proper bill or invoice. If payment is not issued to the payee within this 60 day period, an interest penalty of 1.0% of any amount approved and unpaid shall be added for each month or fraction thereof after the end of this 60 day period, until final payment is made.

(2) Where a State official or agency is late in payment of a vendor's bill or invoice properly approved in accordance with this Act, and different late payment terms are not reduced to writing as a contractual agreement, the State official or agency shall automatically pay interest penalties required by this Section amounting to \$50 or more to the appropriate vendor. Each agency shall be responsible for determining whether an interest penalty is owed and for paying

the interest to the vendor.

The Prompt Payment Act also provides (30 ILCS 540/3-3) (from Ch. 127, par. 132.403-3):

Sec. 3-3. The State Comptroller and the Department of Central Management Services shall jointly promulgate rules and policies to govern the uniform application of this Act. These rules and policies shall include procedures and time frames for approving a bill or invoice from a vendor for goods or services furnished to the State. These rules and policies shall provide for procedures and time frames applicable to payment plans as may be agreed upon between State agencies and vendors. These rules and policies shall be binding on all officials and agencies under this Act's jurisdiction. These rules and policies may be made effective no earlier than July 1, 1993. (Source: P.A. 92-384, eff. 7-1-02.)

Sec. 3-4. The State Comptroller must specify the manner in which State agencies shall record interest penalty payments under this Act. The State Comptroller may require vouchers submitted for payment, including submission by electronic or other means approved by the Comptroller, to indicate the appropriate date from which interest penalties may be calculated as required under this Act.

Those Rules are set forth at 74 Ill. Adm. Code 900 and provide in pertinent part:

900.35 (d) In the event the **appropriation originally charged** with the Goods or Services **is exhausted** and the State agency **has exhausted its transfer of funds** authority pursuant to 30 ILCS 105/13.2, **the appropriation has lapsed** or the agency has improperly refused to pay interest, **Vendors may have recourse before the Court of Claims for payment of interest penalties. (Emphasis Added)**

The exceptions to these rules are found in Section 900.120 Exclusions. It is a non-

exhaustive list of 16 types of payments that are excluded from the Act and consequently do not qualify for interest penalties. Those exceptions are not evident here.

After a review of the legislation and from the Rules promulgated by a grant of the Legislature, it is clear that vendors may seek recourse in the Court of Claims for interest payments due vendors where an appropriation is exhausted or lapsed. This Court previously held in *McLean County vs. State*, 42 Ill.Ct.Cl. 92 (1994) that it is beyond the authority of this Court to make awards that exceed the Legislature's appropriation. But here, the Legislature gave a specific grant to the Comptroller to promulgate rules regarding payment of interest claims. Thus we find that the Legislature granted specific authority to pay these interest claims where warranted and that such claims are distinguishable from those lapsed appropriation claims that are rightfully denied where the Department lacks sufficient funds. In the instant case the Departmental Report acknowledges that these monies are owed. Therefore, we deny the Motion to Dismiss and grant the Claimant an award in the amount of \$84.22.

Immunity- College Campus Press Act gives immunity from liability arising from expressions published in campus media. The content of the article published in The Northern Star is immaterial. The Northern Star is a "Campus Media" and the article was an expression of a student reporter. Respondent is immune from Complaint's claim of defamation.

ORDER

Storino, J.

This cause comes before the Court on Respondent's Motion to Dismiss pursuant to Section 2-619(a)(9) of the Illinois Code of Civil Procedure, the Court having reviewed the court file, and the Court being fully advised:

The Court finds as follows:

The State of Illinois filed a Motion to Dismiss claiming that the existence of an affirmative matter defeats Claimants' allegations.

Claimants filed a four count Complaint against Respondents for defamation per se and defamation per quod alleging that a defamatory article published by Northern Illinois' The Northern Star caused damages to their reputation and their ability to rent apartments.

In Illinois, a motion for involuntary dismissal under Section 2-619 of the Code of Civil Procedure should only be granted in those cases in which there are no material facts in dispute and respondent is entitled to dismissal as a matter of law. *Rochon v. Rodriquez*, 293 Ill. App. 3d

952, 689 N.E. 2d 288 (1st Dist. 1997). A motion to dismiss under Section 2-619 views all allegations contained in the complaint in the light most favorable to the plaintiff and should only be granted if no set of facts can be proved which would entitle plaintiff to recover. *Longfellow by Longfellow v. Corey*, 286 Ill. App. 3d 366, 675 N.E. 2d 1386 (4th Dist. 1997). The main purpose of Section 2-619 is to provide means of disposing of issues of law or easily proved issues of fact. *Smith v. St. Therese Hospital*, 87 Ill. App. 3d 782, 410 N.E. 2d 219 (2nd Dist. 1980).

It is well established that the College Campus Press Act (the "Act") provides that the State of Illinois is immune from liability arising from expression published in campus media. The Act provides, in pertinent part:

"Immunity. A State-sponsored institution of higher learning shall be immune from any lawsuit arising from expression actually made in campus media, with the exception of the institution's own expression." *110 ILCS 13/35 (West 2011)*.

The Act defines "Campus Media" as follows:

"Campus Media means any matter that is prepared, substantially written, published, or broadcast by students at State-sponsored institutions of higher learning, that is distributed or generally made available, either free of charge or for a fee, to members of the student body, and that is prepared under the direction of a student media adviser. Campus media does not include media that is intended for distribution or transmission solely in the classrooms in which it is produced." *110 ILCS 13/5 (West 2011)*.

In addition, the Act clearly defines Northern Illinois University as a "State-sponsored institution of higher learning." *110 ILCS 13/5 (West 2011)*.

For the purposes of Respondent's Motion to Dismiss and this Court's Order, the content of the article published in The Northern Star is immaterial. The key issues are whether The Northern Star is "Campus Media" under the Act, and whether the article was an expression of Respondents. The pleadings and affidavits clearly indicate that The Northern Star is prepared, substantially written, and published by NIU students, and as such is the very definition of

"Campus Media" under the Act. In addition, Claimants admit that the article at issue was written by a student reporter.

Furthermore, Section 13/25 of the Act states as follows:

"Campus policy and speech distinguished. Expression made by a collegiate student journalist, collegiate student editor, or other contributor in campus media is neither an expression of campus policy nor speech attributable to a State-sponsored institution of higher learning."

As the article was written by a student journalist in campus media, it is as a matter of law neither an expression of campus policy nor speech attributable to Respondents. As a result, Claimants' Complaint against the State of Illinois must be dismissed on the basis of immunity. This Court deems it unnecessary to rule upon the State of Illinois' additional argument for dismissal.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED THAT:

1. The State of Illinois' Motion to Dismiss is granted.
2. That this case is dismissed with prejudice.

(No. 11-CC-0264 – Claim denied)

Eligibility for Benefits under the Line of Duty Compensation Act, Burden of proof, Killed in the line of duty- “Killed in the line of duty” is a precondition to granting Claimant compensation under the Act. The term excludes death resulting from the willful misconduct or intoxication of a claimant. The burden of proof is on the AG’s office.

Benefits under the Line of Duty Compensation Act, Killed in the line of duty, Intoxication- Autopsy report showed Claimant’s blood alcohol level was 0.191% at the time of death, twice the legal limit in Illinois. Claimant was intoxicated when his fatal accident occurred, but the AG’s office failed to prove that his death was the result of his intoxication. Evidence suggests that the accident with the deer could have occurred even absent his intoxication.

Benefits under the Line of Duty Compensation Act, Killed in the line of duty, Willful misconducts- Claimant violated motor laws against intoxicated driving, which exposes not only the intoxicated driver to danger, but also the people and property around him. As a volunteer firefighter, Claimant could decide whether he wanted to respond to a call based on whether he was in the area and whether he felt that he could respond. Claimant’s personal decision to drive while intoxicated amounted to willful misconduct and the claim is denied.

OPINION

Sprague, C.J.

This Claim was filed on August 16, 2010, arising from the death of Kurt M. Meusel on May 22, 2010 from injuries sustained as a volunteer firefighter with the Scales Mound Fire Protection District. 820 ILCS 315/1 et seq (Line of Duty Compensation Act) mandates that the Attorney General's (AG's) Office investigate claims for compensation under the Act. In accordance with this mandate, the AG's Office filed its Report on September 28, 2010, which included such documents as the Scales Mound Fire Protection District Statement of Beneficiary

naming Firefighter Meusel's fiancée Kara Ann Homb as beneficiary, the Medical Examiner's Certificate of Death, the Jo Daviess County Coroner's Report, Autopsy Report, Toxicology Analysis, and various other reports made by the Scales Mound Fire Protection District and the Jo Daviess County Sheriff.

In its Report of September 28, 2010, the Attorney General recommended that the Court determine through assignment to a Commissioner, and a hearing if necessary, whether Firefighter Meusel was "killed in the line of duty," as defined in section 2(e) of the Act

On October 15, 2010 this Court ordered that this cause be assigned to a Commissioner to take and file evidence as to whether Firefighter Meusel was "killed in the line of duty," as defined in section 2(e) of the Act, and to resolve other matters as may be necessary to reach a determination of this claim. A hearing was held before a Commissioner on April 5, 2011. Firefighter Meusel's fiancée Kara Homb, her father Paul Homb, Firefighter Meusel's parents, Susan and Mike Meusel, Chief Carl Winter of Scales Mound Fire Protection District, and Lieutenant Joanne Zito of Scales Mound Fire District were all given an opportunity to speak on the record at the hearing.

FACTUAL BACKGROUND

The Jo Daviess Sheriff's Office Report indicates that on May 22, 2010, at about 8:44 p.m., officers had been dispatched to 6508 North Pea Ridge Rd, Scales Mound, IL in reference to a missing elderly man. While en route to the residence, the officers instructed the dispatch center to "page out" the Scales Mound Fire District and the Jo Daviess County K9 Unit for assistance with the search. According to the Sheriff's Office Report, when the officers arrived at the residence around 8:58 p.m., several members from the Scales Mound Fire District were already on the scene. Chief Winters concurred that he received a page around 8:44 p.m. and

indicated that he arrived at 6508 North Pea Ridge Rd. between 8:54 and 8:59. However, he stated that the Jo Daviess Sherriff's officers had arrived before anyone from Scales Mound Fire District arrived.

Chief Winters recalled that he received another page around 9:14 p.m. This page was regarding Volunteer Firefighter Kurt Meusel, who had left his home on his four-wheel ATV in response to the page. While en route to search for the lost man, Firefighter Meusel got into a fatal accident in his ATV on North Mill Creek Road, a gravel road in Thompson Township. His body was found face down on the east edge of the roadway. His ATV was found upside down in a ditch with deer hair in the radiator, and was located 30 to 50 feet ahead of Firefighter Meusel. The body of a deer was found in the ditch in close proximity to Firefighter Meusel. Chief Winters stated that Firefighter Meusel's house was about half a mile from the accident scene and about six miles from 6508 North Pea Ridge Rd.

The Medical Examiner's Certificate of Death states that Firefighter Meusel was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident on May 22, 2010 and that the cause of his death was blunt trauma to the head. The Jo Daviess County Coroner's Report, Autopsy Report, and Toxicology Analysis contain laboratory findings that Firefighter Meusel's blood alcohol level was 0.191 %.

Respondent and Claimant were given the opportunity to present accident reconstruction testimony but declined. Also, both Claimant and Firefighter Meusel's beneficiary declined to have an attorney represent them in this claim. At this Court's Request, Claimant produced the *Scales Mound Fire Protection District Standard Operating Procedures* in effect at the time of the incident.⁶

⁶ In wake of this tragedy, the Fire Protection District enacted new *Bylaws of the Volunteer Fire Departments of the Scales Mound Fire Protection District*, which were provided to the Court (the previous bylaws were from

Paragraph 3 of Provision 2 of the *Scales Mound Fire Protection District Standard Operating Procedures* states, "The drivers of the emergency vehicles and Firefighters responding in personal vehicles will obey all traffic laws." Paragraph 2 of Provision 15.0 states, "Emergency vehicle drivers will not drink and drive." Paragraph 13 of the same provision addresses firefighters responding to calls in their personal vehicles and reiterates, "Driver's must obey all traffic laws." Paragraph 13 also states that firefighters responding in their personal vehicles must attach a flashing blue strobe light to alert the public that the vehicle is responding to an emergency. Pursuant to Provision 1, all members of the Volunteer Fire Department must read and understand the *Scales Mound Fire Protection District Standard Operating Procedures*.

Chief Winters testified at the hearing that the Scales Mound Fire District was totally voluntary and that the volunteers were on call "24/7." All of the volunteer firemen got voice/tone pagers that they were to carry at all times. He explained that when there was an emergency, the Jo Daviess County Sherriff's Department would page the members of the Fire District, and then the volunteer firemen who were available responded. By "available" Chief Winters clarified that responding to a call was a "personal decision that a volunteer firefighter made based on whether he was in the area, whether he felt that he could respond to that cause." Winters noted that when a call was over and volunteers were no longer needed, the volunteers

1949 and, according to Chief Winter, were a paragraph long). Section 3 of the new *Bylaws* states, "There will be no alcohol or illegal substance abuse allowed or tolerated while responding to an emergency situation or responding to the Fire Station."

Also in the wake of this tragedy, the District added provision #57.0, "Personal Vehicle Operations" to the *Standard Operating Procedures* in July 2010 to emphasize its position regarding drinking and driving and safe vehicle operation. The relevant paragraphs under the heading "Responsibility" state the following:

1. It is the sole responsibility of the individual to properly drive and operate their personal vehicle while responding to the station and emergency incident.
2. The individual is expected to operate the vehicle safely, obey all applicable State or Illinois Rules of the Road, and show due regard for public safety.
3. It is not implied that the Fire Department personnel shall at anytime be encouraged or authorized to operate their personal vehicle unsafely and without due regard especially when responding to an emergency incident.
4. There will be no alcohol or illegal substance abuse allowed or tolerated while responding to an emergency situation or responding to the Fire Station (this paragraph reiterates verbatim Section 3 of the *Bylaws of the Volunteer Fife Departments of the Scales Mound Fire Protection District*).

were all notified on their pagers.

Claimant offered statistics compiled by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources reporting that 3,945 deer were removed in Jo Daviess County during the 2010 Deer hunting /archery season. Claimant also offered Jo Daviess County Sheriff's Traffic Accident statistics for 2010, reporting 401 total traffic accidents, of which 132 (about 32.92%) involved deer. Further, Claimant submitted a letter written by Roselynn Y. Marsh, who wrote that she has lived in Jo Daviess County for approximately 35 years and can personally attest to the dangerousness the deer population presents by suddenly running into the direct path of oncoming vehicles. Mrs. Marsh recalled that during a fourteen week period, she had two collisions with two different deer in two different vehicles while driving at night in Jo Daviess County. Both collisions caused extensive front-end damage and had been reported to the police.

Claimant submitted several other letters into evidence as well. Letters admitted into evidence written by Firefighter Meusel's mother Sue Meusel, and by his younger brother and younger brother's wife, Sean and Katie Meusel, indicate that on May 22, 2010 Firefighter Meusel was with Scales Mound Fire District helping with a triathlon from morning until noon. Chief Winter confirmed this when he testified at the April 5 hearing, explaining that Firefighter Meusel and other members of the fire crew were watching the triathlon route for accidents and things of that nature.

According to Sean and Katie's letter, Firefighter Meusel returned from the triathlon to his home (the one he shared with Kara at 1521 North Hoppe, Elizabeth, IL) to help with the installation of a DISH satellite. He then went to Scales Mound with Sean to get a skid loader, and they returned to Schapville to do landscaping work. Around 5 p.m. Firefighter Meusel, Sean, and their father Mike went to buy an old boat needing repair. They came back to Mike

and Sue's house (627 E. Schapville Road, Scales Mound, IL) around 6 p.m. and started working on the motor until almost dusk. When Mike started grilling steak and potatoes around 8:45 p.m., Firefighter Meusel got the page regarding the missing elderly man.

Since Firefighter Meusel's truck was hooked up to the trailer that the skid loader was on, he took the ATV he had at his parents' house. Sean and Katie Meusel noted in their letter that the ATV would be easy to take into the woods where he was going to search for the elderly man. Before proceeding to search for the man, however, Firefighter Meusel drove to his house so he could pick up his fire jacket and affix the blue strobe light to his ATV. He then drove past his parents' home on his way to begin the search. Sue Meusel recalled in her letter that, as he passed her house, he quickly stopped and asked Kara for his pack of cigarettes and said, "I know where he is; I'll be right back – love ya!"

Chief Winters noted at the hearing that two days prior to the incident in question, the Scales Mound Fire District, including Firefighter Meusel, conducted a search and rescue with the neighboring Elizabeth Fire Department. From 5:30 p.m. to midnight, they were using ATV's to search for a missing person in the Galena territory. Winters opined, "I can only imagine what went through Kurt's head knowing that he needed to respond like we did just two nights prior to that using ATVs for my search." Winters also stated that Firefighter Meusel knew that area very well – better than he did even.

In two other letters Claimant submitted into evidence, written by Jeffrey Korte, Firefighter Meusel's employer at Korte Farms, and William B. Miller, Coroner of Jo Daviess County, both men indicate that Firefighter Meusel was very familiar with the area where the accident occurred. Miller also offered his personal feelings that, "[e]ven though Kurt Meusel had alcohol in his system, I believe this accident could not be avoided due to location, dark

surroundings with no street lights, and the ATV vehicle being struck by a deer coming from the field/ditch area." At the hearing, Chief Winters also noted that the grass in the field was very tall – that is why it was not so easy to immediately find the deer carcass.

We must note that despite numerous people describing the events of the day that preceded Firefighter Meusel's tragic accident, none mentioned anything about an event that, based on the toxicology report, obviously occurred: Firefighter Meusel's consumption of a sufficient quantity of alcoholic beverages that placed his blood alcohol level in an amount in excess of twice the legal limit in Illinois.

ANALYSIS

The decedent having been "killed in the line of duty" is a precondition to granting a claimant compensation under the Line of Duty Compensation Act. The relevant portion of 820 ILCS 315/2(e) provides the following definition for "killed in the line of duty"

"Killed in the line of duty" means losing one's life as a result of injury received in the active performance of duties as a law enforcement officer, civil defense worker, civil air patrol member, paramedic, fireman, or chaplain if the death occurs within one year from the date the injury was received and if that injury arose from violence or other accidental cause...**The term excludes death resulting from the willful misconduct or intoxication of the officer, civil defense worker, civil air patrol member, paramedic, fireman, chaplain, or State employee. However, the burden of proof of such willful misconduct or intoxication of the officer, civil defense worker, civil air patrol member, paramedic, fireman, chaplain, or State employee is on the Attorney General.** (emphasis added).

Here, Firefighter Meusel was responding to a call when his fatal accident occurred, and he was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident; so his death occurred within a year of an injury that arose in the active performance of his duties as a volunteer fireman. Further, his injury arose from an accidental cause: he suffered blunt trauma to the head in an ATV accident. However, the Jo Daviess County Coroner's Report, Autopsy Report, and Toxicology Report

contain laboratory findings that Firefighter Meusel's blood alcohol content was .191%. The issue before this Court is whether Claimant's claim should be denied because Firefighter Meusel's death was the result of intoxication or willful misconduct. Pursuant to 820 ILCS 315/2(e), the burden of proving such willful misconduct or intoxication is on the AG's Office.

To prove that a decedent's blood alcohol concentration rendered him intoxicated at the time of his death, Respondent must establish the legal significance of said concentration. *See In re Application of Warren H. Yoho and Maridell A. Yoho* (1989), 42 Ill. Ct. Cl. 249 (finding that the State had failed to prove that decedent's fatal fall off a balcony was the result of intoxication because the State did not establish the significance of decedent's .225 blood alcohol level in a non-vehicle-related accident).

Here, Respondent has introduced the significance of Firefighter Meusel's .191% blood alcohol level. Respondent notes in its Report, pursuant to 625 ILCS 5/11-501 (a)(1), a person shall not drive or be in actual physical control of any vehicle within this State while the alcohol concentration in the person's blood or breath is .08 or more. Firefighter Meusel's blood alcohol concentration was more than twice this legal limit.

Respondent also references Section 11-501.2(b)(3), which provides that upon any criminal or civil proceeding arising out of acts alleged to have been committed by any person while driving or in actual physical control of a vehicle while under the influence of alcohol, "if there was at that time an alcohol concentration of .08 or more, it shall be presumed that the person was under the influence of alcohol." Although this presumption does not limit the admission of other relevant evidence regarding whether the decedent was under the influence of alcohol at the time of his fatal accident, no such evidence was presented to rebut this legal presumption in the case at bar. Thus, we find that Firefighter Meusel was intoxicated when his

fatal accident occurred. *See In re Application of Reininger*, (finding that the decedent's death was the result of intoxication where his blood alcohol level was .207 (which was .207 times the .1 limit at the time) when he drove his unmarked police car into the rear of a truck).

However the AG's Office still needs to prove that Firefighter Meusel's death was a result of his intoxication. Here, the evidence gathered at the accident scene indicated that Firefighter Meusel had an accident with a deer. But the AG offers no evidence (such as accident reconstruction reports or testimony) indicating how, if at all, Firefighter Meusel's accident with the deer was the result of his intoxication. Further, Claimant introduced evidence that deer accidents are not uncommon in Jo Daviess County, which has a large deer population – almost one third of the 401 traffic accidents reported in Jo Daviess County in 2010 involved deer. Thus, there was at least a possibility that Decedent's accident could have occurred even absent his intoxication. This fact coupled with the lack of any evidence presented by the AG's Office showing how Firefighter Meusel's intoxication caused his death, leaves us to find that the burden of proof that Firefighter Meusel died as a result of his intoxication has not been met.

We next turn to whether Firefighter Meusel's death was the result of willful misconduct. In *In Re: Application of Louise E. Jobe* (1982), 35 Ill.Ct.Cl. 404, the most recent case discussing the meaning of "willful misconduct" under the Act, the Court found that no willful misconduct occurred where a police officer responding as backup to a domestic violence call waited at a railroad intersection for a southbound train to pass and immediately drove past the still lowered railroad-crossing gates and was struck and killed by a northbound train that he could not see before crossing the railroad tracks. The Court reached this holding despite the Des Plaines Police Department rule stating that emergency calls should be answered "consistent with normal safety precautions and vehicle laws;" the Illinois Motor Vehicle Code provision proscribing

driving through, under, or around railroad-crossing gates; and the fact that there was no exception to this rule under the emergency-vehicle exceptions provision of the Code.

Since the Act does not define "willful misconduct," the AG's Office in *Jobe* submitted a memorandum noting that willful or wanton misconduct was a prerequisite in several statutory causes of action in Illinois. Specifically, the AG's Office recommended using the definition of "willful and wanton misconduct" used in cases regarding the "Guest Statute" in the Illinois Motor Vehicle Code: "willful and wanton misconduct is a conscious disregard for one's own safety and that of others."⁷

This definition is consistent with definitions in other tort-related contexts. *See Oelze v. Score Sports Venture, LLC* 401 Ill.App.3d 110, 123, 927 N.E.2d 137, 149, 339 Ill.Dec. 596, 608 (Ill.App. 1 Dist. 2010) (discussing willful and wanton acts in the context of plaintiffs challenge to a release of liability and finding, "Willful and wanton acts show actual or deliberate intent to harm or, if not intentional, show an utter indifference to or conscious disregard for a person's own safety or the safety or property of others."); *Burke v. 12 Rothschild's Liquor Mart, Inc.*, 148 Ill.2d 429, 452, 593 N.E.2d 522, 532, 170 Ill.Dec. 633, 643 (Ill. 1992) (discussing "willful and wanton conduct" in the context of contributory negligence and finding, "Willful and wanton conduct is found where an act was done with actual intention or with a conscious disregard or indifference for the consequences when the known safety of other persons was involved."); *see also* 745 ILCS 10/1-210 (Illinois Local Governmental and Governmental Employees Tort Immunity Act)(defining willful and wanton conduct as "a course of action which shows an actual or deliberate intention to cause harm or which, if not intentional, shows an utter indifference to

⁷ The Guest Statute in place during that time period limited a driver's liability to a gratuitous automobile passenger to only those situations where the driver was guilty of willful misconduct. *In Re: Application of Louise E. Jobe*, (1982), 35 Ill.Ct.Cl. 404.

or conscious disregard for the safety of others or their property).

The Court in *Jobe* declined to accept this standard definition to the extent that it included "disregard for one's own safety." The Court reasoned that, "[t]he very nature of a law enforcement officer's duties require that he take risks to which the ordinary public is not even exposed...To hold that a law enforcement officer was engaged in willful misconduct when he exhibited a disregard for his own safety would be contrary to the purposes of the Act and disqualify many deserving officers." Nonetheless, the Court declined to set a standard definition for "willful misconduct," noting that "the determination should be made on a case-by-case basis which allows for taking into consideration all of the attendant circumstances of the incident."

In finding that Officer Jobe had not engaged in willful misconduct under the Act, the Court noted that even though he violated a provision of the Illinois Motor Vehicle Code, he did not endanger anyone's safety but his own; he was not intentionally trying to hurt himself; and he was responding as a backup officer to a domestic disturbance call, which he thought it imperative to answer immediately.⁸ The Court noted that although Officer Jobe may have been negligent and with perfect hindsight perhaps exhibited poor judgment, under the circumstances, he was not engaged in willful misconduct as contemplated in the Act.

In the case at bar, Volunteer Firefighter Meusel violated Illinois motorist laws against intoxicated driving. Unlike the provision violated by the officer in *Jobe*, which was a petty offense, the provision violated here was, at a minimum, a Class A misdemeanor.⁹ Further, in *Jobe*, the officer's decision to bypass the lowered gate only exposed him to danger – and that also for a small segment of time, the time it took to cross the railroad tracks. Conversely, Firefighter

⁸ Counsel for both sides agreed (the call was dangerous. According to an F.B.I. report, domestic disturbance calls were responsible for the highest percentage of police officer fatalities between 1970 and 1979.

⁹ Pursuant to 625 ILCS 5/11-1201 "Obedience to signal indicating approach of train or railroad track equipment," a violation of this Section, "is a petty offense for which a fine of \$250 shall be imposed for a first violation."

Meusel drove his ATV intoxicated: driving while intoxicated exposes not only the intoxicated driver to danger, but also to the people and property around him – the entire time the intoxicated driver is on the road.

Given the totality of these circumstances, we find that Firefighter Meusel exhibited a conscious disregard for his own safety and that of others when he drove his ATV while over twice the legal limit – in direct violation of Illinois traffic safety laws as well as Scales Mound Operating Procedures aimed at ensuring the safety of firefighters and the public at large. When he got the page, it was his decision whether he could be available to take the call. It was his personal decision to get on the ATV after he had been drinking alcohol. Had he decided not to take the call because he wanted to obey the Scales Mound Standard Operating Procedures and Illinois law, and not drive intoxicated, he would not have driven the ATV, and the accident would not have occurred. Therefore, we find that Firefighter Meusel's death was the result of willful misconduct.

Firefighter Meusel's effort to help find an elderly man was undoubtedly noble and in the highest tradition of volunteer service. Our finding of willful misconduct on his part should in no way be interpreted as detracting from his heroic and longstanding commitment to serving his community. Benefits under the Illinois Line of Duty Compensation Act, like everything else, have limitations. The Illinois Legislature in its deliberation has sought fit to limit compensation under this Act by precluding deaths that are the result of will fill misconduct or intoxication. We must therefore deny Claimant's claim.

Eligibility for Benefits under the Line of Duty Compensation Act, Burden of proof-
Claimant bears the burden of proof by a preponderance of the evidence of each element required under the Act.

Application for Benefits under the Line of Duty Compensation Act, Element of residency-
Claimant must prove that the decedent was an Illinois resident at the time of his death. The Court in *In Re Application of Shaw*, made three determinations: (1) an adult neither acquires new domicile nor abandons previous domicile by entering the military; (2) a person in the military retains the residence of the state from which he was inducted until he either abandons the previous residence or establishes a new residence; (3) there is a rebuttable presumption that a person in the military retains residence in the state from which he was inducted. Based on the evidence of decedent's residency between the date of induction and the time of his death, there is sufficient evidence to support a finding that he was a resident of Illinois at the time of his death. Claimants are awarded compensation plus interest.

OPINION

Sprague, C.J.

This matter concerns the consolidation of two claims under the Line of Duty Compensation Act, (820 ILCS 315/1 et seq.), ("Act"), involving the death of Sergeant Timothy Douglas Sayne. Both claims were filed on November 15, 2011. The first Claimant is Thania Michell Sayne who is the widow of Sgt. Sayne. The second Claimant is Mary K. Sayne who is the mother of Sgt. Sayne. On December 20, 2011 the Attorney General's Office issued a Consolidated Report and Recommendation finding that all elements for a compensable claim under the Act had been met except for the requirement that Sgt. Sayne be a resident of the State of Illinois at the time of his death as required by 820 ILCS 315/2(1). The Court issued a

Consolidated Opinion on January 9, 2012. The Consolidated Opinion held consistent with the Attorney General's Office's Consolidated Report and Recommendation and found that all elements under the Act had been satisfied except for the issue of residency. The Court ordered that a hearing be conducted to ascertain the residency of Sgt. Sayne. On March 13, 2012 Commissioner Ysursa held a hearing on the matter. Assistant Attorney General Julie Morgan was present for the State and Claimants appeared *pro se*.

I. Background

Mary Sayne, Sgt. Sayne's mother, testified as to Sgt. Sayne's residence prior to entering military service. She stated that Sgt. Sayne lived in Effingham, Illinois with her. She stated that Sgt. Sayne grew up in Illinois. She testified that Sgt. Sayne considered joining the military while living in Effingham and met with a military recruiter but he never entered military service while living in Effingham. She testified that Sgt. Sayne moved to Reno, Nevada due to work in 2007. She stated that he was living and working in Reno, Nevada for approximately a year when he enlisted in the military in February 2008.

Thania Sayne, Sgt. Sayne's widow, testified that she and Sgt. Sayne were married in October 2009 in Reno, Nevada. She stated that she is originally from the Reno, Nevada area and met Sgt. Sayne in 2007. She stated that after they were married they moved to Fort Wainwright, Alaska where Sgt. Sayne was stationed. She testified that Sgt. Sayne was then sent to Afghanistan where he lost his life. She testified that the intention of her and Sgt. Sayne was to live in Effingham, Illinois after his service in the military ended.

Claimant presented a packet of information to prove Sgt. Sayne's residence in Illinois which was marked as Group Exhibit A and admitted into evidence. Group Exhibit A contains numerous documents of varying probative value with two documents being most relevant to

residency. First is a Deployment Cycle Checklist from 2008 wherein the address of Sgt. Sayne was listed as Effingham, Illinois. Second is a letter dated November 19, 2010, wherein the Secretary of State's Illinois Drivers Services responded to Sgt. Sayne's inquiry about maintaining his driver's license with the State of Illinois. In addition to these documents, both Claimants testified that Sgt. Sayne's vehicle always maintained Illinois license plates. Other relevant evidence contained in Group Exhibit A was the fact that Sgt. Sayne applied for a Nevada Identification but he did not seek a Nevada driver's license.

II. Analysis

In order to be eligible for benefits under the Act a claimant bears the burden of proof by a preponderance of the evidence of each element required under the Act. *In Re Application of Pappalardo*, 37 Ill.Ct.Cl. 331 (1985). In this case, the Attorney General's Office has determined that all elements required under the Act have been met except for the element of the residency. Pursuant to §315/2(l) of the Act, in order to be eligible for benefits under the Act, a claimant must prove that the decedent was an Illinois resident at the time of his/her death. See *in Re Application of Shaw*, Case No. 10-CC-2817 (2010).

This Court recently addressed the residency requirement under the Act in the case of *In Re Application of Shaw*, Case No. 10-CC-2817(2010). In the *Shaw* case the decedent was born in Mississippi; moved to Chicago when he was two years old to live with his grandmother; went to college in Houston, Texas during which his grandmother died; and moved his belongings into his uncle's home in Illinois. SFC Shaw never moved back to Illinois after college as he enlisted in the military. Just as in this case, the decedent married and lived with his wife on military bases. In *Shaw*, the decedent maintained an Illinois driver's license and maintained his voter registration in Illinois. The Court noted that the Act does not define "residency". The Court

reasoned that "residence" and "domicile" are generally synonymous and analyzed other jurisdictions' interpretations of the domicile of military personnel. The Court issued three important determinations. First, an adult neither acquires new domicile nor abandons previous domicile by entering the military. Second, a person in the military retains the residency of the State from which he was inducted until he either abandons the previous residence or establishes a new residence. Third, there is a rebuttal presumption that a person in the military retains residence in the state from which he was inducted. See *In Re Application of Shaw*, Case No. 10-CC-2817 (2010).

In this case, the residence of Sgt. Sayne at the time of his induction, much less the time of his death, is subject to argument. In the five (5) years prior to his death, Sgt. Sayne lived in three different states while at the same time serving two tours of duty in the Middle East. Prior to 2007 he lived in Effingham, Illinois. In 2007 he moved to Reno, Nevada due to his work. In 2008 he enlisted in the military and his first duty station was in Fort Wainwright, Alaska. Due to the fact that Sgt. Sayne lived in Nevada at the time of his enlistment, one can argue that the Shaw presumption is that he was a Nevada resident. However, the evidence and testimony presented demonstrate that he never abandoned his Illinois residence when moving to Nevada nor did he ever establish residency in Nevada. Specifically, Sgt. Sayne did not move out of Illinois because he wanted to live elsewhere; rather his move was precipitated by the need to maintain his job. Sgt. Sayne did not obtain a Nevada driver's license and did not register to vote in Nevada. Sgt. Sayne ultimately left Nevada to join the military with no apparent intention of returning there to live permanently. The only document presented into evidence as part Group Exhibit A that evidences what Sgt. Sayne considered to be his residency at the time of enlistment is a Deployment Cycle Checklist from 2008 which lists Sgt. Sayne's home address as being in

Effingham, Illinois. Based upon this evidence the Court determines that Sgt. Sayne's residency at the time of induction into the military was Illinois.

While residency at the time of induction creates a presumption of residency, this presumption is rebuttal so the Court must examine the evidence of Sgt. Sayne's residency and domicile between the date of induction and the time of his death. As stated previously, the domicile of Sgt. Sayne in the five years prior to his death included Illinois, Nevada and Alaska. During the time out of the State of Illinois Sgt. Sayne never purchased a home in a different state, never registered to vote in any State, nor did he obtain a driver's license in another state. He maintained his vehicle registration with the State of Illinois and most significantly in November 2010, after living in Nevada, marrying, serving a tour in Iraq and being stationed in Alaska, Sgt. Sayne inquired to the Illinois Secretary of State's Office about maintaining his Illinois driver's license. Couple these facts with his widow's testimony that the two of them planned to live in Effingham, Illinois after his service was complete and the presumption of Illinois residency is maintained.

Taking into consideration all of the evidence and the presumption that a service member does not lose his Illinois residency unless he/she clearly abandons his residency or establishes residency elsewhere, we find Sgt. Sayne was an Illinois resident at the time of his death.

The Attorney General's Office's Consolidated Report and Recommendation indicates that the amount of compensation for this claim is \$320,165.72. However, the amount payable under the Line of Duty Compensation Act adjusts on an annual basis and claims paid in 2013 are made in the amount of \$329,130.36.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED:

1. Claimant's application for benefits under the Line of Duty Compensation Act are hereby GRANTED and an award of \$296,217.32 (Two Hundred Ninety Six Thousand Two Hundred Seventeen Dollars and Thirty-Two Cents) is made to Thania Michell Sayne and an award of \$32,913.04 (Thirty Two Thousand Nine Hundred Thirteen Dollars and Four Cents) is made to Mary K. Sayne.
2. Pursuant to Public Act 096-0539, effective January 1, 2010, this claim is entitled to payment of interest, the amount of which shall be determined by the date the checks for this award are issued by the Illinois Comptroller's Office. The Court will issue a subsequent Order regarding the appropriate interest amount.

Application for Benefits under the Crime Victims Compensation Act, First Degree Murder- The Act permits compensation for funeral/burial expenses of the victim. However, expenses for food and drink are not compensable, even if affiliated with the funeral. Therefore, Claimant is awarded compensation for funeral/burial expenses, including the amount she already paid, minus the amount for a funeral repast (a meal following the funeral service). *In Re Application of Marabia Clark* is reaffirmed.

OPINION

Sprague, C.J.

This claim arises out of an incident that occurred on Friday, July 02, 2010. Candice Earwin, mother of the deceased victim, Nevaeh Hunt, seeks compensation pursuant to the provisions of the Crime Victims Compensation Act, hereafter referred to as the Act, 740 ILCS 45/1, et sea., (2000).

The claimant was denied compensation by order of the Court on June 20, 2011. This claim is now before the Court pursuant to a request by the claimant to reinvestigate the claim based on the submission of new documentation by the claimant.

This Court has carefully reviewed its prior Order in this cause, the claimant's request for re-investigation and an amended investigatory report by the Attorney General's Office. Based on all of the above, the Court finds:

1. That on June 20, 2011, the Court of Claims entered an Order denying the claimant compensation because of failure to submit all materials substantiating the claim as requested by the Attorney General, as required by §8.1 of the Act.

2. That additional documentation to substantiate the claim was submitted to the Attorney General's Office.

3. That the investigation conducted by the Attorney General's Office revealed that the victim was an innocent victim of a violent crime. On Friday, July 02, 2010, the victim, Nevaeh Hunt, age 3 months, was the victim of a violent crime as defined in §2(c) of the Act, to wit: First Degree Murder 720 ILCS 5/9-1 (2000). The crime occurred in Park Forest, Illinois, and all of the eligibility requirements of §6.1 of the Act have been met.

4. That the claimant seeks compensation for funeral/ burial expenses.

5. That pursuant to §2(h) of the Act, "pecuniary loss" means, in the case of death, expenses for funeral, burial, and travel and transport for survivors of homicide victims to secure bodies of deceased victims and to transport bodies for burial all of which may not exceed a maximum of \$5,000. Further, section 10.1(c) of the Act states that, any person, even though not dependent upon the victim for his or her support, may be compensated for reasonable funeral expenses of the victim to the extent to which he or she has paid or become obligated to pay such expenses.

6. That funeral/burial expenses were incurred as a result of the victim's death in the amount of \$4,543.18. To date, the claimant has paid \$75.00 towards this amount. An outstanding balance incurred by the claimant is still owed in the amount of \$4,468.18 to Leak and Sons Funeral Chapels. Of this amount, \$375.00 was for a funeral repast. A repast is the meal following a funeral service and is also referred to as a funeral luncheon, reception, or memorial meal.

7. That in *In Re Application of Marabia Clark*, 45 Ill.Ct.Cl. 566 (1993), the claimant applied for funeral expenses incurred for her son. As part of the funeral, the claimant held a

catered reception for those attending the funeral. The claimant submitted the cost of the funeral luncheon to the Crime Victims Compensation program for reimbursement. The Court of Claims denied the request and held that "a catered reception with food and drink is beyond what is regularly considered as funeral expenses under the Crime Victims Compensation Act." *Id.* at 567.

8. The Court herein has reconsidered its ruling *In Re Application of Glen Davidson*, No. 10cv4846, filed on September 22, 2011, and therefore *In Re Application of Marabia Clark*, 45 Ill.Ct.Cl. 566 (1993) is hereby reaffirmed. Accordingly, pursuant to Section 2(h) of the Crime Victims Compensation Act, and current caselaw, expenses cannot be reimbursed for food and drink even if affiliated with a funeral. Therefore, the repast expenses of \$375.00 will not be reimbursed to Leak and Sons Funeral Chapels.

9. That the claimant has received no reimbursements that can be counted as an applicable deduction under §10.1(e) of the Act.

10. That after considering all sources of recovery as enumerated in the Act, the pecuniary loss for funeral expenses is based on the following:

Compensable Funeral/Burial Expenses	<u> \$75.00</u>
Total	\$4,168.18

11. That pursuant to §18(c) of the Act, the Court may order that all or a portion of an award be paid solely and directly to the provider of services. In the instant case, the Court finds this section applicable and orders that direct payment be made.

12. That the claimant has complied with all pertinent provisions of the Act and qualifies for compensation thereunder.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that *In Re Application of Marabia Clark*, 45 Ill.Ct.Cl. 566 (1993) be and is hereby reaffirmed.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the sum of \$75.00 (SEVENTY FIVE DOLLARS) be and is hereby awarded to Candice Earwin, mother of Nevaeh Hunt, an innocent victim of a violent crime.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the sum of \$4,093.18 (FOUR THOUSAND NINETY THREE DOLLARS AND EIGHTEEN-CENTS) be and is hereby awarded to Leak and Sons Funeral Chapels for the funeral/burial expenses incurred by Candice Earwin.

(No. 09-CV-6108 – Claim awarded)

Application for Benefits under the Crime Victims Compensation Act, Criminal sexual abuse- The Act permits benefits if the appropriate law enforcement officials were notified within 7 days of the perpetration of the crime. However, a child should not be denied benefits because of a parent's failure to notify the police of sexual abuse against the child. Denial would do violence to the legislator's intent and the child, and have a chilling effect on future such cases. Given the circumstances, the victim's notification was timely because officials were notified immediately after the child confided in school counselors of the sexual abuse.

ORDER

Birnbaum, J.

This cause is before the Court following a hearing before the assigned Commissioner. This case involves the criminal sexual abuse of a young girl. Because of the sensitive nature of this crime, the Court, sua sponte has redacted the actual names of the victim and her mother and substituted them with Jane Roe and Jane Doe respectively.

This claim arises out of repeated acts of sexual abuse occurring over a period of several years, against the minor child. The abuse was reported by the victim to her mother in October of 2007. But the crime was not reported to law enforcement until February 3, 2009. An Application for Benefits under the Crime Victims Compensation Act was submitted by Claimant on June 15, 2009. Claimant sought compensation pursuant to the provisions of the Illinois Crime Victims Compensation Act, hereinafter referred to as "the Act", 740 ILCS 45/1, *et seq.*, (2000). On February 1, 2010, this Court denied Claimant compensation under the Act. This order was based upon the Court's finding that the appropriate law enforcement officials were not

notified within seven (7) days of the perpetration of the crime. The Court also found that Claimant failed to establish that notification was timely under the circumstances, an exception to the seven (7) day rule. On February 26, 2010, Claimant appealed this Court's denial of compensation on the basis that Claimant was not aware of the crime being committed until the minor child told a school counselor on February 3, 2009. Because of this, Claimant argues notification was timely.

A hearing was held before Commissioner Timoney on August 19, 2010. Commissioner Timoney filed his recommendation together with a transcript of the hearing and exhibits. This Court has reviewed all of the documents including the testimony and evidence presented at the hearing before the Commissioner. Following that review, THIS COURT FINDS:

1. That commencing in 1999 and lasting for a period of several years, the minor victim, described herein as Jane Roe was the victim of a violent crime, as defined in Section 2(c) of the Act, to-wit: Criminal Sexual Abuse, 720 ILCS 5/12-15 (2000), by an offender, her step-father.

2. That in late October or early November, 2007, while living in the State of Arizona, Claimant was advised by her minor daughter that her step father had been "touching her" in a way the daughter thought to be abusive. The child told her mother that the abuse took place over several years beginning when they were living in Illinois. Claimant confronted her husband about the allegations. He denied any abuse. Claimant's mother came to Arizona from her home in Florida to provide comfort and assistance to her daughter and granddaughter. Within a matter of days, Claimant moved with her minor daughter to her mother's home in Florida to get away from the offender. Claimant did not then, nor did she ever report the crime to a law enforcement official. It was not until February, 2009, after Claimant and her minor

daughter moved back, to the State of Illinois, that the child confided the abuse to a counselor at Champaign Central High School. This counselor promptly notified law enforcement officials of the crime.

3. That pursuant to Section 6.1(b-1) of the Act, a person is entitled to compensation under the Act if the appropriate law enforcement officials were notified within seven days of the perpetration of the crime allegedly causing the death or injury to the victim, or in the event such notification was made more than seven days after the perpetration of the crime, the applicant establishes that such notice was timely under the circumstances.

Here a little girl was subjected to unspeakable abuse by her step father for a period of several years. When she tried to communicate this to her mother, the mother fled the home (and the jurisdiction) with her daughter. But for misguided reasons the mother never notified the police, child welfare services or health care professionals. In fact, as of the date of the hearing the mother stated that she and her daughter have never discussed the abuse in any direct manner. The mother, at least initially, chose to believe it possible that the abuse never occurred.

But the abuse did occur and the child suffered greatly.

In *Nunez v. State*, 02 CV 2627, we found, "A child should not be punished because the parent or guardian failed to protect the child's rights by applying to the compensation program in a timely manner". We find that the same principle in *Nunez* has (in these factual circumstances) the application to the issue of timely notification.

When this child confided the abuse to her high school counselor the Champaign County Police and DCFS were immediately notified. In their first interview with the child the police and DCFS sought to gain her confidence. When they did they asked her what she wanted. She said, "therapy". The mom testified that following her report to the police and the charging of the

offender, the child had engaged in self mutilation by cutting herself. This has required hospital visits on at least two occasions.

The avowed goal of the Crime Victims Compensation Act is to provide services to children such as these.

It would do violence to the framers of this legislation and more importantly to this child to conclude that the child should be denied benefits because of her mother's failure to notify police. In fact, it was the child in this case who demonstrated the courage to disclose this abuse to a person in a position of authority who in turn made notification to the police.

While the mother failed to make timely notification, we find that the victim's notification to the authorities was timely given the circumstances. This child, despite great emotional trauma, showed the courage to cooperate in the investigation of this abuse including the indictment and conviction of the offender. To deny compensation to this child would have a chilling effect on victims in cases where the parent or guardian fails to report abuse. To do otherwise would tell these children that the misguided actions or negligence of their parent is a bar to recovery.

Accordingly, we reverse our order of February 2, 2010 and find that this child is entitled to benefits under the Act.

IT IS ORDERED THAT this matter is referred back to the Office of the Attorney General to determine the benefits to which this child is entitled.

Where a claim for compensation filed pursuant to the Law Enforcement Officers, Civil Defense Workers, Civil Air Patrol Members, Paramedics, Firemen and State Employees Compensation Act (820 ILCS 315/1 et seq.), within one year of the date of death of a person covered by said Act, is made and it is determined by investigation of the Attorney General of Illinois as affirmed by the Court of Claims, or by the Court of Claims following a hearing, that a person covered by the Act was killed in the line of duty, compensation in the amount of \$20,000 or \$50,000 if such death occurred on or after July 1, 1983, shall be paid to the designated beneficiary of said person or, if none was designated or surviving, then to such relative(s) as set forth in the Act.
