Kids and Summer Reading

School is out and that means it's time to read for pure entertainment. Mix it up; try something different and discover new books and interests. Instead of a mystery, try a fantasy, or swap adventure for science fiction. Read the book that was made into a blockbuster movie, or check to see if the public library offers a summer reading program.

Many studies have shown that kids who have fun reading are more likely to maintain or improve their language skills during the summer. One study found that children can lose up to 60 percent of their reading skills over summer vacation. To encourage students to keep reading, Secretary of State Jesse White and the Illinois State Library are promoting the "Find a Book" learning resource at www.lexile.com/fab/illinois. "Find a Book" is a free, online book search that allows children and their parents to quickly and easily select books to match a child's reading level and interests. Disney World Improves Accessibility

Disney agreed to provide "certain braille schedules, menus and maps" as part of a settlement reached in a 2013 class-action lawsuit, which claimed that Disney failed to meet the standards of the Americans with Disabilities Act. Now, 16 Disney World restaurants offer braille menus for guests with visual impairments. Cast members are available to read menus to guests at locations that do not yet offer braille menus, or at a guest's request. In recent months, the domestic Disney theme parks have made other changes stemming from this settlement, including installing braille maps in the theme parks and Downtown Disney; adding and installing signs for service animal relief areas on Disney property; and providing crates at attractions where service animals cannot ride.

Adult Reading Programs

TBBS Voice Mail Messages

You may leave a message at TBBS 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The message should include your full name and telephone number, including area code, as well as other pertinent information about your order or question. When ordering for someone else, provide that person's name. Please speak slowly and clearly. If we are unable to understand the message, we cannot process the request. We will only return a call if a reply is necessary or more information is needed. Otherwise, assume that the book order or service-change requests have been processed.

TBBS has been encountering issues with incoming telephone calls and messages, especially those made from cellphones. TBBS can only return calls during regular business hours. If you must leave a message, please do so with a return phone number.

Notes in Containers

Please **do not** send notes inside the mailing containers of talking books being returned to TBBS; it is against U.S. Postal Service regulations. Continuing to send notes in the talking book containers could result in the loss of "Free Matter" mailing privileges.

To send requests, please call, email or mail them in a separate envelope. Write "Free Matter for the Blind or Handicapped" on the envelope so it is still free to mail. To report a defective book, mark the box in the upper-left corner of the return mailing card and place a string or rubber band around the damaged cartridge or cassette. Call if you need a replacement book sent.

Bible Loans and Personal Copies

Many TBBS patrons request *The Holy Bible: Containing the Old and New Testaments*, DB 68777. Although at one time TBBS had 115 copies, nearly 70 percent of them are unavailable for circulation because they are lost or long overdue.

Braille and Audio Reading Download (BARD) users can make their own, personal copy of this Bible. However, if you're not a BARD user, it is now possible to get a permanent copy. Please follow the directions below:

1. Purchase a blank cartridge from one of the sources below. Cartridges cost about \$13, plus shipping and handling. Additional cartridge sources are available upon request.

- 2. Once received, write "Bible" on the cartridge along with your name and address.
- 3. Send it to the Illinois State Library, TBBS, 300 S. Second St., Springfield, IL 62701.

Managing Your Book Request List

When ordering specific titles, here are a few important items to remember about managing your request list:

- Keep a sufficient amount of books on the list. We recommend that you keep at least 50 books on your request list to ensure that we can continually send books you have chosen.
- Newer requests always go out first. Please note that the computer will select available books
 from the newer requests before checking the older requests. Talk to a Reader Advisor (RA) about
 what is on your list.
- Books numbered below DB 65000 are not always available. Check with your RA who will request a copy for you.
