TBBS applications now available by fax or email

The National Library Service now allows network libraries to accept faxed or electronic applications for Talking Book and Braille Service. The application must be signed or stamped by a "competent authority" who can certify that the applicant has a qualifying condition, and all pertinent information must be legible. The Audio Description Project

Audio description (AD) is commentary and narration that makes the visual images of television, movies, theatre and other art forms accessible for people who are visually impaired. These audio explanations guide the listener through the presentation with concise, objective descriptions of new scenes, settings, costumes, body language and "sight gags" during natural breaks in the action or dialog.

The Audio Description Project (ADP) is an initiative of the American Council of the Blind dedicated to promoting and expanding the use of audio description. ADP collects and provides information on audio description in all its forms, including how and where it is available. The ADP website at **www.acb.org/adp/index.html** provides current AD news; lists of audio-described TV shows, DVDs and first-run movies; links to other helpful websites; and much more.

Digital player user guide

Your NLS digital player has a built-in user guide that explains how to use all of its features:

- On the STANDARD PLAYER Access the guide by holding down the rectangular Play/Stop button until you hear "standard user guide." Press and hold the Play/Stop button again to close the guide.
- On the ADVANCED PLAYER Hold down the diamond-shaped Info button until you hear "advanced user guide." Press and hold down the Info key again to exit the guide.

NFB college scholarships

Each year the National Federation of the Blind offers 30 scholarships worth from \$3,000 to \$12,000 to eligible college students. These merit scholarships are based on academic excellence, community

service and leadership. You must be legally blind and live in the United States or Puerto Rico to apply. The application deadline for this school year is **March 31, 2014.** Applications for 2015 scholarships will be accepted from November 1, 2014, to March 31, 2015. BrowseAloud now available on Secretary of State website

BrowseAloud is free software that turns web pages into audio format, and is now available on Secretary of State Jesse White's website. Once BrowseAloud is downloaded, users may simply point their mouse at words on the Secretary of State website, including Illinois State Library web pages. BARD mobile application update

The National Library Service (NLS) developed the Braille and Audio Reading Download (BARD) mobile application because library patrons wanted the convenience and portability of downloading books, magazines and musical scores directly to their personal mobile devices.

Last September, NLS released the BARD mobile application for Apple iOS devices, version 4.3 or later. This includes the iPhone 3GS and all later iPhones, all iPads and fourth generation or later iPod Touches. The app is available for free download at Apple's online app store, iTunes.

Unfortunately, the development of the BARD mobile app for Android devices has experienced some critical failures, and NLS does not anticipate its release until mid- or late 2014. Contact your Reader Advisor if you have any questions regarding the BARD mobile app or are interested in signing up for a BARD account.
